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There was no loss of words--to describe Faith

Pelican mourns, and celebrates, the life of red-headed teen angel who was an inspiration for all

One word to describe Faith? Not possible. But more than 1,000 family members, friends, neighbors and classmates picked one word, at the urging of Rev. Phil Tobin, as he preached to mourners at the funeral of Faith Westby. On this day, March 23, 2019, the high school gymnasium was transformed into a "holy sanctuary to celebrate the life of Faith."

One word? Not possible. But dozens of words, strung together, begin to illustrate the impact this red-haired "angel on earth" had during her 16 years on the planet.

Amazing • Pure • Angelic • Strong • Special • Magnetic • Charismatic • Teacher • Minister • Perseverance • Authentic • Inspirational • Incredible • Admirable • Compelling • Uncanny • Courageous • Brave • Precious • Persistence • Crusader • Unforgettable ...

"Smooth" was a word Principal Brian Korf deployed. Also "charm." Faith used "her charm to--possibly--distract staff to get around doing her school work," chuckled Korf. "She was smooth."

"Athlete" is also applied to Faith. As a Special Olympian, she bowled, she tossed softball, and she ran. She trotted the 50 yard, and the 100 yard dash—but she never set any records. At one Special Olympics meet, Faith charged out of the starting blocks but was quickly distracted by her

fans, recalled Korf. She veered off course, running to all of her friends and family and classmates to show her appreciation as they cheered her onward. Statistically, it is unimportant. But she probably finished last place--distracted by all the folks she loved, out in the grandstand.

Faith's qualities were far too numerous to inventory, but her cousin Andrea Kaufman Westby identified one of her finest traits: "Never hurt people's feelings."

"Addictive" applies to Faith, as Kaufman added, "because you can't get enough of her."

Words that she taught her Class of 2021 mates, said Kaufman, included kindness, patience, un-arrogance. "Did you know that you had a teacher with you all of this time?" asked Kaufman, directing the question to her classmates. "Remember what she has taught you in the

The "Leaders" gym at Pelican Rapids High School was nearly packed for the March 23 funeral for Faith Westby. With a bleacher capacity of 1,600, and floor chairs totalling about 400, it is reasonable to estimate there were 1,500 in attendance. They bid farewell to a 16-year-old who inspired thousands through her health and medical challenges.

way she lived her life." Her aunt, Angie Westby, marveled at how Faith "lit up every room she was in." Despite the challenges, pain and struggles—which spanned her entire life; in, out, in, out, released and then back to the hospital—Faith lived her life fully, authentically.

"We all benefitted from her teachings...She made us feel like the best versions of ourselves," said Angie. "Lives were changed because of Faith...and we're all better because of it."

Born with Kabuki syndrome, Faith's medical challenges—including a liver transplant—were too numerous to list. There aren't enough words.

It was the third time, in recent history, that school facilities hosted funerals that were too large for local churches. One was the funeral for Middle East war fatality and Pelican high school graduate Staff Sgt. Josh Hanson, in 2006. The second was the funeral for Jessica Weishair, the Pelican Rapids student who was killed in a buss accident during the school's high school band trip in 2008.

Mentally, Faith functioned at barely a grade school level. But as an educator, she held a Doctorate degree—earned by her example to others.

"She loved blindly...She taught me more about life over the past 16 years than any class ever could," said Haley, of her "incredible little sister."

Faith Eileen Westby. The initials of her name spell another word: Few. Uncle Pat Westby checked the dictionary, and "few" is described as small, handful, exclusive, limited number.

"It fits Faith to a tee," said Pat. "She was one of the few. Angels on earth are here, but they are very few. They are small in number...Faith did exactly what angels do. She saw the world through a positive lens."

Angels bring people together, said Pat Westby. "Look around you today," he said, scanning across the hundreds of faces. The numbers reflect "the enormity of Faith's ministry."

Pat Westby's vision, proceeding toward the pearly gates beyond? God is there, smiling and waving, saying "come on in." But a little, red-haired angel pushes the Lord out of the way, and delivers an invitation to join her--with a wave, and her favorite gesture: Thumbs up.

Allen Westby, one of Faith's several "favorite uncles," made a special effort to acknowledge what the community has done for Faith. And, that community extends beyond Pelican Rapids--to other states, and as far as Bosnia, where Faith's story has circulated.

"She ministered to us, right up to her last breath," said Allen Westby.

"Faith is forever...Faith directs our lives as we move forward with our faith journey--just as our precious Faith did," concluded Allen.

"Faith lost her earthly battle...the red-headed warrior's mission is done. The calling from her Creator is fulfilled...Well done, my good and faithful servant," said Rev. Phillip Tobin, Central Lutheran Church, who delivered the sermon.

Faith, who ministered by the minute her entire life, nurtured a "following" that numbers in the thousands--and will continue into eternity, as her example is shared by family and friends, and across generations.

"Faith's 'congregation' is a lot bigger than mine," said Pastor Tobin, with a smile, as he looked around the gymnasium bleachers and chairs. "Her name, and her ministry is known all over the world..."

Faith's "crusade" has taught us how to pray; to laugh at life's threats; and the power of a God who lives, laughs and hurts with us, said Tobin. She also taught important lessons for a "narcissistic world," he said.

Everything is possible with Faith. Even death, stated uncle Allen Westby.

And in death, Faith continued to serve as a teacher; a minister; a great counselor.

She taught us to expand our vocabulary.

Because there is no single word to describe Faith...or love.

Not possible.

Faith's smile was "as wide and bright as the morning sun this morning," said Rev. Phillip Tobin. Faith Westby's funeral, appropriately, was March 23--the most beautiful spring day thus far in 2019, after a long, hard and harsh winter.
