DeMars brothers always return to Lake Bemidji for annual fishing opener

oe and Mark DeMars stand waist-deep in the waters where **J** the Mississippi first meets Lake

Bemidji. The soft waves reach up to meet the shoreline. The occasional car whisks by on the downtown bridge above. And, when lucky, a fish splashes as it's hooked out into the midnight air.

The DeMars brothers are standing in Jeff's spot. It's tradition.

"Life just gets busy, but you make time for this. It's what you remember," Joe said. "There are a lot of traditions, some that have gone by the wayside, but this is one that we've always (kept)."

Joe, 42, and Mark, 54, both live in the Twin Cities area, but they return to Bemidji for each fishing opener. Their brother, Jeff, lived in town and hosted family fishing outings in his coveted downtown cove.

Northern Dental Access Center expands teeth treatment west

Halstad facility will provide another option for patients

BEMIDJI — With demand coming from thousands across western Minnesota and neighboring North Dakota, the Northern Dental Access Center in Bemidji is marking its 10th anniversary with an expansion.

Operating as a nonprofit community clinic, NDAC primarily provides care to those with low incomes and/or are on medical assistance. To accommodate the volume of patients who come to Bemidji from afar, NDAC is in the process of opening a new clinic in Halstad, Minn.

The new location includes six treatment rooms, and since its soft opening earlier this year, the Halstad clinic has already seen about 600 patients.

According to NDAC Executive Director Jeanne Larson, the new location isn't fully operational

many of those patients live in counties on Minnesota's western border, Larson said NDAC leadership started to look west for a new clinic.

"We thought our next best approach was to move closer to people who were coming here (to Bemidji)," Larson said.

Larson said a private dental practice in Halstad had recently closed and the owner offered the property at a cost of about \$700,000. Larson said along with the purchasing cost, the NDAC also invested more than \$200,000 in start-up costs.

During the transition, Larson said the Bemidji location is sharing staff with Halstad, with some of Bemidji employees working there at least a day or two per week.

"There will be some back and forth in our first year there," Larson said.

No criminal charges yet in human remains case

Main suspect is behind bars

BEMIDJI — Although more than three months have passed since authorities found human remains in a residential fire pit investigation for violating the just outside Bemidji, they have yet to file any criminal charges in the case.

Meanwhile, the man at the center of the investigation is behind bars.

Darren Stebe, 44, was arrested in early February in the wake of a missing-person investigation.

The Beltrami County Sheriff's Office issued a statement shortly thereafter saying Stebe likely would face charges related to the deaths of two people.

Since then, however, the Beltrami County Attorney's Office has not charged Stebe, nor anyone else. County Attorney David Hanson said CHARGES: Page A7

the reason is because they're not pressed for time since their primary suspect is already incarcerated.

Authorities arrested Stebe during their

terms of his early release from a 2010 drug sentence. Stebe is incarcerated at the Minnesota Department of Corrections in Stillwater with an anticipated release date of May 2021.

"Our suspect is incarcerat-ed," Hanson said. "There isn't the expediency that surrounds most cases... we have the luxury of time; we're using that to make sure we have all of our investigatory pieces put together before (we) bring charges."

Outside of that, Hanson declined to comment on any details from the case.

So, on Saturday, once midnight passed and the Minnesota fishing season officially opened, Joe and Mark were right where they belonged.


"When my brother moved up here, we started coming up," Mark said. "... That's kind of tradition. We always put on the chest waders and try to hit the water as soon as it's Saturday."

Jeff was diagnosed with lung cancer and also had multiple brain tumors before passing away on Feb. 27, 2017. He was 55. Jeff is survived by his wife, Lisa, and kept alive through the trek to his spot that Joe and Mark make an annual priority.

"There's some sibling rivalries and there's strifing, but we always come together for the weekend to go fishing," Joe said. "That's what we've done forever, since I was as little as I can remember. ... Whatever's going on, we're going to drop it. If we can do this, we have to find a way."

The brothers always pray before casting the first line, and they then spent about three hours in handed because that's the water early Saturday. They caught 16 fish in their go-to location and kept nine between the two of them.

"It's extremely peaceful, quiet," Mark said. "You're in God's

The DeMars had a late start to the opener not touching the waters until after the midnight opening — but Jeff's spot remained unoccupied until they arrived. Almost as if it was
