### After a lifetime of rolling in dough, Schmidt can retire

n baking, there are certain ingredients considered binding Lagents that act to hold together the other ingredients. Those substances draw others materials together to form one cohesive unit.

Mary and Dave Schmidt were those binding agents for many years at Abby's Bakery in Wadena. The two were once the owners of the Wadena Bakery on Jefferson Street S., baking in their own businesses for 22 years in Wadena. They were later approached to be the bakers that would start Abby's Bakery, a central baking system next to Mason Brothers that could distribute baked goods all over the Midwest.

"They took a chance on us," Mary said. "It's huge to think that Mason Brothers as a company was willing to take that on blind sided and just kind of roll with it," Mary said.

Dave retired in Dec. 2016 and has been putting in overtime in his fishing boat. On Thursday, June 6, Mary also retired to join him out on the water.

#### Abby's history

Mary, 66, said when she and Dave, 73, were approached about the bakery idea by the Harrisons, they had heard that if it didn't work out, the building that was built could become a truck garage building. Luckily that never

#### **Toby Pierce and Associates** celebrates 60 years in business

Mentored by local insurance agents in Wadena over 60 years ago, a young Toby Pierce took a chance at starting a business in Wadena, leaving behind his farming background.

Operating out of his home in 1959, he and his wife Jeanette started Pierce Insurance Agency, gradually moving from Second Street, then 10th Street and eventually to the current location at 16 Dayton Ave. SW in 1998. That same year, one of his five children, Erin came on board as an insurance agent as well. She eventually bought the business in 2014 and this year, the business is excited to keep going after 60 years.

Growing up on a farm east of Wadena, Pierce knew that farming was not right for him.

"Cows want to be milked twice a day, every day," he said. It didn't seem like the right fit.

#### The WDC Produce Stand is open for business

Planted between two greenhouses near WDC Middle/High school is the long awaited produce stand. June 4 is opening day for the season and greenhouse coordinator, Caroline Venis was busy tending to a line of customers eager to inspect tomatoes and cucumbers. Venis has been growing for years and the small stand provides produce to the community with some items sprouting sooner for here.

Venis opens the stand early in June and closes down in the last week of August. She explained that
