Chappy's comprehensive home care license revoked

The comprehensive home care license for Chappy's Golden Shores in Hill City was revoked by the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) on Feb. 20 because of noncompliance with applicable laws or rules. The order follows the temporary 90-day suspension of the facility's home care license, which was issued on Dec. 6, 2018, after investigators determined violations had occurred which posed imminent risk of harm to the health and safety of the persons in the provider's care.

According to the MDH, Chappy's violated eight laws and 10 different clients were maltreated. These laws state a person who receives home care services has the concerns raised by residents right to: receive services according to a suitable and up-to-date plan; be served by people who are properly trained and competent to perform their duties; and be free from physical and ver-

bal abuse, neglect, financial exploitation, and all forms of maltreatment covered under the Vulnerable Adults Act. All home care providers were not in compliance with requirements for reporting maltreatment of vulnerable adults. The facility failed to meet comprehensive assessment and monitoring requirements, as well as timing and internal requirements for reporting maltreatment of vulnerable adults.

"Because Chappy's Golden Shores is already under immediate temporary suspension order, there must not be any home care clients residing at or receiving care from Chappy's," according to the MDH Notice of Revocation. A person involved in the management, operation or control of a home care provider that operates without an appropriate license is guilty of a misdemeanor.
