I write this column with a heavy heart.

My plan was to write about my daughter Anna's 10th birthday party, but the sorrow and pain felt for the family of Will Potter, the young husband, father, and Waterville firefighter, who passed away last week due to a car crash, weighs heavy on my heart... and on the hearts of many.

While I never personally knew Will, I've been working for the local paper for 16 years, and remember him from his time at WEM High School. I remember him as a jovial young man who always wore a big grin.

I had the grim job of pulling the fatal accident report, writing the story, and posting it to the newspaper's website.

It is the worst part of my job, but people want to know what happened. At some level, knowing what happened sometimes helps.

The next step in reporting on an incident such as this, is to reach out to those who knew and loved the deceased. It isn't easy.

Everyone deals with grief differently. Some want to talk about their loved one. Some don't and feel even being asked is an insult to their already aching hearts. Some are in shock and can't function. I've encountered all of these.

Nothing is right or wrong at that point.

I always try to honor the family's wishes,

and pray they see my reaching out as not being intrusive.

My goal is to honor the deceased with a nice story, including quotes about how they lived.

In the story about Potter's accident, you'll find quotes from Jeff Boran and Fire Chief Chris Meskan. Both men graciously provided quotes about Potter, a friendly and dedicated young man taken too soon.

You won't find a quote from Potter's young widow in the story. I prayed hard about this, And, ultimately, honoring her privacy and grief seemed more important given the timing of the accident, the funeral, and our publication date.

As a mother with two young daughters of my own, I can't even start to comprehend the anguish of losing your husband and parenting partner.

Words can't portray everything I wish to say to the family or the community at this time

The firefighter's funeral on Monday was both beautiful and heart-wrenching, a well-deserved final salute to our fallen local hero, a daddy who will always be missedand never forgotten.

My condolences to the Potter family.




