
### BHVPP QUALIFIES FIVE FOR STATE

Last Saturday, the 6A Individual Section took place in Wadena. Coming off another hit and miss week of practice due to this crazy winter, it was ready or not, time to blow the whistle.

BHVPP had a great opening round as ten of the 14 advanced to the semifinals, which would be our make or break round. In the semifinals, we got off to a slow start as David Revering, Deagen Captain and Quinn Kern went down in defeat.

Just like the previous week, Jason Koehn changed things around as he took his six seed and found a way to get to the finals. Trever Arceneau followed suit as did Devin Dean.

Hunter Dean and Jaden Finck fell to the wrestle-backs as Zavier Grefe and Craig Orlando advanced with falls for a .500 round.

In the back side of the bracket, Revering and Hunter Dean battled their way back to fourth. Captain and Kern came back for the bronze. Brock Peterson who dropped an early round match found a way to finish fifth, as did Mason Schroeder. Carter Rokes and Tyler Eggert wrestled solid on

the day coming up short of getting their arm raised. Jaden Finck eventually took home third when the dust settled as he dropped a close true second match to a highly ranked wrestler.

That leaves us with five to talk about. Koehn had wrestled two highly contested matches winning in the final seconds of both the quarterfinals and in overtime of the semifinals. As the bracket fell, he would need to win a match to claim his ticket to state.

In his first varsity championship match appearance, he stayed calm and collective, as the match stayed close with time ticking down. A great setup and hi-C single finish would be the difference as he rode out his opponent for the top spot at 126 earning his first trip to state.

Arceneau got his big move early in the finals at 132 and continued to open the gap from there. He cruised to the major decision and second state tournament appearance with the blue around his neck this year.

Devin Dean split on the year

with his finals opponent and after defeating him last Friday in the Team Championship, it was swung back to his opponent's favor this weekend. Either way, the back door was shut by his previous opponent and the ticket was punched for his third state tournament appearance.

Grefe steam rolled to the finals with two solid pins and even some eye gouging wasn't going to stop him as he found a way to finish his opponent with shoulders to the mat for the championship and his first trip to state. In fact, the only takedown his opponent could get, was on me, but we were clearly out of bounds.

Orlando found a familiar foe waiting for him in the finals. This time was no different than the past as it was close again with us coming out on top. Orlando will make his third state tournament appearance next week as he attempts to defend his championship from a

The team tournament is Thursday, as we drew the #2 ranked and second seeded Tracy-Milroy-Balaton/Westbrook-Walnut Grove Panthers as our quarterfinal opponent at 11 a.m. The semifinals and consolation semifinal are slated for 1 p.m. with fifth and third

On the individual side, three of our five earned seeds with their body of work throughout the season and last year. Orlando carries the top seed, Grefe was given the third seed and Arceneau the seventh seed.
