




In the Section 8AA championship rematch Saturday night at Fosston, the Panthers avenged that loss with a dominant 25-16, 25-13, 25-13 victory to capture their first section title and advance to state for the first time in program history.

"We had a very strong season last year and losing that championship natch was heartbreaking.
