yle Smith's teeth were still chattering nearly 25 minutes after crossing the finish line of the 10-kilometer Freeze Yer Gizzard Blizzard Run Saturday morning at Backus Community Center.

The 32-year-old runner from Duluth finished the 39th annual event in 37 minutes, 16 seconds. He said he's run cold races before, but the -26 degrees at the starting line may be the coldest.

"I did a hypothermic half mara-

he said. "This is my fourth time runis my slowest time on this course. though."

The temperature at the 9 a.m. starting line of the 5-kilometer race was -31 degrees and attracted nearly 100 runners who felt bold enough to run in the cold. The actual air temp broke a record for the race, shattering the previous record of -25 degrees set

'We have run in colder temperatures when accounting for wind chill, but as far as air temp goes, this set a record," said Tricia Heibel, Interna-

merce president. "We were all blessed ning this race... I like the run... This that the wind was not a factor this Saturday took its toll. weekend, and a big sunny sky also kept everyone's spirits up."


