## **Bach's Gamba Sonatas**

The opening concert presented by the newly formed Agate Encores Community Concerts features a rather unusual instrument, which will be of interest to Moose Lake area students of all ages. The harpsichord was a very popular musical instrument from the 16th through the 18th centuries. While it is shaped like a piano and played by depressing keys, the inside mechanism is very different. Rather than a felt hammer striking the strings, the harpsichord strings are plucked, creating a very unique sound. The specific instrument that will be used on the October concert was recently built in Amsterdam by the Klinkhamer workshop. While most of today's harpsichords use plastic quills, this is the only instrument in Minnesota that can be heard publicly with bird quills. The harpsichord features beautiful interior paintings. Tami Morse who owns this harpsichord will talk about it and answer questions. Concert goers will have a chance to see it up close.

In preparation for the 2:30 concert, local student musicians will be performing in the school commons area from 1:45-2:15. The concert organizers remind the community to buy their tickets in plenty of time. Season tickets cost only \$45 for the entire four-concert season, and they are transferable. The organization depends on the financial support of the community through season ticket sales and advertising to bring professional music programs right here at home in our own local school auditorium.
