HANDEVIDT SIXTH AT STATE

Butzon wins two matches, comes up just one win short of podium

A streak that dates back more than 30 years is still intact after Jackson County Central freshman Payton Handevidt earned a sixthplace finish at the Class A individual state wrestling tournament Saturday.

Handevidt went 3-3 at the state tournament to give Jackson County at least one place-winner at the state tournament every year since 1988.

Handevidt, ranked ninth in Class A, earned his sixthplace finish at 120 pounds. He finishes the season with a record of 41-6.

Eighth-grader Logan Butzon came up just one win short of placing, going 2-2 in his state tournament debut. Butzon ends his season with a mark of 38-11.

Handevidt finishes sixth

Handevidt opened the 120-pound state tournament with a 7-2 win over Lucas Jurek of Kimball Area this past Friday. Handevidt led 5-0 after the first period thanks to a takedown and three near-fall points and used a third-period takedown to seal the win.

Later that night, he lost a heartbreaker in overtime to Dane Niemi of New York

Handevidt led 2-0 after a first-period takedown, but the match was tied heading to the third period. Handevidt nearly got an escape that would've likely won the match late in regulation, but it went to

overtime and Niemi got a takedown late in the one-minute extra session for a 4-2 win.

A win would've guaranteed Handevidt a spot on the podium, but he got there anyway with a pair of wins.

Huskies survive first-round scare

In a sub-section where seven of the eight teams have at least 11 wins, Jackson County Central boys' basketball coach Alex Hein knew nothing would come easy for his second-seeded Huskies.

That proved to be the case in Saturday's playoff opener against seventhseeded Tracy-Milroy-Balaton.

The Huskies trailed by two midway through the second half before rallying and then hanging on to beat the Panthers 72-66.

"At this point in the season, you just gotta win," Hein said. "None of them are going to be easy, es-

pecially in our sub-section that has seven teams with 10-plus wins. We did enough to win."

The key, Hein said, is his team is still playing.

"Our goal is still out there and we can still achieve it,' he said. The Panthers scored at

the buzzer to pull within two points at the half, then opened the second half with a basket to pull even with the favored Huskies. Despite three-pointers

from Andrew Hesebeck and Jack Brinkman, the Huskies found themselves tied at 36 and then down by a point after a Panther three-pointer.

It was the three-ball that helped the Panthers hang

The Huskies finished second in the West Division of the conference with a 5-1 mark and placed third in the BSC tournament.



assured me of only a 183.



WAGNER WINS STATE

One year ago, March 8, 2018

Jackson County Central senior Dalton Wagner left little doubt as to who the best 195-pound wrestler in Class A was at the state tournament. Wagner pinned his way to the championship match, where he dominated Zumbrota-Mazeppa's Jacob Bennett 7-1 to win his first state title. Senior Jacob Tvinnereim finished second at 152 pounds. He got to the finals with three tight decisions before losing 3-1 in the championship match.

HUSKIES TAKE THIRD AT STATE

Five years ago, March 6, 2014

The JCC wrestling team finished third at the Class A state tournament after winning four straight state titles. The Huskies opened with a 31-25 win over Minneota before losing 38-25 to Atwater-Cosmos-Grove City in the semifinals. JCC erased a 25-6 deficit to beat Frazee 33-32 in the third-place match. Jordan Biehn, Paden Moore, Luke Norland and Keegan Moore each went 3-0 in the team competition. Keegan Moore won the 170-pound individual state championship, pinning his first three opponents before winning a 22-7 technical fall in the finals.

LET'S PLAY TWO

10 years ago, March 5, 2009

The fourth-seeded JCC girls' basketball team beat top-seeded Fairmont 88-81 in double-overtime of a South Section 3AA basketball game, outlasting last-second shot attempts by the Cardinals at the end of regulation and the first overtime. JCC scored 16 points in the four minutes of the second overtime, including making 11 free throws in the final two minutes. Whitney Burmeister finished with 32 points and made all six of her three-point attempts. Ashley Kruse scored 24 points and had a team-record 16 assists to go with six rebounds and four steals. Brooke Burmeister scored 10 points and had seven rebounds.

HABERMAN GOES 1-2 AT STATE WRESTLING TOURNEY

25 years ago, March 10, 1994 - Jackson County Pilot

Matt Haberman completed his high school wrestling career by going 1-2 at the Class A state tournament. Haberman opened with a 10-0 loss to two-time state champion Brian Heimerl of Lester Prairie/Winsted Holy Trinity, then pinned Milaca's Shane Johnson in 2:23 in wrestlebacks. Haberman then lost 5-0 to finish his season with a record of 30-10. Haberman won 98 matches in his career, ranking second on the Jackson career list to Tim Allen's 104.

CHAD KRAFT TAKES THIRD STATE WRESTLING TITLE

25 years ago, March 10, 1994 - Lakefield Standard

The three-peat is complete. Heron Lake-Okabena-Lakefield senior Chad Kraft stormed through the 145-pound field a the Class A state wrestling tournament to win his third straight title. Kraft won a 17-6 major decision over Aaron Kvien of Greenbush-Middle River/Badger in the finals to cap a perfect 42-0 season. He went 195-14-1 in his career, ranking only behind Chad Stender of Browerville (204 wins) on the career list. Kraft pinned his first three opponents at the state tournament.

Learning experience

Hanson said he had to remind himself both his wrestlers were at the tournament for the first time.

'You've been here a thousand times, but it's their first time down here," he said. "They don't know where they're going or what the routine is. It's been a few years since we've had somebody down here for the first time. As a coach, sometimes you forget they haven't been here

because you've done it for so long.'

Hanson said just being at the state tournament can be a huge learning experience, let alone getting four matches for Butzon and six for Handevidt

"I think it was huge," Hanson said. "It will make a big difference now. It'll get some of the nerves out. They know what to expect now.'

That experience and the talent the two Huskies bring to the mat gives them a good chance for continued success at state.

"They're right there," Hanson said. "Everybody up here is pretty even. It iust comes down to who makes it happen that day."

But the Huskies sank some longballs themselves, including another by Hesebeck for a 41-39 lead with just less 15 minutes to play.

Hein said that might have given the Huskies the spark they needed to rebound for the win.

A three-pointer by Sadie Voss gave the Huskies a 44-


the first two baskets out 37 lead, but the game was in doing so — as they held tied three minutes later after the Cardinals answered with seven straight points.
