Fick secures state diving gold

Seven earn all-state honors as Ponies place sixth in team standings

MINNEAPOLIS — Sitting on a narrow lead after the semifinals, Stillwater's Josiah Fick finished the job with three strong dives to extend his lead while winning the individual state championship at the Class AA boys' swimming and diving state meet on Saturday, March 2 at the Jean K. Freeman Aquatic Center on the University of Minnesota campus.

Fick posted a winning total of 389.35 to outlast Sam Wallace (371.00) of Bloomington Jefferson and Tyler Barrett (366.40) of St. Michael-Albertville.

"It feels amazing," Fick said. "It's diving in eighth grade, and here we are."

The junior provided the biggest rett (269.05), Wallace (263.40) and

highlight for the Ponies, who were Farmington's Seth Krause (262.45). kept busy with state finalists in 9 of 12 events. Stillwater racked up 131 team standings.

Edina captured the state team championship with 268 points, followed by runner-up Chanhassen/ Chaska (205) and third-place Wayzata (176).

Stillwater also received all-state performances from Will Whittington in the 200 and 500 freestyle events, Johann Noer, Zach Auleciems, Brodie Watson and Joseph Saldin in the 200 medley relay, and Aidan Bloomquist, Auleciems, Saldin and Whittington in the 200 freestyle relay.

Even while not feeling well, Fick received scores in the low 30s on points to place sixth overall in the his first and third dives of the final round, but also landed a 52.0 on his second dive to solidify his position at the top.

"I was really happy to see him perform," Ponies coach Brian Luke said. "That's a lot of pressure, and he was ill. He ran a 102.9 fever in prelims and 101.9 in the finals. I thought that was pretty good. It just shows his determination. If you've got that much determination, you're going to have to bet on him to get the job done."

He became the third diver in the state championship, joining a list that includes Steve Hamerski (1986) and John Schmidt (2001 and 2002).

ST. PAUL - It was a painful, but successful, state wrestling tournament for Stillwater's Reid Ballantyne, who ripped through the 126-pound weight class to win his third consecutive Class AAA individual state championship on Saturday, March 2 at the Xcel Energy Center.

The sophomore also captured state titles at 106 pounds in 2017 and again at 120 pounds a year ago, making him Stillwater's first-ever three-time state champion in the sport.







"I'm pretty happy," Ballantyne said.

After reaching the finals, Ballantyne (32-2) did not waste any time. He pinned Ryan Scherber (39-7) of Buffalo in just 29 seconds.

"I felt that if I got his arm I could hit the move and he gave it to me so it worked out," Ballantyne said. "I was pretty surprised that he wasn't more prepared for it."

"Reid told us what he was going to do," Ponies coach Tim Hartung added. "I just told him there's no reason to go six. You're beaten and battered, let's finish this thing. I don't think I could have predicted it that fast.

"As much adversity and stuff he's dealt with, there aren't many guys who are going to tell you what they're going to do and go out and do that, but he's confident enough to say it and follow up. He just came off the mat and said I told you I was going to do that."

It wasn't the only highlight of the tournament for the Ponies, who produced four individual place winners just two days after finishing second in the state team tournament. The 10 individual state qualifiers and four place winners are each the most in the program's history.

Kieler Carlson placed third for the Ponies at 132 pounds and Trey Kruse finished fourth for the second year in a row, this time at 138 pounds. Josh Piechowski battled back after a loss in the semifinals to finish fifth at 182 pounds.

After winning 5 of 10 firstround matches, the Ponies combined to go 4-1 in the quarterfinals — followed by just one victory from Ballantyne in the semifinals. Stillwater was strong in the medal round, however, while winning three out of those four matches to close out the tourney.

"It's a roller coaster ride, but to really finish off a magical season in the history of the program, we're proud of the guys for how they competed and the product they put on the mat," Hartung said.

The second half of the season was an adventurous one for Ballantyne, who missed a month with an ankle injury before returning just in time for the section team tournament. He tore the meniscus in one of his knees during the team tourney and had surgery two days after that. He was not allowed to do much of anything the following week, but returned to win the individual section title with two pins and a major decision.

"He just has another level when he needs it," Hartung said. "He has a way where it goes into It's like he shuts it off."

Ballantyne, who said he was wrestling "at 70 to 75 percent" cruised into the finals with an 11-0 major decision over Bryce Dagel (34-9) of Eden Prairie.

'I just think I had to overcome physical pain, but it's more mental just believing in myself and knowing I can win even major decision over Max Johnwith the injuries I was facing," Ballantyne said.
