Panthers pick off big district win over Giants on Tackle Cancer Night

In a South Central-Blue District matchup between two contenders, the New Richland-Hartland-Ellendale-Geneva Panthers built an early lead after returning two first-half interceptions for touchdowns and held on to win 28-12 over LeSueur-Henderson (4-3).

"It was good game for us," NHREG head coach Marc Kruger said. "Defensively, we played really well. It was something we kind of expecting against a pass-heavy team, we really worked on that during the week."

On the third play of the opening drive, NRHEG quarterback Blake Ihrke found who else, but Brady Agrimson

The 6-foot-5-inch Agrimson provides the Panthers' offense with a home run threat at wide receiver has proven to playmaker since returning to the field on September 28. The senior has 14 catches for 244 yards and three touchdowns in only three games this season.

Blossoms stay undefeated with 48-34 win over Crusaders

In this age of technology, a computer is almost a necessity. One was needed Friday night October 12, at Mayer Lutheran, as the Awesome Blossom football team kept its undefeated string intact.

The Blossoms outlasted the host Crusaders 48-34 in a game in which the ground game for both teams took the night off.

No one could have predicted it, but the teams counted 12 touchdowns between them and mounted over 700 yards in total offense.

Despite a playing field more conducive to mud wrestling than football, the two opposing quarterbacks threw the ball around to almost a dozen different receivers and orchestrated scores from all points on the field. The combined 62 points made

fans and scorekeepers dizzy and gave officials freedom to march off almost 150 yards in penalties, 135 of them on 11 Blossom miscues.

The Blossoms, ranked third in the state poll, still overcame them to beat No. 7-ranked Mayer Lutheran and set up the regular season finale against Class A No. 5 ranked Rushford-Peterson on Wednesday, October 17 with the top seed in the section playoffs on the line. The Trojans' only loss came at the hands of Goodhue two weeks ago.

After punting on their first possession, the Blossoms used six plays to go 55 yards for the first score of the game. A 33-yard pass to Tim Wolf moved the ball to the Crusader 12-yard line, and Gabe Hagen caught a pass over the middle for two yards and the initial touchdown.

Owatonna flexes defensive muscle, clinches district title

The Owatonna Huskies put on a defensive showcase Friday at home beating the Northfield Raiders, 29-11, in the de facto Big Southeast-Red District title game.

Owatonna head coach Jeff Williams said it was one of his team's finest defensive performances in a number of

"They had an awfully good rushing attack and we held them in check." Williams said. "Our kids were disciplined all night. We just didn't have a lot of

mistakes. We didn't have a lot of missed coverages or missed gap assignments. The kids carried out their responsibilities, plugged things up pretty well, stayed on their receivers and just made it tough sledding for them all night."

Northfield finished the game with negative-13 yards on 19 carries.

Raiders' standout Mitchell Stanchina was held to negative-seven yards on six touches after breaking Northfield's school record for receiving yards (217) in the' previous game.

Stachina was averaging

9.3 carries for 71.7 rushing yards and 3.2 catches for 74 receiving yards per game.

"What was really nice about that was that we didn't do anything special," Williams said. "It was just a matter of kids carrying out their responsibilities. That's always nice when you don't go out of your way to scheme for a certain kid and you can just go out their and play solid defense against everything they do. Then limit a real nice playmaker Stanchina, that's

pretty rewarding.' Northfield running back Jim Vitito was averaging 101 rushing yards per game until

the Huskies held him to 11 yards on 12 carries.

rushing yards. "It was a group effort, as we had five players with carries, and we had a much better night catching the ball.'








The home team played strong at the net in keeping the Blossoms at bay, winning the games 25-15, 25-14 and

Blooming Prairie Heather Pirkl sets up Megan Oswald in a match earlier this season.




