Charley's in charge

8th-grader claims Medford's first state title since 2012

SAINT PAUL — Medford's Charley Elwood couldn't contain his excitement after winning the 113-pound Class A state championship on Saturday at Xcel Energy Center. So he took a victory lap around the backstage corridor area.

"It was just a little walk to let it soak in," he said moments after defeating Sibley East's Derek Steele (41-5) in the championship match. "I just feel a lot of relief that it's over and all that hard work paid off. It feels really good."

After placing second in his previous try at an individual wrestling state title, Elwood (35-2) took care of unfinished business.

Elwood entered the tournament ranked No. 1 in

the state and as the No. 1 seed in his respective weight class.

"I felt like I kind of had a target on my back, like everybody was coming for me, but you have to push that all aside and wrestle," Elwood said. "I came up short last year and it just makes it all that much sweeter to get it done this year."

Elwood became the Tigers' first state champion since Curt Maas in 2012 and just the sixth in the program's history.

In the championship match, Elwood played to his strengths and used his length to ward off the attacks of the much shorter Steele.

"I really like my length," he said. "I've figured out how to use it and it obviously helps me in my matches against shorter opponents.'

Elwood controlled the match after securing an early

by a 4-0 margin.

Steele was able to avoid the pin-fall defeat, as Elwood avoided any unnecessary risks and completely controlled the match.

"A win is win," Elwood said. "There is no team points or team title on the line here. It's just about winning and

moving forward."

Medford head coach Dennis Whitman said he loves the way Elwood handled the pressure of the weekend that came with being the No. 1

"He went out there and proved it," Whitman said. "Everyone was giving him their best shot and it was

impressive the way he handled everything."

Elwood earned his trip the state championship match after he won 9-5 over Crookston's Zach Brown (39–3) in the semifinals.

"He's incredibly savvy," Whitman said. "A lot of people make a big deal out of him being an eighth-grader, but

he's put far more time and effort into this than your average eighth-grader and it

Medford's VonRuden earns silver at state meet

Medford's Willie VonRuden wrestled well enough to win a state championship on Saturday during the MSHSL State Wrestling tournament at Xcel Energy Center, unfortunately, he came away just short after a questionable penalty costed him in the title match of the Class A 145-pound weight class.

"Obviously, we are all heartbroken on the way that match ended," Medford head coach Dennis Whitman said. "The circumstances that led up to how it ended, there was a sense of it being a little unfair. But it's a credit to Willie and the person that he is because he's not dwelling on it and he doesn't feel like he got shortchanged. He will move on real quick, which is really

impressive to me because I'm still dwelling on it and haven't moved

VonRuden (35-2) led 4-2 late in the title match against Caledonia's Kyle Cavanaugh (40-0), however he was called for a one-point penalty and Cavanaugh secured a takedown to take a 5-4 advantage with less than one minute remaining in the match.

VonRuden said he didn't know ne was called for the penalty until there was about 15 seconds remaining in the match.

"I got up and his coach yelled that he was up," VonRuden said. "I thought we were tied, but I looked at the clock and I was down 5-4. I tried to put a few moves together, but it was not enough.'

VonRuden was the only opponent able to takedown Cavanaugh this season. He near took him down again but went out of bounds.

"I tried to take a lot of fake shots to get him off balance and moving," VonRuden said. "My game-plan going in was to push the pace and put the pressure on him, but we pretty much had the same idea. I tried to push the pace, but he was a tough son of a gun. He was just a smart, technical

wrestler and he came out on top." VonRuden said he came into the tournament "prepared mentally, physically, with a good gas tank and ready to roll, after not being being completely there mentally at state season's state meet."

He started the tournament with by pinning Kerkhoven-Murdock-Sunburg's Jared Carlson (31-9) in only 35 seconds. VonRuden

Huskies place trio at state tournament

SAINT PAUL — It was a bit anticlimactic, but Albert Lea Area's Zach Grazier (47-0) wrestled a defensive masterpiece against Owatonna's Cade King (43-5) to win the a Class 3A wrestling state championship on Saturday at the Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul.

Grazier defeated King 1-0 in the 182-pound championship. It was the fifth time Grazier had beaten King this season and the second consecutive 1-0 decision. Glazier and King were both state champions this past season. King at 182 and Glazier

"Cade is not going to back down or compromise from anything he believes," Owatonna head coach Adam Woitalla said. "He went out there and tries his best. He wasn't going to let anyone tell him otherwise or doubt him."

King could have dropped down or move up a weight class and likely

won a state championship, but he decided to take another shot at the undefeated Glazier.

"Cade is the type of kid who will tell you how it is," Woitalla said. "He doesn't sugar coat anything. Actually, his honesty is one of his best qualities. Ultimately, we have to give Cade credit for making that decision because he easily could have gone up a weight class and probably have won another state title, but he believed in himself and wanted a challenge. It's that determination and almost stubbornness that make him such a great athlete."

The final showdown between the No. 1 and No. 2 ranked wrestlers was a clash of contrasting styles.

King was ultra-aggressive. He attacked and kept moving forward. He tried to push the pace and get into scrambles. On the other hand, Glazier was the ultimate defensive wrestler. He stayed in a good



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Westfield's Krell upset in state meet, rebounds for bronze

It wasn't what No. 1 ranked Colton Krell had envisioned when he was upset in the semifinals of MSHSL State Wrestling Tournament on Saturday at Xcel Energy Center, but the Westfield grappler still found some silver

Krell (38-4) rebounded to win his final two matches and claim third place of the Class A 170-pound tournament after he was upset by Minnewaska Area's Tyson Meyer (39-0) in the championship semifinals 7-2.

"In my mind I would rather get third than second and go out on a win oppose to the loss," Krell said. "I wrestled my hardest and did everything that I could. It didn't work out the way I wanted it to, but I could have let it bother me and get in my head and end up sixth, but I wanted to show my heart and determination."

Meyer had a definite size advantage over Krell, but was somewhat of unknown after losing in the first round of the state tournament the past two years.

"He had good size and he knew how to wrestle me," Krell said. "I'm almost positive he's watched me wrestle because I watched him in the finals and he was extremely offensive and against me he didn't really take a whole lot

Meyer went on to win the tournament. "He was very good wrestler," Krell continued.

"Obviously, losing in the first round and not even getting a chance at third really bothered him enough to point that he improved a lot through a lot of work and he got the title."

Krell won a 10-4 decision over Minneota's Shawn Buysee (32-13) in the consolation semis and a 9-3 decision over Frazee's Brett Graham (37-13) in the third place match. He won his first two matches 9-1 and 9-3. to advance to match with Meyer. This was Krell trip to the state tournament.

He finished second at 170 in 2018 and fourth at

160 in 2017.

"I just have to get better," Krell said. "I wanted to be a three-time champion and I didn't get that. Then I wanted to be a two-time champion and I din't get that. Now I just have to work even harder to be a state champion.'

Westfield other state qualifier, Dylan Nirk (27-11), was eliminated after going 0-2 on Friday.

"I think he's hungrier than he has even been," Krell said. "That will really drive him and I really think he will dominate kids next

Despite the earlier exit, Nirk was competitive in his matches. He lost the two matches by a combined three points.

Westfield co-head coach Shane Masching said the sky is the limit for both Krell and Nirk next season.

"When you get the state tournament it's anyone's to win," Masching said. "The kids performed well. It's always good competition up there and we couldn't be more proud of them.'

Masching said upsets are something that happen when you wrestle against the elite.

"Anything can happen," Masching said. "Every match is a grind. Meyer is a very good wrestler. He has a great style and great stagger on the mat. He hadn't been taken down all year until he faced Colton. They both wrestled well and the outcome didn't go our way.'


Masching said Nirk and Krell were both great leaders for the Razorbacks this season and he's excited to have the multiple-time state qualifiers back for another season.

"Our future is definitely bright," he said. "We have some good talent coming up.

I'm already excited and optimistic for next

Westfield would have likely had another state qualifier if not for a late-season injury that ended senior Tristan Rieken's season.

Rieken defeated Plainview-Elgin-Millville's Logan Wingert earlier this season. Wingert (44-7) finished second at 285 in Class 2A on Saturday.

Panthers make early exit from state tournament



Xcel," he said. "It's pretty cool up there. I'm obviously happy to be able to make it up there



Let's all hope for a break in the weather soon, and we'll talk again.







"It was totally success," Staska said of the state meet. "I met all of goals this year, which was win sections and place at state. It meant everything to reach my goals."


Staska had one of busiest weekends of anyone at the


Owatonna's Nick Staska takes a suplex during the Class 3A 220-pound fifth place match on Saturday at the Xcel Energy Center.

Tax Prep Guide 2019





What does it mean to file an Minnesota

Technically speaking, filing Minnesota sales tax returns is a two-step process comprised of submitting the required sales data and remitting the collected tax dollars (if any) to state and local tax authorities.

When am I required to file my sales tax return?

The Minnesota Department of Revenue will assign you a filing frequency. Typically, this is determined by the size of your business. State governments typically ask larger businesses to file more frequently.

Am I required to file and pay my Minnesota sales tax at the same time?

Minnesota sales tax returns must be filed and paid at the same time and are governed by the same due date.

Can a 3rd party file my sales tax on

Yes! Many business owners recognize they are not a tax professional and therefore, choose to outsource their sales tax sales and use tax filing to services and to use an accountant or bookkeeper. This is a normal business practice that can save business owners time and help them avoid costly mistakes due to inexperience and a lack of deep knowledge about Minnesota sales tax code.

What happens if I file or pay my sales tax return late?

Business required to pay sales tax electronically but who fail to do so are charged a filing penalty of 5%.Businesses failing to comply with Minnesota sales tax laws or owing \$500 or more in back taxes may have their sales tax license revoked resulting in the business no longer being permitted to sell goods within the state. Continuing to do business may result in a \$100-a-day fine and can possible felony charges.

Do I need to file a return if I didn't collect any sales tax in Minnesota?

Yes! Once you've successfully registered for and been issued a Tax ID, you are required to file at the completion of each assigned collection period regardless of whether any sales tax was collected. This is what is known as a "zero-tax filing". Failure to submit a required zero-tax filing can result in penalties imposed on your business by the Minnesota Department of Revenue so don't take this responsibility lightly.

If I close my business, do I need to file a final sales tax return?

Yes! The Minnesota Department of Revenue requires all businesses to "close their books" by filing a final sales tax return. This also holds true for business owners selling or otherwise transferring ownership of their business.


