STMA blows past Buffalo in 76-38 rout

Kramer's hot shooting lifts Knights to 11th consecutive title game

Michael-St. Albertville girls' basketball team used two lopsided wins during the regular season over Buffalo as a learning tool.

For two out of four halves, Buffalo proved they could play with the No. 4 ranked team in the state. For the other two halves, STMA proved why they are a legit contender for this year's Class 4A state title.

"We played them twice, and both times, we kind of let them hang with us for a while in the first half," said STMA junior guard Kenzie Kramer. "All throughout practice the past week, we were focused on getting out to a good start. We knew if we could bury them early, we could take care of the game. That was our main focus for today."

Kramer and the Knights did just that. Sparked by an 11-0 run to start the game, STMA advanced to its 11th straight section final game with a convincing 76-38 victory over the Bison in last Saturday's Section 8-4A semifinal game at Halenbeck Hall in St. Cloud.

STMA's relentless defensive effort turned into early transition baskets and open look threes. Kramer scored 21 of her game-high 29 points in the opening half, which included six-of-seven she converted from three.

Buffalo trailed Knights 45-23 at halftime, but any doubts of an upset were erased way earlier than that.

Down 11-0, Buffalo Head Coach Grant Stewart was forced to take a timeout just four minutes into the contest. Lauren O'Connell scored the Bison's first points on a three pointer with 13:03 left in the half, but the hot-shooting from Kramer, Jadyn Hanson, and Kendal Cox helped push STMA's lead to 27-7 at the midway point of the half.

Hanson scored 13 firsthalf points. Cox added 12.

"We felt good. We felt confident. We felt like we could play with them coming into this game," Stewart said. "It just didn't go our way. St. Michael is a very good team. They played really well and they shot extremely well everything was dropping for them. Hats off to them."

Bison senior guard Reese Wishart tried her best to carry her team back into the game. Wishart's three with four minutes remaining in the half capped off a 10-3 Bison run, and forced STMA into a timeout with its lead cut to 35-21.

Following the timeout, the Knights went into a fullcourt press, which immediately resulted in two quick baskets off Bison turnovers. Buffalo committed 14 firsthalf turnover, and 23 for the

"The pressure St. Michael gives us is always tough, and we knew coming into it they were going to give us that pressure," said Wishart, who finished with 18 points and seven rebounds. "It was the little things we needed to do better, and we didn't do them."

"We started chipping away and coming back, but we weren't able to hang on to that momentum, said Stewart, referring to STMA's 10-2 run to close the half.

Much like the first half, Kramer came out firing with a three on the first possession of the second.

Buffalo scored six straight points on a pair of buckets by Wishart and one by Zrust. As they did in the prior two meetings, the Knights frustrated Buffalo's leading scorer, as Zrust finished with only six points.

'They shut her left hand down," Wishart said. "They know she's lefty, and they know she likes to go left. When they shut that down, it's kind of hard for her to do anything."

Up big with seven minutes remaining, STMA gradually started to pull its starters, but not before one final three by Kramer that gave the Knights a 68-32 lead.

Stewart kept his starters on the floor until the final two minutes of regulation. Five (Wishart, Zrust, O'Connell, Kiera Johnson, Claire Boser) of Buffalo's six seniors are starters. Haley Braun is the sixth senior.

"We lose a very strong senior class this year," Stewart said. "I told them afterwards, it's been phenomenal working with them the last two years. We'll definitely miss them and miss their presence. Now it's time for everyone else to step up and fill their shoes.'

Buffalo finished 20-8 overall, an improvement of two games from last year's 18-10 season. It's the first time the Bison reached the 20-win plateau since finishing 24-5 in the 2011-12 season.

"We had a great season -20 wins, I'm very proud of them," Stewart said. "This particular game doesn't define us."

"I think we had a successful year. Twenty wins is

pretty great," Wishart said. "I'm proud of my girls. Good luck to them next year. It's going to be tough. It's going to be a hard season, a hard conference, but as long as they stick together, I think they will be okay."

For the Knights (25-3), they get a rematch of last year's Section 8-4A championship game with second-seeded Maple Grove, who defeated Elk River 44-43 in the other semifinal game.

The Crimson (22-6) defeated STMA 59-56 in overtime in last year's title game, but STMA defeated Maple Grove 57-51 this year in the regular season.

Thursday's title game starts at 7 p.m. at Monticello High School.

'We want it really bad," Kramer said. "(Head Coach) Kent Hamre's never coached a player that hasn't been to a state tournament in their four years, and we have a couple seniors this year that haven't been to state. That's a huge goal for
