Warrior volleyball hits four-game losing streak

The Winona State women's volleyball team had a tough week on the road losing to Upper Iowa University, University of Minnesota Duluth, and St. Cloud State University.

On Tuesday, the Warriors fell 0-3 in the match against the Upper Iowa Penguins. Winona State only hit .094, which is the fourth time this year they have been under .100. The Warriors had 21 attacking errors in this match, the most they have had in a three-set match since opening weekend of the season.

In the first set they lost 12-25, continuing to struggle throughout the match. The Warriors fought back from a 12-5 hole in set two and made it a one-point game at 21-22. From there, they fought back and forth in points until the Peacocks held on for the win, 25-23. The Warriors were not able to keep up in the third set, as they never got ahead of the Peacocks and lost 17-25.

Although the Warriors did not come out on top, sophomores Bre Maloney and Becca Pagel, as well as senior Taylor Goar, all recorded double-digits in digs in this match.

On Friday, the Warriors were swept once again losing 0-3 against the Minnesota Duluth Bulldogs.

Although the team has had its ups and downs this season, senior Maria Wrage had some positive comments about how it is going.

"I think that the team is playing well considering we are such a young team," Wrage said. "It always takes time for a team to get comfortable with one another, especially with so many incoming players." The Bulldogs are ranked second in NSIC hitting an average of .147, and kept the Warriors to just a .069 in this match. Winona State only recorded six kills in the first set and five kills in the second. They found some rhythm

as an offense in set three as they had 12 kills and a 33.3 hitting percentage. Although this was an improvement, Duluth had 17 kills and a 57.1 hitting percentage while also recording 59 digs for the match.

Goar was the leading attacker with five kills, while first-year Madison Rizner recorded three kills and a team-high five blocks.

On Saturday, the Warriors were swept yet again, 0-3, against St. Cloud State.

The Huskies recorded 75 digs in this match, while putting Winona in a four-game losing streak, the longest losing streak since 2015, which drops the Warriors' record to 9-13 (6-8 NSIC).

These women fought hard in the first set, but ended up falling at the end with a score of 24-26. St. Cloud went on to get the final two sets winning 25-22 in both.

Winona did have a better hitting percentage in this match at 22.1 to St. Cloud's 20.1.

Wrage had a stand out game matching her season-high 10 kills while hitting a .444 hitting percentage. Goar and Maloney had seven kills apiece, and Maloney also had 30 assists.

"From here on out we have a lot of great competition ahead of us. Playing in this conference is the equivalent of playing all of the best teams in Division II. It pushes us to play our best volleyball which is really exciting for the team," Wrage said.

Coming from this loss, the Warriors hope to keep their confidence up going into two home games this weekend. "Confidence is something that our team really tries to work on," Wrage said. "We spend time every day in practice talking about the mental side of volleyball. It can truly be a

Warriors stomp Crookston 51-31

The Winona State University football team improved its record to 5-2 after defeating the University of Minnesota Crookston 51-13 on Saturday, October 14.

Coming off a dominant 54-13 victory against the University of Mary, spectators saw a similar game this week, though the Warriors had to overcome bad field conditions and a cold and windy day in Crookston, Minn.

The game got off to a slow start with multiple punts from both teams before a short punt by the Golden Eagles allowed Winona State to start with a short field on Crookston's 17.

The Warriors took advantage of the field position with a scoring drive capped off by a three-yard touchdown run by senior running back Eric Birth to score the first points of the game.

On the next drive, Winona forced a fumble on defense and first-year defensive back David Munson came up with the recovery. However, on the very next play, sophomore quarterback Owen Burke lost a fumble giving the ball right back to the Golden Eagles.

The fumbles did not stop there, as two plays later another one occured, this time recovered by sophomore defensive lineman Cole LaLiberty.

The Warriors capitalized going 51-yards in six plays with the drive, ending with another three-yard touchdown run by sophomore running back Sam Santiago-Lloyd, extending their first quarter lead to 14.

Defensively, Winona State continued to make plays,

At halftime the lead was 23-0 Winona State.

The Warriors began the second half on offense, and once again, Burke led the players down the field. Taking into account their sloppy field conditions, the Warriors decided to go for it on fourth down. Despite a holding penalty forcing them to overcome an extra 10 yards, the Warriors scored on a 22yard touchdown pass caught by junior wide receiver Tanner


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

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

With the Patriots you see it with the unending quest for perfection of Bill Belichick and Tom Brady.



Despite the changing weather conditions that gave the Winona State University women's soccer team cold, rain and snow all in one weekend, the Warriors kept the field warm as they continued their winning streak with two games this weekend.

Winona State hosted the University of Minnesota Duluth on Friday, October 12, and St. Cloud State University on Sunday, October 14.

The first game of the weekend started with the Warriors' constant movement to keep warm on the field. First-year Yanel Ortiz served as the team's goalie.

First period fell silent between Duluth and Winona, as Duluth had seven shots on goal all saved by Ortiz, and Winona

only had one shot on goal which was saved, along with six other shots that could not seem to find their way into the box.

The second period brought more fire to the field, as both teams fought to gain control over the ball, with more shots being made and substitutions coming frequently.

In the 86th minute of the game, senior Abby Bohanski scored her second goal of the season and the first of the game, bringing the Warriors into a 1-0 lead within the last few minutes. The Bulldogs would be unable to respond, and Winona captured the win.

"I am so incredibly proud of how these girls have been performing in these past few games," head coach Matt Kellogg said. "The way these girls are interacting with each other and truly just working as a team is astounding."

Warriors did not The disappoint when it came to Sunday afternoon's game, though the first period started off a bit rocky with two fouls on St. Cloud State, two counts of off sides, and a foul on Winona within the first 10 minutes. Shots were rare at the beginning of the day — St. Cloud managed four with only one on goal, and Winona attempted two shots, neither of which were on goal.

Despite the mixture of rain and snow that started to fall on the turf between period one and two, the Warriors did not falter, as once again Bohanski came in within the second minute of period two and beat the goalie with a dribble, scoring her third goal of the season and the first of the game. St. Cloud tried to make a comeback, but only managed three shots, two of which were on goal, and none

First-year Yanel Ortiz had a yellow card called on her in the 83rd minute, causing a bristle of anger from the Warriors, but the game ended shortly after with yet another victory for the team, marking it their fifth win in a row.

As the season begins to wind down, Winona continues to pick up more speed together as a team, hoping to continue to do so during the season's final stretch. The team has four more games left before the NSIC tournament first rounds start on October 31.

The Warriors will play next against the University of Mary on Friday, October 19, at 4 p.m. in Bismarck, N.D., and again on Sunday, October 21, against Minot State University in Minot, N.D., at 12 p.m.

It was a rough night, but the swimmers who were healthy turned in a most memorable performance. By the end of the night, the girls were so depleted that their final relay entries consisted of only one varsity relay. Those four gave one heck of a performance.

The team started the night with a strong relay and gave the Century girls their best, but finished second to Rochester's 1:58.35, touching in at 2:01.85. That was the relay of Lauren Whyte, Grace Miller, Carolyn Macon, and Mary Hoffman.

The 200 freestyle was a pretty good event for the Winhawks. Leading the charge was Kaylee Niemeyer, who's struggling with a sprained ankle, but she still managed to finish in third in 2:15.92. Placing fifth in the event was Bailey Olson in 2:22.62, a good performance for Olson, considering she was one race. Tara Ziegeweid and Harper Wolner swam fast but finished in fourth and fifth with times of 1:15.94 and 1:24.12.

Another photo finish in the 100 freestyle, although not quite as close as the 50: Rochester's number-one Avery Severson touched first in 57.27 and their number-two Alayna Patten was right behind Mary in 57.67. Winona's Carolyn Macon finished in fourth place with a time of 59.17.

The 500 freestyle had the girls finish third and fifth. Kaylee Niemeyer led the charge again, finishing in 6:00.89. Tara Ziegeweid got just enough rest after that 100 fly and turned in a good performance of 6:13.41.

The 200 free relay had Winona finish third. The Winhawks, consisting of Lauren Whyte, Grace Miller, Mary Hoffman, and Kaylee Niemeyer, finished in 1:50.23 while Century made it in 1:47.38 and 1:49.62.

The 100 backstroke was one shining example of these girls pulling together at the end and trying their best while knowing they were losing with many girls out sick. Lauren Whyte and Carolyn Macon turned in great times of 1:07.78 and 1:08.99, respectively, finishing second and third. Despite Frank's current standing with the Warriors, he was not the best at every sport he tried growing up. In fact, he said that he was terrible at sports from Tae Kwon Do to tackle football. "I was a bench warmer, and even though I was a running back for four years, the only time I scored was when I outran everyone," Frank said. "That was a significant moment that made me reconsider my choice of sport, especially since I was easily the smallest kid on the football team."

Frank is a quadruplet and has three sisters. Being very close with his siblings growing up, they did everything together. Even though his sister was faster than him at the time, Frank got a real taste for running in seventh grade when he joined the track team.

After a couple years of track and field, he then went on to run for the cross country team during his freshmen year of high school.

"I saw cross country as an opportunity to do something on my own and as a chance to be an individual for the first time in my life," Frank said.
