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Winona 8th grader wins state championship race



The Minnesota High School Cycling League held its state championship race event on Saturday, October 27, and on Sunday, October 28, 2018. For the fourth consecutive year, the Minnesota League headed back to Mt. Kato for the championship race, a favorite course for many racers and a venue that could accommodate the 3,500-plus people in attendance for the event.

For two days, over 1,200 racers from 64 teams across the state of Minnesota, Western Wisconsin, North Dakota, South Dakota and Iowa came together to compete in the seventh and final race of the season.

Winona racer, Natalie Horeck, out-paced 36 other competitors on the steep climbs and technical single track of Mt. Kato and took home a 2018 State Championship win in the eighth-grade girls division with a time of 19:29:3. Horeck was on a roll at previous races, each finishing higher than the last. Her coaches credit the win to her determination, bike handling skills, and never-quit attitude. "She is as talented on a bike as she is kind and can always be found cheering for her teammates and high fiving her competitors."

College for most people means a lot of new things, especially new surroundings, but for Winona State University senior Eric Birth, his surroundings have stayed the same.

When he first started playing running back, Birth said his idol was former Super Bowl champion Reggie Bush, a player he has modeled in his own playing style, admiring his ability to use his speed to get past defenders.

Football has not always been a positive experience for Birth, as injuries have impacted him a lot throughout his career. In total, he said he has had seven surgeries, one of which was on his shoulder. It has made things difficult, and he even had thoughts that it might stop him years as a Warrior, Birth sees the improvement he's made. In his first year, he had a lot of fun, but the team didn't win as much. Then, in his second-year, weight was a problem. It was in his third year that a big change occurred.

WSU athletes honored on 2018 NSIC All-conference Football Team

Eight members of the Winona State University (WSU) football team received recognition on Thursday, November 15, with the release of the 2018 Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference (NSIC) All-conference teams.

Carter Berlin (offense) and Isaiah Hall (defense and special teams) were both named to the All-NSIC First Team. Isaiah Frandsen (offense), Michael Ferrante (defense), Romario Gayle (defense) and Devon Moore (defense) were each named to the Second Team, while Cole LaLiberty (defense) and Sam Santiago-Lloyd (offense) earned Honorable Mention recognition.

Berlin, a sophomore, earns All-conference honors for the first time in his career. The offensive lineman started all 11 games for the Warriors this season.

Hall receives First Team honors for both his defensive and special team efforts. It marks the sophomore's first career All-conference nod. Hall tied for the team lead in interceptions (five) after picking off a pair of passes in each of WSU's final two games. The defensive back also recorded two forced fumbles, 1.5 sacks and 57 total tackles on the year. Hall ranked second in the NSIC in kick returns (28.3 yards/attempt) and was the Warriors' leader in punt returns (17.78 yards/attempt).

Frandsen garners Second Team honors for the second straight season. The senior wide out had a career year in receptions (43), yards (740) and touchdown catches (nine). Frandsen ranked fifth in the NSIC in touchdowns, eighth in yards/catch (17.2) and 10th in receiving yards. He concludes his two-year Warrior career ranked 15th in program history in touchdown catches (16) and 18th in receiving yards (1,360). Ferrante earns Second Team honors for the third consecutive season in his final year on the gridiron. The defensive captain led the Warriors in sacks (6.5), quarterback hurries (nine) and tackles-for-loss (13.0) this season and set a career high in tackles (51). A four-year starter at defensive end, Ferrante concludes his career ranked ninth all time in career sacks (17.5).

Gayle, another Winona State first-time All-conference recipient, tied for the team lead with a career-best five interceptions in 2018. The junior safety was fifth on the team with 54 tackles.

Moore, who played primarily on the offensive side of the ball as a freshman in 2017, earns his first All-NSIC nod after a standout sophomore campaign at linebacker in 2018. He ranked second on the team in total tackles (61), tackles-for-loss (11.0) and sacks (3.5). Moore also added a safety to his stat line.

LaLiberty, who missed most of last season due to an injury, also battled through injuries this season but managed to appear in 10 games and make six starts on the defensive line. The redshirt sophomore recorded a pair of fumble recoveries, 3.5 sacks, 4.5 tackles-for-loss and 34 total tackles.

Santiago-Lloyd played in all 11 games this season while making six starts. The sophomore running back posted career highs in every offensive category. Santiago-Lloyd led the Warrior backfield in carries (121), rushing yards (586) and rushing touchdowns (five). He added 15 catches for 148 yards.

Winona State finished the 2018 season with an 8-3 record to finish, second in the NSIC South. It marked its 14th year with at least eight wins in head coach Tom Sawyer's 23-year Warrior tenure.

"I wish everyone in Minnesota a very happy Thanksgiving, and recommend visiting one of Minnesota's beautiful state parks — for free — on Friday," said Dayton. "Like sharing a

meal, going for a walk can be a great way to spend quality time with family and friends."

Research shows that spending time outdoors benefits children and adults, including improving mood, enhancing creative thinking and problem solving, promoting a conservation ethic, and improving physical fitness. On Thanksgiving Day, the average American consumes around 4,500 calories. A brisk walk can burn about 300 calories in one hour.

"Holidays can be stressful, but Minnesota state parks and recreation areas are open yearround to provide places to unwind and relax, surrounded by natural beauty," said Erika Rivers, director of Minnesota State Parks and Trails. "We hope that visitors who go to a state park for the first time on Free

Park Friday will have fun, feel refreshed, and want to come back."

Although most state park offices and visitor centers will be unstaffed or minimally staffed on Free Park Friday, a variety of on-site and online resources are available for visitors. Find directions to the parks on the individual park web pages at www.mndnr.gov. Look for the self-orientation signs near the park entrance for suggestions on what to see and do during your visit.

Additional hike recommendations can be found online at https://www.dnr.state.mn.us/ freeparkfriday/index.html. Pick up a hard-copy map at the park office or, better yet, download one of the new GeoPDF maps that show you where you are based on your mobile device's built-in GPS receiver. Internet access is needed to install the app and map files, but once they are installed, they do not need Internet access or cell phone service to function.

A few Minnesota state parks will offer special programs. Whitewater State Park near Winona will be offering a turkey hike from 1-2 p.m., where you can learn the fascinating history of the wild turkey in the Whitewater Valley! Meet at the visitor center for a brief introduction, then take a hike to look for signs of wild turkeys.

Winter manure applications: Steps to take to prevent runoff, nutrient loss and water contamination

Snow-covered and frozen soils make land application of manure a challenge. Producers run the risk of runoff, leading to loss of soil nutrients and potential contamination of water resources. The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) advises the following:

• Watch weather and field conditions closely for a safe window to apply manure. • State and local requirements

vary, depending on feedlot size, federal or state permit status, and local laws.

• Refer to your state or local permit for specific details on land application restrictions.

• When in doubt about restrictions, contact your MPCA or county feedlot official with questions. Get contact information at https://www.pca.state. mn.us/quick-links/mpca-feedlot-staff-contacts.

The agency recommends these steps to prevent manure runoff:

• Farmers who apply manure during winter should review their manure management plan now to determine which fields are the most suitable to receive winter applications.

• Fields for winter application es of snow or more and the should be level, distant from sensitive features, and have crop residue.

• Consider lowering application rates.

· Monitor field edges to verify that manure runoff is not occurring. If runoff is occurring, report it to the Minnesota Duty Officer at 800-422-0798.

• If frozen soil prevents incorporating manure, a 300-foot setback from sensitive features such as streams is required.

· Avoid spreading when furrows contain ice or snow.

• Avoid surface applications: - When there is two inchweather forecast predicts temperatures to exceed 40-degrees Fahrenheit within the next 24 hours

- When the ground is frozen and/or snow covered and the weather forecast predicts a 50-percent chance of a 0.25 inch or more of rain in the next 24 hours.

- During February and March when most runoff events occur.
