Falcons finish section runner-up Stoykova wins marathon to lead Falcons to 5AA final

Senior Kathy Stoykova wasn't sure if she needed to win her match at No. 3 singles to keep Robbinsdale Armstrong girls tennis alive in the 5AA team sections, but she had an idea that her match might be the deciding factor.

Stoykova rallied for five straight points after falling behind 5-2 in the first set, and she fought off five deuces in the third to claim the match point, winning 5-7, 7-5, 6-4 to give the top-seeded Falcons a 4-3 win over No. 4 Buffalo at Baseline Tennis Center in Minneapolis.

After the match, Stoykova's teammates mobbed her on the court in celebration.

"It was great, but I also couldn't breathe," Stoykova said.

Stoykova had to regroup following a tough 7-5 loss in the first set to Buffalo's Emma Carlson, but she quickly found herself down 5-2 in the second set.

But she rallied with five straight points to win 7-5 and force the decisive set.

"I figured that we both deserved to have a really good game, no matter what happens, so I just decided to give it my all," Stoykova said. As all of these was happening,

After senior Sara Robideaux pulled off a 6-4, 6-1 win at No. 4 singles to Ella Stevens, it left two matches to go with the Falcons up 3-2.
