Toppling No. 1

Falcons hand top-ranked Park Center its first loss

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Robbinsdale Armstrong boys basketball showed it can play with anybody Jan. 8 with a 62-56 win at Class 4A top-ranked Park Center.

The Falcons (7-3 overall, 3-1 Northwest Suburban West Conference) finished 8-for-10 from the free-throw line in the final 1 minute, 12 seconds, and they never trailed. Park Center (9-1, 2-1) had its first loss of the season.

"It is a big win for the program. It is a big win for me in my first year," Armstrong coach Jon Bryant said. "I don't think anybody did anything overly special. I just think they were solid with the ball, made our free throws and just showed a lot of toughness."

Armstrong was a lot more aggressive with the ball than against Maple Grove on Jan. 4. The Falcons were just 3-for-6 from the line in that game, including going 1-for-4 in the final seven minutes.

Armstrong wasn't much better percentage-wise against the Pirates, finishing 11for-22 at the line, but the Falcons hit the

Loss to Bloomington Jefferson still shows off potential

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Robbinsdale Cooper boys swimming only has 22 athletes on its roster, so it doesn't bode well in Metro West Conference duals like the one Jan. 10 against Bloomington Jefferson.

The host Hawks lost the dual 100-70 to Jefferson at Plymouth Middle School, but there was still plenty to be excited about as times begin to get faster and school records look to be within reach, coach Luke Johnson said.

"I think we are doing a really great job of putting up some really fast times in the mid-season," Johnson said. "Historically, we have had nice taper times when we rest up, so I am really looking forward to breaking some of these (school) records before we get to sections maybe and then just shattering them when we get there."

The Hawks are expected to finish 6-4 in dual meets this season, Johnson said, and there were several outstanding performances from Thursday that can go a long way in meets that score differently, including the upcoming dual against St. Louis Park which gives points to the top four swimmers.

Seniors Nathan Welle and Jacob Boswell were two of the individual winners in against Jefferson. Welle won the 200yard freestyle in 1 minute, 54.08 seconds and the 100 butterfly in 55.5.

Welle was still 10 seconds from his 2017 record time of 1:44.95 in the 200 free, but he was just over two seconds behind his 2018 record time of 53.25 in the butterfly.

Jacob Boswell won the 50 free in 23.12 and the 100 free in 51.31. He was just behind his 2018 record time of 21.64 in the 50 free and was also close to Welle's 2017 record time of 48.4 in the 100 free. Both times were season bests.

Welle and Jacob Boswell also joined senior Brenden Faulkner and junior Nolan Boswell on the first-place 200 free relay, which won in 1:34.39. The same quartet holds the school record of 1:30.21.

"All of that stuff is trending in the right direction," Johnson said. "Throughout

Park Center cut Armstrong's lead to 57-52 on a driving layup by senior guard Tommy Chatman with 47.9 seconds left, but Priem followed with two free throws.

Sophomore forward Amir Madyun had a putback to pull the Pirates to within five, but Biewen followed with two free throws.

Besides the clutch free throws, Armstrong's offensive balance also proved crucial in the win.

Biewen finished with 16 points, and senior guard Devyn Frye and Breitbach each collected 13 points. Junior forward Hezekiah Iyawe added 10 points.

"That is the way we have to do it," Bryant said. "We don't have anybody that is a superstar that is going to score 20 or 25 a night, so we have to find ways to get good looks, and as long as our process is there and we are getting good looks, hopefully we make shots and can finish plays."

The Falcons stole the show in the first half. Frye nailed a floater, and Breitbach followed with a 3-pointer at the top of the key for a 15-6 lead.

Armstrong sophomore wing Dylan Inniger made it 18-6 after faking out a defender, stepping back and nailing a 3-pointer in the right corner.

Biewen later banked in a shot off the glass and earned a foul, where

Senior forward Cole Schlotthauer kept the lead at 14 with 6:18 to go. He threw up a shot that was blocked on the way up, and the referee ruled it a goaltend.

The Falcons now look to keep the momentum following the biggest win of the season, and Bryant said it starts in practice.

"We are not where we want to be," he said. "We want to get better every day, and I am hoping we can prove a lot between now and the end of the year."

she said. "And those girls are very good players. My coach reminded me to get my stick on the puck, block shots and take the body."


