A win away from state

Top-seeded Hawks defeat Mound-Westonka

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Robbinsdale Cooper girls basketball is a win from heading back to state to defend its title from last season.

The Hawks (19-8 overall) earned the top seed in the 6AAA section tournament and had a bye in the quarterfinals. Seventh-ranked Cooper took advantage with a 66-30 win over fourth-seeded Mound-Westonka in the semifinals on March 2.

There wasn't much doubt that the Hawks would advance to the finals after jumping out to a 38-14 halftime lead. Cooper nearly doubled up the White Hawks 28-16 in the second half.

Cooper's defense held Mound-Westonka to zero double-digit scorers, and senior guard Aja Wheeler and sophomore forward Kierra Wheeler led the offense with 19 and 17 points, respectively.

Sophomore guard Andrea Tribble chipped in nine points, and senior guard Sierra Lynch added eight. Sophomore guard Jayla Reliford (five), senior forward Arthel Massaquoi (three), senior guard Asia Smith (three) and junior guard Victaeja Leavy (two) also contributed on offense.

Senior forward Jennifer Schiable and junior forward Melissa Drill led Mound Westonka with eight points each.

Hopkins face Trojans in section finals with trip to state on the line

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There was never any doubt that this was going to be the matchup for the 6AAAA section championship.

Top-ranked and top-seeded Hopkins (28-0 overall) will face second-ranked and second-seeded Wayzata (26-2) for the third time this season at 7 p.m. Thursday, March 7, in the section final.

Beating the Trojans twice during the regular season was a nice bonus for the Royals, but the game they need to win is next.

In the previous meetings, Hopkins topped Wayzata 69-66 and 70-49. It is not known at this time if the third meet-

ing will resemble either of the other ones, but one thing is certain: both teams are hitting on all cylinders.

Hopkins drilled St. Louis Park 81-51 in the first semifinal on March 2 at Lindbergh Center, and Wayzata followed with an equally impressive 67-42 victory over Armstrong.

Neither head coach felt his team played a perfect game in Saturday's wins.

"We weren't ready to play today," Hopkins head coach Brian Cosgriff said. "If we play like this against Wayzata, we're in trouble. We have to mature. We were

Welle breaks 200 IM school record again

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Robbinsdale Cooper senior Nathan Welle finished his high school career in a big way March 1-2 during the AA state boys swimming and diving meet.

Welle had already broken the school record in the 200-yard IM during the 5AA section tournament, but he did it again at state – twice.

Welle broke his own record in the preliminaries on March 1, finishing one spot away from earning a berth in the championship race taking ninth in 1 minute, 55.57 seconds. That time beat his section time of 1:57.13.

But Welle didn't stop there. He shaved another four hundredths of a second off his prelims time in the 200 IM consolation final on March 2 and won his race in 1:55.53 to set the school record again and finish ninth overall at state.

Welle was able to best his prelims time with a faster freestyle portion of the medley. He had a time of 28.29 on March 2, which was better than the 28.55 on March 1.

He was actually behind Friday's time by .22 before his final lap.

Senior Jacob Boswell didn't break any more individual school records after he set the 100 freestyle at sections, but he came very close in the prelims on March 1. Boswell finished 14th overall on March 1 to advance to the consolation final in 48.09, which was a hundredth of a second off of the record he set at sections.

He ended up finishing 16th overall after finishing in 48.96 on March 2.

Boswell also raced in the 50 freestyle and took 16th overall in 22.25. He was 14th in the prelims

on March 1 in 21.86.

The 200-yard freestyle relay also made the consolation final and nearly rebroke the school record the quartet set at sections. Juniors Nolan Boswell and Ben Hunke, Jacob Boswell and Welle finished 12th overall on March 2 in 1:28.19, which was nine hundredths of a second off of their record of 1:28.1.

The quartet also finished 12th at prelims in 1:28.72.

Jacob and Nolan Boswell, Hunke and Welle also raced in the 400 free relay on March 1 and finished 19th overall in 3:19.75, which was less than two seconds behind their school record set at sections (3:17.49).

Welle added a 21st-place finish in the 100 butterfly on March 1, finishing his prelims race in 52.77, which was just behind his school record time set at sections of 52.28.

Overall, the Hawks finished 25th overall as a team with 21 points. Edina won the team title with

268, led by state championships by senior Andrew Gray (200 free), senior Peter Larson (50 free, 100 free), the 200 free relay and the 400 free relay.

Mustangs win third straight Class A state title

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The Breck/Blake co-op boys swimming and diving team is still on top of the competition after claiming its third straight Class A team title at the boys swimming and diving championships from Feb. 28-March 2.

The Mustangs, which scored 423 points, now have five state titles in program history and also have six runner-up finishes, all since 1998. Northfield was a distant second with a 188, and Winona took third with a 177.

Breck/Blake claimed state titles in the 200-yard medley relay, 200 freestyle, 500 freestyle, 200 free relay, 100 backstroke and 400 free relay.

The 200 medley relay (seniors Anderson Breazeale, Spencer Pruett and Dylan Brown and freshman James Pan) broke the Class A state record to win their title with an All-American automatic qualifying time of 1 minute, 31.26 seconds.

The Mustangs added three medals in the 200 free with Pruett winning the title in 1:42.4, and senior Thayer Breazeale (1:43.15) and junior Niels Wu (1:43.93) finishing sec-

Hopkins boys basketball

Royals gain top seed for 6AAAA playoffs

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No. 1-ranked state Class 4A powerhouse Hopkins boys basketball earned the No. 1 seed for the 6AAAA section tournament.

First-round games were played on Tuesday, March 5, but Hopkins has a bye because there is no the No. 8 seed.

The other two teams on Hopkins' side of the bracket, No. 4 St. Louis Park and No. 5 Minneapolis South met in a first-round game on Tuesday. The top seeds on the other side of the bracket are No. 2 Wayzata and No. 3 Armstrong.

Wayzata is the defending section champion.

The semifinals are set for 5 and 6:30 p.m. Friday, March 8, at Osseo High School with the Hopkins side of the bracket playing the early game and

the Wayzata side of the bracket playing second.

The championship game will be at 7 p.m. Wednesday, March 13, at Osseo High School.

Hopkins head coach Kenny Novak Jr. is mostly concerned about a potential matchup in the finals against Wayzata while evaluating the field.

"Wayzata spreads the floor really well and shoots the ball really well," Novak said.

Although the Royals handled Wayzata twice during the Lake Conference season, Novak is taking nothing for granted in the section tournament.

"Basketball is becoming a guard's game," he said.

The implication is that Wayzata's guards are better than most. In fact, Trojan head coach Bryan Schnettler starts five of them – 6-foot-3 senior Keaton Heide, 6-foot senior Luke

Paulson, 5-foot-11 senior Jacob Beeninga, 6-foot-2 sophomore Kody Williams and 6-foot-5 freshman Camden Heide.

"Beeninga is very good," Novak said. "He's a tough kid and a really good shooter who is quicker than heck."

Wayzata has to be concerned with Hopkins' size more than anything else if a third meeting occurs in the section finals.

The Trojans have had trouble stopping 6-foot-11 senior Zeke Nnaji and 6-7 senior Dane Zimmer in the paint.

In its final Lake Conference game, with the league title already in hand, Hopkins lost 77-70 at Eden Prairie.

For the Eagles, it was the Drake Dobbs show. The 6-foot-1 senior guard, well-known for his penetrate-and-dish game, scored 21 points and set up his teammates for open shots time after time in the second half.

Schrader, a fifth-year varsity point guard, handled all the pressure defense Armstrong threw at her. She did a good job setting teammates up and making sure the everyone was involved.

Neither Hopkins nor Wayzata was giving away any hints of new strategy, although Wayzata briefly played zone in the first half against Armstrong.

Both teams play mostly man-to-man defense, although Hopkins sometimes clamps on a 1-3-1, threequarter court trap.

Thursday night's winner will probably be determined by one simple variable - which team wants it more?

The quartet ended up tying Forest Lake in 1:38.84 for 16th place on March 1, and that led to a swim off to determine which team would swim on Saturday.

Season ends in 6AAAA section semifinals

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Third-seeded Robbinsdale Armstrong girls basketball defeated No. 6 Minneapolis South 72-52 on Wednesday, Feb. 27, to advance to the 6AAAA section semifinals.

The Falcons (21-7 overall) came into the season with a goal to earn a home playoff game and get a win following last season's early exit at Minneapolis South.

Armstrong went on a 24-6 run with under 10 minutes to go in the first half to build a 20-point lead, and the Tigers (17-10) trailed by as much as 27 points in the second half.

With the win, the Falcons moved to 13-1 at home this season.

"This group thought it was very important to get a home game right away, and they have done a great job playing at home," coach Antiwan Easley said.

Senior forward Carly Krsul was the catalyst during the run in the first half. She scored 13 of the Falcons' 24 points during that stretch and finished with a team-high 26 points in the game.

While Krsul was dominating inside, it was Armstrong's passing that helped fuel the offense.

Eighth-grade guard Karlee Fisher found Krsul inside to start the run, and Krsul banked in a basket off the glass.

Senior guard Masengo Mutanda found Krsul on a long pass in transition a little later for another basket inside, and senior guard Tiahna James found Krsul twice for two more baskets inside.

And when Krsul wasn't scoring, her teammates were there to knock down shots as well.

Sophomore guard Ella Brugnoli knocked down a long jumper after a fake out, and she later came up with a steal after Krsul and Mutanda forced an errant pass.

Krsul found sophomore forward Ephemian Bailey inside for a hard-fought basket during that same possession, and senior guard Imani Reid found eighth-grade forward Savannah McGowan inside for another basket during that first-half run.

"Any time you get a win in sections is good," Easley said. "It means you get to advance to the next game and get another opportunity to work with your team and be around them with an opportunity to get better."

Senior guard Jordan Bloom, who scored six of the first 11 points in the first half, drained a 3-pointer to push the lead to 48-23 in the second half.

A little later, Krsul picked up her fourth block of the game and gained possession before finding Brugnoli wide open down the floor. Brugnoli scored the layup, and she followed that up with a 3-pointer on a kick out by McGowan on the

Seniors lead Falcons to a 20-plus win season

Robbinsdale Armstrong went from seven wins last season to 21 wins this season, and although the season ended in the 6AAAA semifinals, the senior class leaves as one of the most successful in more than a decade.

The Falcons (21-7 overall) finished 13-1 at home and earned a No. 3-seed for the section playoffs. They also had the first section semifinal berth since the 2015-16 season.

Senior forward Carly Krsul and senior guard Masengo Mutanda were the two leading scorers this season, but senior guards Jordan Bloom, Tiahna James and Imani Reid also played key minutes.

Senior forward Brianna Campbell and senior guard Alyssa Hanson might not have played as many minutes, but they were still vocal on the bench and in practice.

Mutanda finished with 509 points and added over 200 rebounds and 100 assists. Krsul collected 508 points and over 250 rebounds. Krsul also had 81 blocks.

Bloom finished with 154 points, and James had over 50 assists.

There will be several holes on next year's team with the graduation of the seniors, but there are several young players that played key minutes this season.

Eighth-grade forward Savannah McGowan collected 118 points and over 150 rebounds, and sophomore forward Ephemian Bailey added 94 points and over 100 rebounds.
