

Willmar boys, girls both win CLC cross country championships

Another one returned after a six-year hiatus. For the first time since 2012, the Cardinal girls and boys are both conference champions after Tuesday's CLC championship meet at Eagle Creek Golf Club.

"All seven of our boys were All Conference or honorable mention. And lsat week, Sartell beat us here pretty easily, so that was a huge turnaround," said Willmar head coach Jerry Popp. "The girls, they had a good day

but not a great day. If the girls pull it all together, they'll be pretty formidable."

Thanks to a 2-3-4 finish from Serena Monson, Leah Hansen and Heidi Schmitz, the Willmar girls won their seventh straight CLC championship with 40 points, holding off Alexandria (52) and Rocori (56).

"We've been going back-and-forth a lot," Monson said about the competition between

teammates. She ran a time of 19 minutes, 21.7 seconds, bested only by Sartell's Ingrid Buiceag-Arama's 19:18.2.



Bradley, Red Sox slam Astros for 2-1 ALCS lead

HOUSTON — Jackie Bradley Jr. crushed a two-out grand slam in the eighth inning, and the Boston Red Sox stunned the Houston Astros 8-2 on Tuesday in Game 3 of the American League Championship Series

The Red Sox grabbed a 2-1 series lead in the best-of-seven set with Game 4 set for Minute Maid Park on Wednesday. The Astros have dropped consecutive games for the first time since Aug. 30-31 against the Los Angeles Angels.

Bradley capped a nightmarish outing for Astros closer Roberto Osuna, who made his series debut and his first appearance in 10 days. Osuna was at first undone by bad luck, with Red Sox shortstop Xander Bogaerts reaching on a swinging bunt with one out before Rafael Devers added a single with two outs on an 0-2 count.

Osuna, who entered seeking to

left foot with a 1-2 pitch to load the bases. He followed by hitting another pinch hitter, Mitch Moreland, with another two-strike pitch to force in a run and extend the deficit to 4-2.

Bradley then drilled a 1-1 fastball into the right field seats, an 386foot blast.

Red Sox right-hander Nathan Eovaldi (1-0) limited the Astros to two runs on six hits and two walks over six innings. He struck out four. Four Boston relievers blanked the Astros while allowing just one hit total over the final three innings.

Jimmy Butler stays

Let's be clear, Butler staying in Minnesota is not good for the team's long-term health as a franchise. The All-NBA wing has made it clear he does not plan to re-sign with the Wolves next offseason, and it wouldn't be wise for Minnesota to let a talent like Butler walk for nothing. But, looking at just this season alone, Butler makes the Timberwolves better — more so than anything the team could get in a trade return. He reportedly told general manager Scott Layden that the Wolves can't win without him. Minnesota's repugnant preseason only reiterated that that are great. When he's notion. Andrew Wiggins improves

Wiggins is the first to admit he didn't play well last season. He didn't score often or nearly efficiently enough to cover up the weaknesses in other aspects of his game. He still didn't create enough for others, crash the glass or make enough strides defensively. This is the first season of Wiggins' massive five-year contract extension. He's going to have to improve by leaps and bounds to play at a level worthy of it, and move the Timberwolves forward as a franchise. Some of that stems from skill development, but a lot of it comes from his effort and intensity.

"He has great athleticism. and that's got to translate into things," coach Tom Thibodeau "Whether it's a said. rebound or busting out with the ball, finishing in transition, running the floor hard — we want to take advantage of that moving without the ball, cutting. those are things attacking, he's a special

Additions in the form of Anthony Tolliver, Derrick Rose and Josh Okogie could all make a difference, if they're given the opportunities.

The Timberwolves need to improve and evolve throughout the season if they're going to keep pace in the ever-improving Western Conference. If that's going to be the case, their coach needs to do so with them. Part of that is identifying strengths and weaknesses and compensating for them correctly, and part of it might include listening more to players and what they're seeing on the court. Point guard Jeff Teague brought

up a couple times last season where he felt as though there were things the team could be doing differently, and players in training camp suggest-ed the positives of incorporating more switching into the Wolves' defensive schemes. Despite drama, **Timberwolves** believe they can be good

MINNEAPOLIS — An offseason filled with discontent, a massive contract extension and a high-profile, hyper-public trade request officially comes to an end for the Timberwolves on Wednesday night, Oct. 17, when they open the 2018-19 season in San Antonio.

And Jimmy Butler is slated to be there for it.

Minnesota ended a playoff drought last spring that weighed the franchise down for the better part of 14 years, but the Wolves are saddled with so much more baggage this fall. This drama doesn't figure to end when the Wolves finally play a game that counts, but rather flips to the next chapter in what feels like a never-ending saga.

The question is whether the Ŵolves' undeniable talent will be enough to outweigh the disdain and distractions present in and around the franchise as the team embarks on another 82-game journey.

It certainly wasn't in the preseason, an exhibition campaign in which the Wolves won just one game and rarely looked competitive as players fielded as many questions regarding Butler's trade situation as anything they did on the court.

"It's awfully tough to have situations like they are having right now and not allow it to impact your team," ESPN analyst and former NBA coach Mark Jackson said on a con-ference call. "So that's the concern. They're still talented enough to win games, but it wears on you."

Wolves coach Tom Thibodeau has downplayed the effects of any such distractions in training camp, but that's no surprise.

"It's rare to get a reaction out of him," guard Derrick Rose said. "With tion out of him," him, he's been calm. We haven't talked about it, it don't seem like it's both-

for Butler, but until then, the Wolves have their leader back on the floor, which is probably a positive for their short-term prospects.

"I want to help every-body be better," Butler said Sunday. "I want y'all to win games. My name is still attached to this thing, I'm still here, so we better win."

Thibodeau said he's sure Butler will give the team everything he has while he's in a Wolves' uniform. Teammate Anthony Tolliver isn't sure Butler is capable of anything less. "It's not in his DNA to

slack," Tolliver said. "He only knows one way. No matter what's going on off the court, whatever, once he's between the lines and has our jersey on, he's going to play and every-thing is going to be about

winning and that's it." Butler's mere presence figures to help raise the Wolves' play from their anemic preseason performance. Tolliver said the Wolves didn't take the preseason as seriously as they should have — an inexcusable mentality for a team that has still accomplished so little. But Butler's energy and intensity is a likely antidote for the lifelessness the Wolves put on display for most of the exhibition season.

As for the team's current chemistry, which was questioned for much of last season and highlighted this summer, Rose said there's "room for growth."

"We don't even have an identity of how we're going to play offensively and defensively. So you've just got to build those things along the way," Rose said. "We all know it's going to take some time. It's going to take all of us being on the same team and fighting through the hard times together."

The situation Minnesota finds itself in appears to be an uphill battle, but the Wolves remain confident they're a better team than what they've shown to this point. "I think we've came and we've made some adjustments, we've fixed some things and we've been able to work on ourselves more," center Karl-An-thony Towns said. "I feel very confident." 

Gophers coach P.J. Fleck says Shannon Brooks' status with team 'is evolving'

MINNEAPOLIS — Gophers running back Shannon Brooks and his surgically repaired knee were cleared to play for the first time Saturday, Oct. 20, against Nebraska, but an ongoing Minneapolis city attorney's office investigation into allegations of domestic assault against him have put that season debut in serious doubt.

"His status is evolving each day," Gophers coach P.J. Fleck said Tuesday.

After Brooks was released from jail Monday as the city attorney's office declined to press charges over a fight with his male roommate Sunday, he returned to the team but did not practice on Tuesday. It doesn't appear Brooks will practice until the city attorney's office comes to some resolution in its investigation.

"One thing that we are always have every bit of information that we possibly can before we make decisions," Fleck said. "Shannon understands that, and I know our administration understands that as well."

Fleck said a decision on Brooks' playing status will be made jointly by him and athletics director Mark Coyle. Fleck said he had no timeline to make a decision about Brooks' status for Saturday, but "there comes a time where a kid doesn't practice, you're not going to play him in games."

The Gophers (3-3, 0-3 Big Ten) play the Cornhuskers (0-6, 0-4) at 2:30 p.m. Saturday at Memorial Stadium in Lincoln.

On Tuesday, Fleck made it a point to reiterate a few things about the incident: no charges were filed, no injuries were reported and the incident was between two males.

"I just want to make sure that I going to make sure is that we continue to reiterate that," Fleck said.

Brooks was arrested early Sunday morning after a 911 caller reported a domestic assault at a Minneapolis apartment where he and his roommate live. The Minneapolis police report stated there were no injuries.

"The City Attorney's Office has reviewed the case and will not be filing charges, the office said in a statement released when Brooks was released from jail Monday. "... There will be further investigation and pending the results of that investigation, a decision to file charges will be reviewed again."

The Gophers are expected to start Mohamed Ibrahim at running back against the Cornhuskers on Saturday. He won Big Ten freshman of the week for 23 carries for 157 yards and two touchdowns in Minnesota's 30-14 loss to second-ranked Ohio State on Saturday.
