# NEW KING TO BE CROWNED

Hibbert's retirement opens up podium to younger riders

incoln Lemieux was at home in West Barnet, Vt., in May when he received a text from his girlfriend saying that Tucker Hibbert had retired from snocross racing at age 33. Lemieux was shocked.

Hibbert was the Michael Jordan of the sport, the all-time winningest rider who Lemieux idolized growing up. Later, Lemieux competed against Hibbert on the Amsoil Championship Snocross series.

The series kicks off with the 27th annual Amsoil Duluth National Snocross today through Sunday at Spirit Mountain, and the fact Hibbert won't be there racing hasn't sunken in for fans and racers

Lemieux, a Skidoo rider, along with Polaris rider Kody Kamm and Arctic Cat rider Logan Christian, are among a handful or riders who are favored to take the top spot in a wide-open race this

"It's pretty crazy,"

He captured his 11th Pro title last season, winning 11 of 17 finals and 27 of his 34 qualifying races. He kick-started the season last Thanksgiving by sweeping the Duluth






