Last summer, a fire started in the basement of Diane Johnson's home. Johnson and her husband, were upstairs when it began, got out of the house safely, but the damage was extensive. "We were out of here most of last summer," she says. When they returned to

their home and turned the water back on, all of the pipes broke. Her yard had to be dug up, as deep as 10 feet to replace all the pipes.

With the fire and pipe problems, Johnson's large and beautiful garden went neglected. "I'm now over 80, my husband is 85, and we can't

USDA leader sits down with farm groups

ST. PAUL - Minnesota farm and food industry groups on Tuesday, June 18 pressed U.S. Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Steve Censky for answers about a possible end to ongoing trade fights between the United States and China, as well as Canada and Mexico.

And while he offered possible paths out of the tumultuous trade negotiations, Censky didn't have a clear answer for the dozens of agricultural leaders.

Censky's visit came the same day the United State and China said they'd again attempt to resolve a costly trade dispute next week at a conference in Japan and after President Donald Trump threatened to impose tariffs on Mexican goods if the country doesn't slow the flow of immigrants traveling to the U.S.

"We recognize that it is serious," Censky told attendees at the AgriGrowth roundtable. "We know how important (trade) is for the wellbeing of agriculture overall and individual farming and ranching operations. We are very much committed to getting good trade deals, to resolving this, the trade barriers we have so we can succeed."

Roers works as public address announcer for RedHawks

Bob Roers, a 1981 graduate of Fergus Falls High School, relishes his role as public address announcer for the Fargo-Moorhead RedHawks baseball team. He has held this job since 2014.

"Baseball has always been a huge part of my family," Roers says. "Growing up with my three brothers, playing baseball is how we spent our summers. My dad, Dennis Roers, coached us and my mom, Irma, was always in the stands or in a lawn chair watching us."

The family moved from La Crosse, Wisconsin, to Fergus Falls in 1979, the high school sophomore year for Roers. They previously lived in Alexandria. He was a three-year baseball letter

winner for the Otters, later graduating from St. Cloud State University. Over the years, while working in sales in Seattle, Minneapolis and St. Cloud, he had an opportunity to keep himself close to sports media as a freelancer in production and play-by-play.

He moved to Fargo-Moorhead in 2001.

Roers, in addition to his RedHawks duties, is a territory manager for Dakota Supply Group's waterworks division in Fargo. He and his family reside in Moorhead.

"My wife, Patty, was a RedHawks season ticket holder their first season back in the mid-1990s," Roers said. "We at-

tended many baseball games at Newman Outdoor Field over the years, loving the atmosphere."

Roers began his professional career as a television sportscaster at WAOW-TV in Wausau, Wisconsin. He gained experience as a public address announcer for the Fargo Force junior hockey team starting in 2010.

"I had friends at Scheels Arena, where the Fargo Force play, who worked as part of the in-house production crew," he said. "They had those same duties with the RedHawks and I was contacted to fill in a few times during RedHawks games."

He took over as Red Hawks public

keep up with it."

Enter Alison Francis of United Way and their annual Day of Caring; With nine volunteers helping clear out weeds, overgrowth and debris in her yard and garden, Johnson can finally make use of her elevated planter beds and bring ducks back to her pond.

"Our group heard about it and just thought it would be a great way to give back to the community," said volunteer Becky Schwarzhoff. "Just knowing that when you help others you get something out of it as well." Her group of nine had been at Johnson's since around 9 a.m. and would be there until lunch time. If they finish early, they might move onto another location to help someone else who needs a hand.

Day of Caring is organized by United Way and sets groups of volunteers up with people in the community who need an extra hand doing yardwork like raking lawns, garden cleaning, hedge and tree trimming and window washing. This year, 10 volunteer groups went out to assist 11 private residences throughout Fergus Falls, as well as

public facilities Mud Pie Park, Someplace Safe Parenting Time Center and the community garden. Francis, who helped organize volunteers, says they've been doing Day of Caring, "for longer than we can remember," but she guesses about 12 years.

"It's in the spirit of helping people in the community and helping people who just need an extra

hand," she says. That includes senior citizens, military veterans and people with special circumstances, such as a recent illness or injury, that has made it difficult for them to do more strenuous outdoor chores. Some of the people they're helping, who are dealing with temporary setbacks, may feel inspired to pay it forward next year.

Looking over her

cleaned-up yard, Johnson's eyes well up with tears. "You don't know how horrible it was. It was just so beyond me that I thought, 'What am I going to do?' Now I can get into redoing it."

Day of Caring 2019 banked a total of about 225 volunteer hours from people like Schwarzhoff and her gracious group of volunteers. "They're my angels," said Johnson.
