The Northland Arboretum encompasses over 500 acres in the heart of Brainerd/Baxter, Minnesota. This member-supported, non-profit organization was founded with the closure of the Brainerd Landfill in 1972. Left untouched, the 40-acre landfill site now supports a prairie restoration project that is full of native grasses and plants. The Arboretum owns a beautiful Norway Pine Plantation on the north end of the expansive property and leases land from Crow Wing County behind the Westgate Mall. The Nature Conservancy owns nearly 200 acres within the Arboretum's boundaries – one of Minnesota's primary examples of Jack Pine Savanna!

Birding at the **** NORTHLAND ARBORETUM

With spring almost here it's time to think about how to make our homes and yards more bird friendly and attractive for our feathered friends. Many of our colorful songbirds will be arriving after a very long migration and they will be looking for areas to rest, recover and refuel. By providing the right foods and feeders and native plantings you can increase the number and variety of birds that will visit during the spring migration and even longer into the nesting season. Here is a short list of things to consider when "birdscaping" your home this spring and ways you can get involved at the Northland Arboretum to learn more about the birds in our area. Native Plantings:

Birdscaping is the combination of bird feeders and native planings to attract more birds. There are many native truiting tress and shrubs to choose from, I would highly recommend using native stock purchased locality. Why choose native plantings? Native plantings are more tolerable of the conditions such as the local climate and soil types. Very important to check for the hardiness zones on the tag or ask someone before purchasing. Over the years some of favorities that in now have planted in my own yard include; Mountain Ash, Cashapple, Elderberry, Arrowwood Viburum, Dogwood, Naking Cherry, and Serviceberry.



Each year millions of songbirds are killed each year by colliding into windows at homes or businesses in the United States. Many of the bird kills occur during the peak of the spring and fall bird migrations. Two main reasons why birds fly into glass, they see a reflection or by see through glass. Glass windows in a courtyrard often give the perception of 'see through' glass. What you can do at home, try streamers, hawk silhouettes, Close curtains' drapes, window decals and move feeders closer to the windows. New home construction can get screens that fit on the outside of the window or special glass. MN Backyard Birds worked "Bird Safe Homes" offering suggestions to protect birds from window collisions. Bird Seed/Bird Feeder:

Will make a big difference in the variety and number of binds you will attract. A big box store might offer a nice selection of eds but what is most important is the quality and freshness of that seed. If seed can go stale just like a loaf of bread and the birds will simply nore and move elsewhere for fresh food.

For spring feeding a menu of oranges, jelly, mealworms, suet and sugar water is great for our insect and fruit eating birds. MN Backyard Birds offers a very unique service that cleans and fills your bird feeders each week only using high quality fresh seed making your feeders the most active and attractive!

Bird Feeders: First decide what birds you want to attract to your home. Next remember you want to buy feeders that can be easily cleaned and maintained for the bird's health. A spring bird feeding station that includes an Oriole, Hummingbird, Mealwarm and Suef Keeder will certainly attract an ice variety of birds. A few products are now made from recycled milk containers and are very durable.
