Funds available to increase access to healthy foods

ST. PAUL, Minn - The Minnesota Department of Agriculture is now accepting grant applications from organizations offering assistance to improve access to fresh, affordable, nutritious and culturally appropriate for foods underserved communities.

The funding is available through the Good Food Access Program (GFAP). These grants will help provide organizations needs-based technical assistance to eligible food retailers, such as grocery stores, corner stores and farmers markets.

Nonprofit organizations and public agencies with capabilities to provide technical assistance may apply.

Grocers and other retailers receiving technical assistance must serve people in food deserts or underserved primarily communities in low- and moderate-income areas.

The MDA will award up to \$50,000 in this round of GFAP Technical Assistance

Applicants may request up to \$50,000 and grant funds can cover up to 75 percent of project costs.

Grant applications are due by 4 p.m. on Jan. 16,

Lancaster School invests money in CD

Over the last two years, the Lancaster School has invested money into a certificate of deposit, or CD. The interest earned has helped cover expenses, such as a coach's salary. During a regular school board meeting on Wednesday, Oct. 16, Superintendent Shannon Hunstad said two years ago the school invested \$300,000 and last year, invested \$400,000. He suggested, with support from Business Manager Mendy Coffield, that they put \$500,000 into

"We might as well have our money work for us a little bit," Hunstad said. Thoughts on that? Or a dollar amount?"

The board agreed, having reviewed the audit and budget, that the school should invest \$500,000 at Border Bank, which offers a 2 percent interest.

· Heard the school will receive \$6,086.02 in Safe Schools Supplement Aid money at the end of October. It will help pay for securing the outside doors by the cafeteria and east gymnasium. The money may also help pay for new intercoms.

Lancaster Fire Department awarded \$5K through Bayer Grain for Good Sweepstakes

"We're a really small community and rely on donations to make these purchases. That's why I nominated the Lancaster Volunteer Fire Department to receive a donation through the Grain for Good Sweepstakes."

The Lancaster Volunteer Fire Department is comprised of 27 members and serves more than 800 residents in the area.

On average, the department responds to 30 to 40 calls per year, primarily car accidents, structure fires and grass fires. Lancaster Volunteer Fire Department Chief Casey Faken said the Grain for Good donation will be used toward acquiring new personal protective equipment.

We want all of the members to have to best gear out there," said Faken. "With this donation, we will be able to buy two full sets of National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) turnout gear, the main form of personal protective equipment for firefighter safety, as well as air packs and face masks. This gear helps keep us safe on the front lines and provides protection against cancer-causing agents that firefighters are exposed to."

This is the second year of the Grain for Good Sweepstakes, which began in 2018. In total, the Bayer Cereal Experts have donated \$100,000 to 20 cereal growers throughout the country.
