'I thought I was checking out'

Marshall resident shares his fight with COVID-19 virus

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oe Warnke remembers June 13 as the day he grabbed a tablet and started to write down information for his obituary. "I thought I was checking out," he said one month after recovering from the COVID-19 virus and quarantining in his Marshall home.

That was also the day Warnke called the Avera hotline set up for people who have been exposed to COVID-19 or

have symptoms. Warnke was following the instructions released by Avera on the hotline: "Anyone who thinks they might have COVID-19 should call before going to the clinic or Emergency Department to protect staff and other patients.

Warnke started feeling poorly on June 1 and was experiencing respiratory issues the rest of the week. He decided to get tested for the COVID-19 virus on June 5 and he received a call on June 7 that he was positive.

Warnke is not sure where he contracted the virus. He wore a face mask

while working as a security guard at Turkey Valley Farms in Marshall, but he didn't wear one when shopping or at other public areas. He was among 25 people who received positive test results in Lyon County that weekend.

Throughout his ordeal, Warnke claims he never experienced a fever, but struggled to breathe. He likened his coughing episodes to the croup, which also obstructs breathing.

"My breathing was a little worse and then my energy went," he said. "I mean

Lyon Co. Board hears funding request for treatment center

Local counselor proposes residential mental health facility for children

MARSHALL — Mental health resources are an important need for children and families in southwest Minnesota, Jerry Bottelberghe said. But for kids and youth who need residential treatment, placements are hard to come by — they may end up having to travel to facilities far away or even out of state.

Bottelberghe, a licensed professional counselor in Minneota, is leading a project to add a new option in the area. The goal would be to build a 15-bed residential facility for children ages 6 to 13, he told Lyon County commissioners.

"The big stumbling block now is looking for funding," Bottelberghe said.
"I'm asking, would the county be interested in supporting this project?"

In a presentation to commissioners on Tuesday, Bottelberghe outlined the plan for the facility, which would be called A Caring Place, according to a written proposal the county board received.

While commissioners said they supported the idea of having more mental health treatment options in the region, they wanted more operational and financial details before they would consider contributing funding to the project.

Bottelberghe said he has worked with both children and teens in his counseling practice, and discovered "there was a great need in this part of Minnesota" for access to residential mental health treat-

Open car trunk for 10 free apples at Hy-Vee parking lot

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MARSHALL — From Galesburg, Ill., to the Twin Cities in Minnesota, Hy-Vee has been giving away fruit by the thousands. Today will be Marshall's

In partnership with its fruit supplier (Stemilt) the Hy-Vee store located on East Main Street will be giving away more than 3,800 apples to customers with a contactless, drive-thru event starting at 10 a.m. and will continue until noon, or while supplies last. MN lawmakers pass police accountability package

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The Minnesota Legislature passed a broad slate of police accountability measures early Tuesday that includes a ban on neck restraints like the one that was used on George Floyd before his death in Minneapolis.

The package also bans chokeholds and so-called warrior-style training, which critics say promotes excessive force. It imposes a duty to intercede on officers who see a colleague using excessive force. It changes rules on the

use of force to stress the sanctity of life. It makes changes in arbitration rules affecting police unions. Officers will get more training on dealing with people with mental health issues and autism. The measure also creates a new advisory council for the state board that licenses officers.

"This is a really a great bill, but it is only a first step," Democratic House Speaker Melissa Hortman, of Brooklyn Park, said at a
