Local citizens ready to follow governor's lead

Minnesota Gov. Tim Walz wants everyone in the Gopher State to wear masks to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

On Wednesday, Walz signed Executive Order 20-81 requiring people to wear a face-covering in indoor businesses and indoor public settings beginning on Saturday.

The order puts Minnesota in company with 30 other states across the country, Puerto Rico and Washington, D.C.

There were only 18 active cases of the coronavirus in Otter Tail County on Thursday out of the 47,457 known cases in the state. Walz has announced some exceptions to the order. Individuals with a medical condition, a mental health condition or a disability that makes it unreasonable to maintain a face covering are exempt from the

rule. Children who are 5 years of age and younger are also exempt.

The goal of the executive order is voluntary compliance. Any individual who willfully violates the order will be guilty of a petty misdemeanor and upon conviction can be punished with a fine not to exceed \$100. Businesses willfully violating the order are guilty of a misdemeanor and can be hit with a 90-day jail sentence or a fine not to exceed \$1,000.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO) the number of COVID-19 cases worldwide on Tuesday was 15,013,275.

Recently, Otter Tail County suffered extensive property damage and loss of life as a result of four tornadoes in a single day. As the county recovers from this disaster, it seeks to identify ways it can continue to prepare for future tornadoes and other natural disasters.

The Otter Tail County Office of Emergency Management is working with U-Spatial at the University of Minnesota Duluth to update the county's multihazard mitigation plan (MHMP). The plan assesses the natural hazards that pose risk to the county, such as tornadoes, straightline winds, ice storms, blizzards, wildfire, flooding, and extreme temperatures and identifies ways to minimize the damage of future events. As the county works to update the plan, it wants to hear from the public.

The Otter Tail County MHMP is a multijurisdictional plan that covers Otter Tail County, including the cities of Battle Lake, Bluffton, Clitherall, Dalton, Deer Creek, Dent, Elizabeth, Erhard, Fergus Falls, Henning, New York Mills, Ottertail, Parkers Prairie, Pelican Rapids, Perham, Richville, Underwood, Urbank, Vergas and Vining. The plan additionally covers the portions of the cities of Rothsay and Wadena that are located within Otter Tail County. The Otter Tail County MHMP also incorporates concerns and needs of townships, school districts and other stakeholders participating in the plan. The plan will be updated by

Young artists look to support each other

Artists are among one of the most impacted groups of people during the COVID-19 pandemic as concerts and theater performances are canceled, museums and galleries closed and residencies are postponed or canceled. While many artist aid funds have popped up locally and nationally, including the Springboard for the Arts Coronavirus Emergency Relief Fund, University of Minnesota Morris senior Evan Aanerud saw a gap where some artists weren't getting access to the financial, professional and emo-

tional help they needed.

"One thing that I saw when I was applying to relief funds was that a lot of them were really inaccessible for young people," Aanerud, who grew up in Fergus Falls, said. "They had requirements like you had to be in a union, or you had to have 5-10 years of professional work experience, or you had to make a certain percentage of income from your art, and those are all things that young people don't really have."

Aanerud took it upon himself to fill that gap, contacting friends he'd worked with
