Cougars field a deeper, more confident lineup

The Carlos Cougars baseball team stuck right with one of the best teams in the Resorters League through seven innings on Sunday afternoon.

The Osakis Hawks (2-0) broke out with five runs in the top of the eighth inning in a 10-3 win for the Hawks, but the way the Cougars played through much of the game is what player/manager Clarke Comer believes this team is capable of this summer.

"The depth is a huge plus for us compared to last year," Comer said. "We added two pitchers, so that will be huge. We subtracted a different pitcher, and we lost a lockdown center fielder. We lost our catcher, so up the middle we're trying to figure things out. But this is a group of guys who played together, and I think it should be a fun

Much of the Cougars' roster is made up of players from Alexandria. Kyle Schaible started on the mound on Sunday and gave Carlos five good innings.

He left with his team within one run at 3-2 after allowing three unearned runs. Those came in the third inning when an error at short allowed two runs to score, and a wild pitch brought in another run with two outs.

"There were a few errors, but that's ama-teur baseball," Comer said. "Last year, it was a lot of throwing errors, which was irritating. This year, we're keeping the ball in front of ourselves. Now it's just figuring out who fits together and the pieces in the lineup."

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"I know up in Fergus Falls, they've been up between 120-140 cars a night," Anderson said.

Anderson has talked with other track owners to see how they have done things amidst the pandemic to follow guidelines and create a safe environment for workers and fans.
