High school leagues in Iowa release fall sports COVID-19 guidelines

The Iowa High School Athletic Association and the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union released their guidelines Wednesday afternoon for the start of the fall sports season.

Iowa's fall sports include football, volleyball, boys' and girls' cross country, boys' golf and girls' swimming and diving. The two governing organizations released sport-specific guidelines as well as a general protocol for all sports.

In the general guidance release, the IHSAA and IGHSAU stated all schools, regardless of the Return to Learn plans, are eligible to participate in both leagues' sports programs. The decision on

teams to play will rest solely with the local school districts. Should a school district elect not to participate in

whether or not to allow

certain sports, students within that district will have two options if they still want to participate. According to a press release, those options in-

clude the school district opting into a cooperative sharing agreement with another district that is offering the sport. However, this may jeopardize the host school's postseason eligibility if the combined enrollment moves the host school to the next enrollment class.

The other option is for students in a district not offering the sport they are

offers. Many of the sanitizing and social distancing guidelines remain in place from the baseball and softball seasons. Any equipment that is shared by student-athletes should be sanitized before and after games and prac-Student-athletes are also encouraged to frequently sanitize their hands before, during and after practices and competitions.

Concession stands will still be closed as of the start of the season.

Schools will also implement spectator protocols based on the recommendations and guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control as well as the local health departments regarding the size of the gatherings and social distancing.

Spectators should maintain six feet of social distancing, with families allowed to sit together but still social distancing from others. Frequent reminders should be made via public address.

Schools may also require spectators to wear masks.

Locker rooms and training rooms will also be available for use, so long as social distancing of six feet and frequent sanitation guidelines are met.

New Albert Lea Art Center exhibit to feature series on popular Surf Ballroom in Clear Lake

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Surf Ballroom is coming to Albert Lea.

Jaclyn Garlock will display her larger-than-life acrylic paintings — one is 6 1/2 feet by 11 feet — depicting scenes in and around Clear Lake's historic rock 'n' roll landmark as The Albert Lea Art Center's first show since the COVID-19 pandemic forced the center to shut down earlier tnis year.

Garlock has been painting with acrylics since about 2000, and said her first acrylic show was at the former Art Center in 2001. Prior to that she worked in serigraphy — or silkscreen printing — for many years, before she had to give it up after the chemicals started giving her bad headaches. While she wishes she could have delved into oil painting — a medium that also involves harsh chemicals — and misses creating serigraphs, she has created detailed work with vivid color palettes

through acrylics. She has painted a number of different series, including "Working Girls," which Garlock described as paintings showing "extraordinary women doing ordinary things." She tends to create her paintings from photographs she has

either taken or staged. Now Garlock, a Clear Lake resident, has turned her focus to Surf Ballroom, which has seen the likes of everyone from The Everly Brothers, Roy Orbison and Little Richard to Alice Cooper, Santana, BB King and Lynyrd Skynyrd, among many others. The venue also hosted Buddy Holly, Ritchie Valens and The Big Bopper in February 1959 in what ended up being the last time the three musicians would perform; they died in a plane crash following the performance.

Garlock knows the current Surf Ballroom owners, who she said purchased the venue in 1994 — "They really brought it back to life," she said. Garlock helped work on the pineapple stenciling in

the lobby of the building. Turning the focus of this series to the ballroom just made sense.

"You paint what you know, paint where you live," she said. "What a fun thing to paint.'

While an artist through and through, Garlock said it's the finished work that motivates her.

"I've never been much of a process person," she said. "I like the result."

Originally Garlock was scheduled to display her Surf Ballroom series in line with Albert Lea's Eddie Cochran Days in June, but the coronavirus pandemic put

both events on hold. Art Center Artistic Director Beth Tostenson said she kept in touch with Garlock, wanting to make sure the series would still come to Albert Lea, and said it's

"After four months, we're finally opening the Art Center," Tostenson

"We're just really excited to have (Garlock's) show," she continued. "Her art is just wonderful.'

"I'm really excited to be here," Garlock said. "It's what I do.'

The Art Center's hours will be from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesdays and Fridays for the time being, Tostenson said. Those wishing to make an appointment to visit the Art Center outside of those hours can contact her at 507-481-4025. Masks and social distancing will be required inside the building, which will have a 30person maximum. There will be no gallery opening
