## Family of fatal crash victim seeks support for highway changes

Lat week Aimee Rogers came to a startling realization as she rode the bus on the first day of school.

"I realized every single day for the rest of my school year I have to sit in a seat and drive right past where my brother had the accident," Aimee said.

She was referring to the August 21 crash in which her brother, 17-year-old Ian Rogers, was killed when hit by a car on Highway 25 while riding his bike to his home in the Kjellberg mobile home

Aimee and her mother Christina 'Kiki" Rogers appeared before the Monticello City Council Monday, Sept. 10 to ask for the City's support in petitioning MnDOT to make changes to the stretch of Highway 25 that has now claimed two lives.

At 11:30 p.m. on Aug. 21, Christina and her husband were awoken by a loud knock on their door.

"At first, we thought it was our son Ian, because being 17, we knew he was out that evening," she said. "But he was supposed to be home by 10."

The Rogers were surprised when they opened their door.

"We found four sheriff's (deputies) there asking to speak to us," Christina

## Lockout ends for power plant security supervisors

Security shift leaders at Xcel Energy's Monticello nuclear power plant will be returning to work on Monday, Sept. 9.

The United Security Professionals Local 2 has come to a 3-year agreement with G4S, the firm that provides security workers at the power plant under conreached early Friday, Sept. 6.

The workers were locked out by their employer, G4S at 12:01 a.m. on Septem-

According to Local 2 President Josh Haider, members of Local 2 and G4S have a temporary 16-day agreement in

place that will allow the 25-30 union members to vote on the proposed 3-year contract in the next two weeks.

The agreement was announced at 8:10 a.m., about 45 minutes before a Local 2 press conference where area lawmakers were scheduled to support the security supervisors employed by Xcel Energy security subcontractor G4S.

Instead, the press conference was a celtract to XCel Energy. The agreement was ebratory affair where union members announced they would be returning to their jobs at 5:40 a.m. Monday, Sept. 9 with their insurance benefits intact. Insurance was the main sticking point in contract negotiations between Local 2 members


