
County to dole out a share of **CARES** money

Local businesses, nonprofits must apply by Sept. 15

Money the county received through the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act will be distributed to local businesses and nonprofit organizations that have

suffered expenditures or losses related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Jack-



of federal Eigenberg funding totals \$1.26 million. County commissioners have set aside \$700,000 of that for small businesses and local nonprofits. A business or nonprofit that has experienced losses in revenue or a spike in expenses as a consequence of the pandemic may apply

for funds. "Organizations with eligible losses are able to apply and get up to \$5,000 in grants each," said economic development coordinator Chris Giesen of Chatfield-based Community and Economic Development Associates, who the county has tabbed to help disburse the funds. "We're encouraging everyone to at least take a look at it, especially if they have seen losses."

One stipulation of the grant program is funds cannot be put toward expenses already covered by other government funds.

"The big thing is that they can't double dip," Giesen said. "We can't fund the same expense twice.'

CEDA is working with the county to administer the funds and will oversee the distribution program


"The county is urging folks to contact CEDA for guidance on the application process rather than the county," said Jackson County Coordinator Steve Duncan. "What people will hear from the county is, 'Contact CEDA.'" Duncan said county offi-

cials are keenly interested in the response to the program from businesses and nonprofits and added more money may be on the table if demand outstrips supply. "If demand is greater,

then there is more money that the county may discuss," Duncan said. In addition to overseeing the grant program, CEDA

will also handle marketing and applications, Giesen

TEACHING TEACHERS

Program aims to connect college faculty with high school educators

Nearly 25 high school agriculture and tech-ed teachers from across the state were in Jackson last week getting a crash course in small engines, welding and energy from the experts at Minnesota West Community and Technical College.

The teachers-turnedstudents — ranging from a first-year rookie to a 41-year-veteran — spent three days in Jackson listening to college-level instructors, getting hands-on lab experience and networking with each other. The pilot training program was a joint effort of Mn-West and the Minnesota Centers for Excellence.

Local real estate market stays hot

Lack of housing causing concern

Jackson County's real estate market has stayed hot through the COIVID-19 pandemic, with low interest rates and an abundance of buyers making it a good time for those considering selling their homes to do so.

That was true before the state-imposed lockdowns, and remains true now.

"Last January, February and March was the best quarter I've had in 15

years," said Bull Market Realty broker Scott Bahr. "We had 14 sales pending."

April and May were slow for the agency, but summer brought with it new buyers looking to snap up homes.

Bahr's biggest problem? A lack of housing stock. "In Jackson and

Lakefield, there's not a lot of housing left," Bahr said. "Supply is tough right now."

Lee Porter, who runs Exit Realty's Jackson branch, said the hot market has his agency setting records too.

"Two-thousand-nineteen was a record year for us," See **REALESTATE** on **A3**

Primary election sees higher local turnout

Voter turnout in last week's primary election was up in Jackson County.

Jackson County Auditor-Treasurer Kevin Nordquist, the county's top election official, reported a voter turnout of 22.9 percent, an improvement over recent years.
