# Making the most of the cold at Bloomington ski jump

Ski jumpers assembled from not only Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois but also New York and Europe to test their skills on the 70 meter Bush Lake ski jump Sunday as part of USA Nordic's Five Hills Tour.

Competitors were in Eau Claire, Wisconsin Friday and Saturday for the 134th annual Silver Mine Invitational before heading to Bloomington to earn valuable tour points and more.

Some skiers practiced earlier in the week before heading to Wisconsin. Event organizer Chris Broz with the Minneapolis Ski Club said the hill was in ideal shape given the cold conditions. The


excess snowfall wasn't an issue as Broz and the maintenance crew were able to push the snow around the hill with a grooming machine.

"We just kept shoveling it off," Broz said. "But the event continues to grow each year and we had more of a festival atmosphere at the base jump."

Fans took advantage of even more food trucks this season, plus fire rings throughout the base and the chalet offered a place to warm up as temperatures hovered around 10 degrees.

A shuttle service allowed traffic to move freely around the area as fans parked in a nearby office tower parking ramp.

# PLACE cancels Via Luna project amid controversy

# The nonprofit developer claims that it had 'a more difficult approval path than for-profit projects for the wealthy'

PLACE's Via Luna project proved to be a moonshot that never got off the ground.

For more than six years, the non-

profit developer has pitched various versions of a development along the Southwest Light Rail Transit line in St. Louis Park. However, development rights for a southern half of the plan called Via Luna, or via the moon, expired at the end of 2019.

As recently as last October, the Minneapolis-based developer had proposed a scaled-back version of the Via Luna plan. The proposed amendment had called for a residential building to be relocated to the corner of Wooddale Avenue and West 36th Street,

with the number of residential units in it reduced from more than 80 units to 50 units. A planned hotel would have been reduced from six stories to five

# Wild take it outdoors for practice, announce Winter Classic

There couldn't have been a better time to announce the second outdoor game for the Minnesota Wild than during the lone public outdoor practice of the season.

About 1,500 Wild fans watched on as the team took to the outdoor rink at the St. Louis Park Rec Center, known as the ROC, for the team's thirdannual outdoor practice.

Fans lined both sides of the walkway from the locker room to the ice in hopes of a quick highfive or after the practice an autograph or stick as players took time to interact with the fans during the only outdoor hockey opportunity this season.

In addition to the outdoor practice, the franchise formally announced that the Winter Classic will come to Target Field on Jan. 1, 2021 against a yet-to-be-announced opponent.

The marquee game on the NHL schedule, the event will be part of the 20th anniversary season for when NHL hockey returned to Minnesota

There are several compelling cases to be made for the opposing team, including the Dallas Stars (formerly known as the Minnesota North Stars), Winnipeg Jets (budding rivalry), Chicago Blackhawks (historic rivals with Minnesota hockey and the 2016 Stadium Series success), Columbus Bluejackets (entered the NHL along with the

Wild in 2000) or New York Islanders (several Minnesota natives on the roster including Edina's Anders Lee, Eden Prairie's Nick Leddy and Warroad's Brock Nelson and might draw a national audience).

### **Winter Classic** announcement

Wild President Matt Majka was joined by Minnesota Twins President and CEO Dave St. Peter and other dignitaries to formally announce the next Winter Classic will be coming to Target Field in Minneapolis and include the Minnesota Wild.

This will be the second outdoor game for the Wild after a highly successful 2016 NHL Stadium Series game against the Chicago Blackhawks. The Wild won 6-1 in front of a crowd of 50,426 at TCF Bank Stadium. Minnesota had goals from Matt Dumba, Thomas Vanek, Nino Niederreiter, Jason Pominville, Ryan Carter and Erik Haula. Haula received the No. 1 Star of the Game.

The ice condition and consistency is a huge component to the experience to make it just right, given the constantly changing conditions. Target Field head groundskeeper Larry DiVito was in Dallas to see first-hand how the crew worked on the Cotton Bowl in Dallas for this year's Winter Classic between the Stars and Nashville.

St. Peter said he's met with Majka on a nearly monthly basis over the

last decade about the opportunity to bring an NHL game to the Twins ballpark.

Wild defenseman Ryan Suter said his first experience in the outdoor game at TCF Bank Stadium was awesome and is excited to have a chance to do it again.

"Once you come into the stadium and see all of the fans cheering loud, it was a special experience and we know people in Minnesota love hockey,' said Suter, who grew up with the opportunity to skate on a frozen lake in Madison, Wisconsin. Those were great memories and it makes you appreciate it even more.

He said the opportunity to host the Winter Classic


is overdue for the State of Hockey. "I feel like everyone has some type of hockey background here and the people of Minnesota deserve this game."
