Council urges governor to reopen state

The Jackson City Council is urging Gov. Tim Walz to lift the statewide stay-athome order and allow restaurants, hair salons and other places of public accommodation to reopen as quickly as possible.

Council members last week unanimously approved a resolution supporting Jackson businesses and urging the governor to expedite the reopening of Minnesota's economy in a manner that "better balances economic and public health needs." Approval of

the resolution came at the request of a group of Jackson business owners who told the council they cannot hang on much longer under

the governor's current set of executive orders.

"On March 16, our world was shuttered," said Rebecca Nestegard, owner of the Coffee Nest in downtown Jackson, referring to the date Walz ordered her business and others closed in an attempt to stem the spread of the virus that causes COVID-19. County's rate of new cases slows

Fourteen have recovered: 19 remain active

After two weeks of exponential growth, the rate at which new lab-confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Jackson County are being confirmed slowed this past week.

As of Tuesday, the county had recorded 33 lab-confirmed cases of the disease, up just eight from last Tuesday. That comes after a tripling and quadrupling of case numbers the two weeks prior.

Kelsey Andrews, public health director and community health administrator with Des Moines Valley Health and Human Services, reported Tuesday 14 of the county's 33 lab-confirmed cases have recovered; 19 cases remain active. To date, none of the confirmed cases in the county has required hospitalization.

The number of confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Jackson County quadrupled
