Hancock football falls in nine-man championship

Hancock came up one game short of its first-ever prep bowl championship Saturday, Nov. 30, at US Bank Stadium in Minneapolis. The Owls led 14-0 early in the second quarter, but fell to Mountain Lake 22-14 for a runner-up finish.

Hancock defense forced Mountain Lake 0-3 in its first three possessions of the game. The Owls had two interceptions and a fumble recovery in the first half, in which they capitalized on two of the three turnovers. After a fumble recovered by Brandon Kellenberger late in the first quarter, Hancock drove 79 yardson 13 plays to take the lead. Preston Rohloff found Daniel Milander for a five-yard touchdown pass.

On the next possession, sophomore Matt Thompson picked off Mountain Lake's Abraham Stoesz and ran 32 yards for a pick six. Hancock went ahead 14-0 after a Rohloff to Kellenberger two-point conversion.

Down 14-0, the Wolverines

offense put together two short drives to tie the game at 14-14 at halftime. Mountain Lake went 65 yards on just five plays for its first score then after Hancock turned the ball over on downs, the Wolverines had a short field and went 24 yards in eight plays to tie the game after a two-point conversion.

Hancock opened the third quarter by grinding out a 40yard drive that chewed up 5:45 of the clock before stalling out at the Mountain Lake 25-yard line. Mountain Lake went ahead 22-14 on its next drive of 75 yards in 13 plays while draining the clock to just 42 seconds in the third quarter.

The Owls had a chance to score again late in the game, but failed to convert a fourth-andnine. That turnover on downs gave the ball back to Mountain Lake with 3:18 left in regulation, and Mountain Lake was able to drain the clock to claim its first prep bowl championship after converting a fourth-and-short.

Hancock senior Tyler Timmerman was held to 89 yards on 19 carries and also added three catches for 21 yards. Preston Rohloff finished 10-for-18 for 87 yards passing. Brandon Kellenberger had four of those catches for 34 yards.

Kellenberger had 13 tackles to lead the Owl defense. Jed Feuchtenberger had nine tackles and dalton Rose finished with seven.

The Owls finished the 2019 season 13-1 and graduate six seniors off their roster this spring: Dalton Rose, Daniel Milander, Gideon Joos, Tyler Timmerman, Colton Crowell and Parker Schmidgall. Mountain Lake 22
