

Animal shelter plans advance

Nonprofit group being formed to run countywide pound facility

The plan is the product of a month-long effort by a committee headed by Jeff Gay, a member of

the Jackson City Council. Over the course of several meetings, committee members discussed numerous options for animal control, Gay said, including implementing a trap-neuter-vaccinaterelease program, though the conversation always seemed to return to the need for an animal shel-

"There is no clear fix, but there can be a solution to manage the issue by having a place in our county to bring the animals, house them and prepare them for adoption," Gay said.

Gay said Jackson County is the only county in southwestern Minnesota without any type of animal shelter. Most area shelters are owned and operated by nonprofit entities, he said. To that end, articles of incorporation have been filed with the Minnesota Sec-

County's bridge situation better

Six more will be addressed in '20

The bridge situation in Jackson County is better.

A lot better, in fact. That's the word from Jackson County Engineer Tim Stahl, who said, at present, Jackson County has no noncompliant bridges or fracture-crit ical bridges within its ratings. At the time, Jackboundaries.

"That's the first time in a while," Stahl said of the fact.

That's a marked improvement from just five years ago, when a study of U.S. Federal Highway Administration data conducted by Transportation for America found around 7.5 percent of bridges in the county were "structurally deficient," a federal classification for bridges not


More than 14% in compliance as deadline looms

Locals planning to apply for a REAL ID or enhanced driver's license or identification card ahead of this year's deadline to do so should be prepared to bring a lot more documentation with them and to spend a little more time at the county driver's license office than normal.

That's the word from Betty Hunt, Jackson County driver's license official, who said more and more locals are becoming REAL ID-ready as an Oct. 1 deadline approaches. Beginning that day, Minnesota residents will be required to have a REAL ID or enhanced driver's license or ID card to fly within the United States or enter federal buildings, unless they are in possession of a passport or other acceptable form of identification.

"Applying for a REAL ID takes a bit longer than applying for a standard driver's license," Hunt said. "People applying for one should allot a bit more time. And applying for an enhanced license or ID card

-an acceptable North American border-crossing document — takes just a bit longer beyond that, as there is one more form that needs to be completed.'

Much of that extra time requirement is due to the need to copy more reauired documents, Hunt said. Among documents required to be provided at time of application are one proving identity, date of birth and legal presence in the United States; one proving Social Security number; and two

proving current residency in Minnesota. Hunt said applicants may also be required to present additional documentation related to name changes. Documents must be original or certified by the agency that issued them, she added.

While a number of local applicants have been tripped up by the new document requirements, Hunt said, she cannot pinpoint one dominant document issue.
