After winning three national championships as a coach with the University of Minnesota, Brooks was hired as the head coach of the Olympic team. He would go on to coach in the NHL as well as winning a silver medal in the 2002 Olympics. Brooks died in a Minnesota car accident in 2003. After winning three

In October, Pavelich was found unfit for trial and a danger to himself and others, and ordered placed in super-vised psychiatric care. Satur-day will mark the 40th anniday will mark the 40th anni-versary of the U.S. team's victory over the Soviet Union at Lake Placid, a 4–3 victory in which Pavelich had two assists. His former teammates remain dedicated to their friend. Buzz Schneider, Billy Baker and Mike Ramsey were

among those who visited him

"With us, he's great. He's the same Mark I know," said Schneider, who played along-side center Pavelich and John Harrington on coach Herb

Brooks' famous "Coneheads" line. "But there are some things he's got to take care of. He gave me a big hug." An All-American at Minnesota-Duluth, Pavelich played briefly overseas before finally getting a chance at the NHL when Brooks was made head coach of the New York Rangers. In his first three NHL seasons, he had 99 goals, 134 assists and was a plus-50. A fellow Iron Ranger, Schneider said Pavelich was his favorite center to play with.

"I liked all the centers I played with ... but they were more north-south centers," Schneider said. "Mark was Schneider said. "Mark was creative, going down the ice almost like an artist, and he used to tell me, 'Buzz, don't worry about it, just get in

front of the net and I'll put it

front of the net and I'll put it on your stick.'

"We keyed off what he was doing, so it was easy for us."
Charges against Pavelich would be dismissed three years after the date he was found incompetent, unless the Cook County Attorney's Office files written notice of an intent to prosecute.
Pavelich's family has started a gofundme.com page to establish a foundation to help former hockey players struggling with brain injuries.
"He was a great teammate and a really good person," Eruzione said, "and unfortunately there's been some issues in his mental health and his health in general. We hope he finds what he needs."
