Huskies pummel Panthers in season opener

The Jackson County Central football team took advantage of an early miscue by New Richland-Hartland-Ellendale-Geneva and never relinquished control in a 46-0 seasonopening win last Thursday in Jackson.

The Panthers fumbled the opening kickoff and JCC scored four plays later and then added two more first-quarter touchdowns in the dominant win.

"We looked sharp," head coach Tom Schuller said. "We're experienced; we're supposed to look sharp."

Voss breaks record, scores twice early

After Will Freking recovered a fumble on the opening kickoff, the Huskies wasted little time putting points on the board.

A 6-yard completion from Voss to Trevin Gaustad gave Voss two completions for the game and a school-record 232 for his career (see sidebar on B5).

Five plays later, Voss was in the end zone again, this time on a 24-yard run after following the blocks of linemen Sam Dunker and Keldon Bennett and sneaking into the corner of the end zone ahead of a defender.

Melissa Evans placed 72nd and Holly Shearer 75th.

BULLET SPIKERS OPEN WITH WIN OVER JAYS

25 years ago, Sept. 8, 1994 - Lakefield Standard The Heron Lake-Okabena-Lakefield volleyball team opened the season with a 3-1 win over Jackson. The Blue Jays won the first game 15-10, but the Silver Bullets won the next three 15-11, 15-8 and 15-9. The Bullets took a big lead each of the final three games and held off any Blue Jay rally. Katy Madsen had 20 ace spikes and Lindsay Voss had 14 ace spikes. Sue Resch had 11 ace spikes off the bench. Jenny Prochaska served 12 points and Michelle Hummel and Suzann Ford each served nine.

Thursday, September 5, 2019 Sports Three inducted into Jackson Racing Hall of fame

A trio of men were inducted into the Jackson Racing Hall of Fame during a ceremony Saturday afternoon near the Jackson Motorplex.

Enshrined this year were Guy Forbrook, Jason Krohn and Jerry Richert Jr.

Fourth hall of fame induction for Forbrook

Forbrook was born into a racing family. His father, Dick, was a successful driver whose own career was finishing just as Guy was coming of age. Forbrook wheeled a sprint car to more than a dozen victories in 1984-1985 at various tracks, including in Jackson; Fairmont; Rock Rapids, Iowa; and even five in a row at Huset's Speedway in Brandon, S.D.

Forbrook was quickly making a name for himself in the racing community when a passenger car accident would forever change the path he would take in racing. The accident caused a significant spinal cord injury.

Following the accident, Forbrook stayed away from racing for more than a year when Ron Kohls "dragged him out of the house" and convinced Forbrook to come to a sprint car race. Kohls and Forbrook would soon put together their own team and the Forbrook 5 was born.

Forbrook has put together an impressive career over the past 30 years. He is best known for his success at Knoxville, including 87 victories and 11 track championships, but a quick browse through his career stats finds more than 270 feature wins at 63 different race tracks, with drivers such as Steve Kinser, Sammy Swindell, Danny Lasoski, Jac Haudenschild, Terry McCarl, Tim Kaeding, Jeff Shepard — a virtual who's who in racing. An amazing career for an amazing driver, mechanic and car owner.

Forbrook's induction into the Jackson Racing Hall of Fame goes alongside his inductions into the Knoxville Raceway Hall of Fame in 2009, the National Sprint Car Hall of Fame in 2017 and Huset's Speedway Hall of Fame in 2018.

The 1988 season was the start of a long and successful career as a mechanic, crew chief and car owner. Jerry Richert Jr. began the season with three victories before Lasoski took over driving duties, forming a partnership that would forever change the landscape of sprint car racing in the Midwest. Lasoski and Forbrook won an astonishing 54 races in just their first two years together, including track championships at both Knoxville, Iowa, and Huset's, and had victories against the World of Outlaws and All-Star Circuit of Champions.

In 1991, there was the first split of the Lasoski/Forbrook combination when Forbrook hired Jac Haudenschild to pilot the now-famous Forbrook 5. Haudenschild went on to win 14 times on the way to Forbrook's third Knoxville Raceway track championship. The 1992-1993 seasons saw Lasoski back behind the wheel for another two dominating years. The duo combined for 47 more victories, two Knoxville Raceway track championships, a third Huset's Speedway track championship and wins across the country from California to Ohio. Despite all their success, the two split again

McCarl piloted the Forbrook 5 to five wins before Johnny Herrera took over in 1995. Herrera and Forbrook won 25 features, including that year's Jackson County Fair Outlaw Sprint special. That year Forbrook also picked up his sixth Knoxville title. Lasoski was once again back in 1996 for another 21 feature wins on their way to Forbrook's seventh Knoxville track championship.

Haudenschild and the World of Outlaws came calling in 1997 in Jack Elden's famous Pennzoil 22. Forbrook and Haudenschild won six times together before Forbrook joined forces with Steve Kinser in July of 1998, following Scott Gerkin's departure as crew chief. Kinser visited victory lane eight times with Forbrook through the end of the 1998 season on their way to the World of Outlaws championship.

The next year found Forbrook back at Knoxville with McCarl again in the cockpit. They found more success than their previous attempt, scoring 12 victories on their way to Forbrook's eighth Knoxville Raceway track title and his fourth at Huset's Speedway. Forbrook teamed up with Jimmy Vassar in 2000 to take on the World of Outlaws with Greg Hodnett behind the wheel of the No. V12. Hodnett won

twice before an injury sidelined him in April, with Tyler Walker taking over the driving duties to finish the year.

In 2001, Jeff Shepard drove the Forbrook 5 to five World of Outlaws victories before Haudenschild took over in 2002 for three more World of Outlaw wins, Following a couple lean years, Swindell drove the Forbrook 5 in 2005-2006 for eight victories together, including three World of Outlaw wins at Eldora.

In 2008, Lasoski was back and the duo won five more times on their way to Forbrook's ninth Knoxville Raceway championship. Dennis Roth hired Forbrook in 2009 with Kaeding piloting the Roth Motorsports 83. They won nine races together. The next five seasons would find Forbrook working with Erin Crocker, JD Johnson, Mark Dobmeier and Craig Dollansky with some success, but nothing like he was used to.

Both he and Lasoski had experienced some down years leading up to 2015, but their careers were jump started when they once again joined forces. This time it was with owner Tod Quiring. They won 13 races on their way to the inaugural National Sprint League championship and Forbrook's 10th Knoxville track championship. The 2016 season was much of the same as he and Lasoski won their second NSL championship and his 11th Knoxville Raceway track title, pushing Lasoski and Forbrook's career victory totals to an astonishing 149 victories together.

Three track titles for

Krohn in Jackson Krohn's racing career started by helping a friend as a pit crew member in 1990. He got behind the wheel of his first racecar and began his driving career at the Murray County Speedway in Slayton when he entered an enduro race in August 1992. He was the seventh driver to enter the race and that would be his car number. A total of 63 cars entered that race and he ended up winning it.

Krohn began racing weekly in 1993 at Slayton He was now in the bomber division and went on to win eight races that year and a track championship.

In 1994 he moved to the hobby stock class, won two track championships and was third in national points with 14 feature wins.

The next year he moved up to the stock car class and raced Slayton, Worthington and Jackson. He continued in the stock car class through 2002. Along the way he won the Jackson Nationals in 1998 and 2000 and numerous track championships, including the Jackson Speedway track championships in 1996, 1997 and 1999. Through his years of racing in the stock car class, Krohn saw victory lane a total of 55 times at Jackson alone.

In 2003 he moved to the modified class and started traveling on and off with the United States Modified Touring Series and won his first USMTS feature that year. In 2007 he won the USMTS national championship.

To date he has more than 40 USMTS feature wins and has raced in 23 states.

Krohn also raced late models for a couple years in 2016 and 2017, winning four features in the WIS-SOTA division.

His most memorable feature win came in Jackson in August 2012 when he won the USMTS feature that night. That would be the last victory lane photo with his daughter, Natalie Anne, as the family lost her the following month.

Richert Jr. sets record

Richert Jr. grew up going to sprint car races. His dad raced and, although he was not able to go all the time, he went as much as possible. Kids or women were not allowed in the pits at that time.

He had fired up sprint cars and drove them slowly around tracks until one time at the Sioux Empire Fairgrounds he was doing slow warm-ups and they threw the green flag. That was the first time he went somewhat fast.

Finally, in 1981 at the age of 19, he got the chance to race in a car in which his dad had raced and won. In his third race at Centuria, Wis., he won his first feature. Richert Jr. won his second feature the following year at Owatonna.

In 1983 Richert Jr. started the year racing at Knoxville and finished the year running at Jackson. He was named Knoxville rookie of the year and set a new track record at the Jackson Nationals with the first official sub-19-second lap at Jackson.

In 1984 and 1985 he ran the L.L. Woodke car at Fairmont on Fridays, Jackson on Saturdays and Huset's Speedway on Sundays. He was top five in points at Jackson both years and had some wins, including his first win at Jackson on June 16, 1985.

In 1986 Richert Jr. was in the Taggart/Johnson blue No. 81 car for the first time. He won the Jackson season championship and followed it up in 1987 with another championship. He also won the Huset's Speedway championship that year. In 1987 he also raced

a USAC midget at Cedar Lake Speedway in Wisconsin and ended up fourth in the feature. In 1988 they took the blue No. 81 Taggart/Johnson car to Knoxville to race weekly, won the season opener and qualified for the A-main at the nationals for the first of four times. That year he also had a couple of wins in the Ron Kohl-owned car wrenched by none other than Forbrook. He also obtained his pilot's license to assist in getting to the races more efficiently. His instructor was Bill Hanson, who owned the car he raced in 1982 and 1983. In 1989 he raced weekly at Knoxville for Phil Durst and again won the season opener and finished second in season points.

In 1990 Richert Jr. was hired to drive the Cahill Brothers car. At the season opener he had the worst crash of his career, which sidelined him for a monthand-a-half. The highlight of that year was he made the Knoxville Nationals Amain for the second time. The 1991 season was OK, with the highlight that year when Forbrook's driver at the time, Haudenschild, had some medical issues and Forbrook asked Richert Jr. to drive and they picked up a win at Knoxville. The 1992 and 1993 seasons had a couple of wins, one which was the tune-up the week before the Knoxville Nationals.

The 1994 season was not a great year, but once again, he made the Knoxville Nationals A-main in the Taggart/Johnson No. 81 car. In 1995 and 1996 he was in the Taggart/ Johnson car full time again and won the season opener at Knoxville for the third time and also qualified for the A-main at the nationals for the fourth time and was fourth in season points. In 1997-1998 Richert Jr. was back in the Woodke 1W full time and had a few wins. In 1999 he raced at Knoxville in the Mike Vanderecken

In 2000 he raced a limited schedule with only three races. In the years 2001 through 2004 he drove for George Sibet and picked up a win with the IRA at Cedar Lake Speedway. In 2002 good friend Joe Kouba suggested he put together a 360 car so they could run the 360 and the Sibet 410 at selected races.

He was able to win several races in the 360 during this period. In 2005 and 2006 he raced his 360 and the Kouba 410 at IRA races. From 2007 through 2010 Richert Jr. and Kouba partnered up on a 410 and he still had his 360. Both cars in 2007 were painted retro to resemble the Frank Wagner cars his dad drove in the 1960s.

Richert Jr. had several wins in the 360 with a second and third in points with the newly formed Upper Midwest Sprint Car Series in 2009-2010, respectively. In 2011 and 2012 he raced mainly the 360 and had several wins. He won the UMSS season championship both years. In 2013 he was sixth in UMSS points with a win. In 2014 he won his third UMSS championship with several wins. In 2015 he was third in UMSS points with a memorable win at the Deer Creek Speedway in the Donnahue 34DD. In 2016 he won the season opener for the UMSS at Cedar Lake Speedway in the 34DD in what would be his last win. He finished the year second in UMSS points. The 2016 season was Richert Jr.'s last year of racing and his last feature win at Jackson was in 2007.

Richert Jr. raced in 16 different states and in Australia. It was a great ride and a tremendous amount of fun. The only thing he would change is to take out a few of the bad crashes.

Some of the car owners Richert Jr. has driven for over the years include George Dabruzzi, Bill Hanson, LL Woodke, Marty Johnson-Terry Taggart, Ron Kohls, Phil Durst, Larry Cahill, Larry Ball Sr, Bill Kain, Glen and Rich Stewart, Forbrook, Jensen Construction, Jordan Brothers, Mike Vanderecken, Robucks, George Sibet, Kouba, Patrick Donnahue and for himself, JR Racing.

Kennedy won the B Main. Schafer also held on during several anxious moments in the closing laps of ners. the NSL Mastell Brothers





Cali Cranston was a perfect 21-for-21 serving and had 14 digs. Gallagher finished with


23 set assists and five digs and was good on all 15 of her serves, with two aces. Grace Brinkman put up

While that differs from what the Huskies saw against NRHEG and certain plays will work better against a four-man or fiveman front, Schuller said the key for the Huskies is just focusing on preparing themselves.

"It's so early in the year we're still worrying about us," he said.

That means finding the right position for everybody, even if he's played somewhere else in the past.

One evample is having linebacker Bradley Buhl play some defensive tackle.

"Buhl is a very good pass rusher at defensive tackle," Schuller said. "We want to get kids on the field in situations where they excel — to use every player's ability as much as we can. Some of the guys are pretty versatile and we're going to use them that way."

The Huskies get senior Keaton Storm back this week, giving them the option of kicking extra points after touchdowns. Storm is the school's career leader with 84 extra points. He'll also handle kickoff duties, which Schuller said is an area that needs improvement after the season

The two teams kick off at 7 p.m. Friday in Jackson.


