JCC overcomes early turnovers, 14-0 deficit to beat Waseca in state quarters

Jackson County Central senior Bradley Buhl punished defenders every time he carried the ball during Saturday's Class AAA state quarterfinal game against Waseca.

So when the Huskies faced fourth-and-2 late in the first half of a tie game, he was the obvious choice to get the ball.

And to just about everyone at the Lakeville South High School football field, it appeared as though he did.

But quarterback Rudy Voss faked to Buhl on an option, kept the ball and went untouched for a 20-yard touchdown that gave the Huskies the lead for good.

JCC, which erased an early 14-0 deficit, went on to win 31-21 to advance to Saturday's semifinals against Pierz (see preview on B3).

"That's obviously the most talented team we've seen by light years this year and I'm really proud to get by a team like this," JCC head coach Tom Schuller said. "It took everything we had and the guys came through. I can't be more proud of the guys."

Turnovers cause early hole for the Huskies

Voss' touchdown run came after the Huskies dug themselves out of an early hole caused by a pair of turnovers.

JCC fumbled on its second offensive play of the game, giving the Bluejays the ball just 14 yards from the end zone.

It took Waseca just three plays to score, then just two to score again after an interception was returned to the Husky 10-yard line on

JCC's next drive.

The second Waseca touchdown came when quarterback Ryan Dufault broke several tackles and made the Huskies look foolish trying to make a tackle.

"I feel like the Vikings that one time when they accused Barry Sanders of having silicone on his jersey," Schuller said. "I mean, we could not tackle him. We were literally missing him with four or five guys. He's a tremendous athlete."

Linebacker Alex Bretzman said Dufault provided quite the challenge.

"He had that really good play where he basically jukeed nine of our 11 guys on defense and scored," he said. "It got better as the game went on, but he was sure a tough player to tackle."

Huskies bounce back

After turning the ball over on their first two drives, the Huskies were tough to stop the rest of the game.

JCC went 71 plays on 11 yards on its third drive, which ended when Buhl ran for a 17-yard touchdown on the first play of the second quarter.

Buhl was met by Dufault at the 6-yard line, but put his shoulder down and bulldozed his way into the end zone with two Bluejays trying to bring him down.

"He was outstanding," senior lineman Sam Dunker said. "He lowered his shoulder and if there was nothing there, he made something there. It was unbelievable."

The Jays drove into JCC territory on their next drive, but a tackle-for-loss by Bretzman on first down and sack by Bretzman and Levi Lindley on second down helped force Waseca to punt.

JCC then struck quick, going 76 yards in just three plays.

Elijah Meium-Bratrud ran for 12 yards and Buhl

JCC then took the lead for good when Voss scored the 20-yard touchdown on fourth-and-2 on JCC's next drive. A 33-yard completion from Voss to Damian Meyer-Andre helped set up that touchdown.

Storm's extra point made it 21-14, which was the halftime score.

Experience pays off

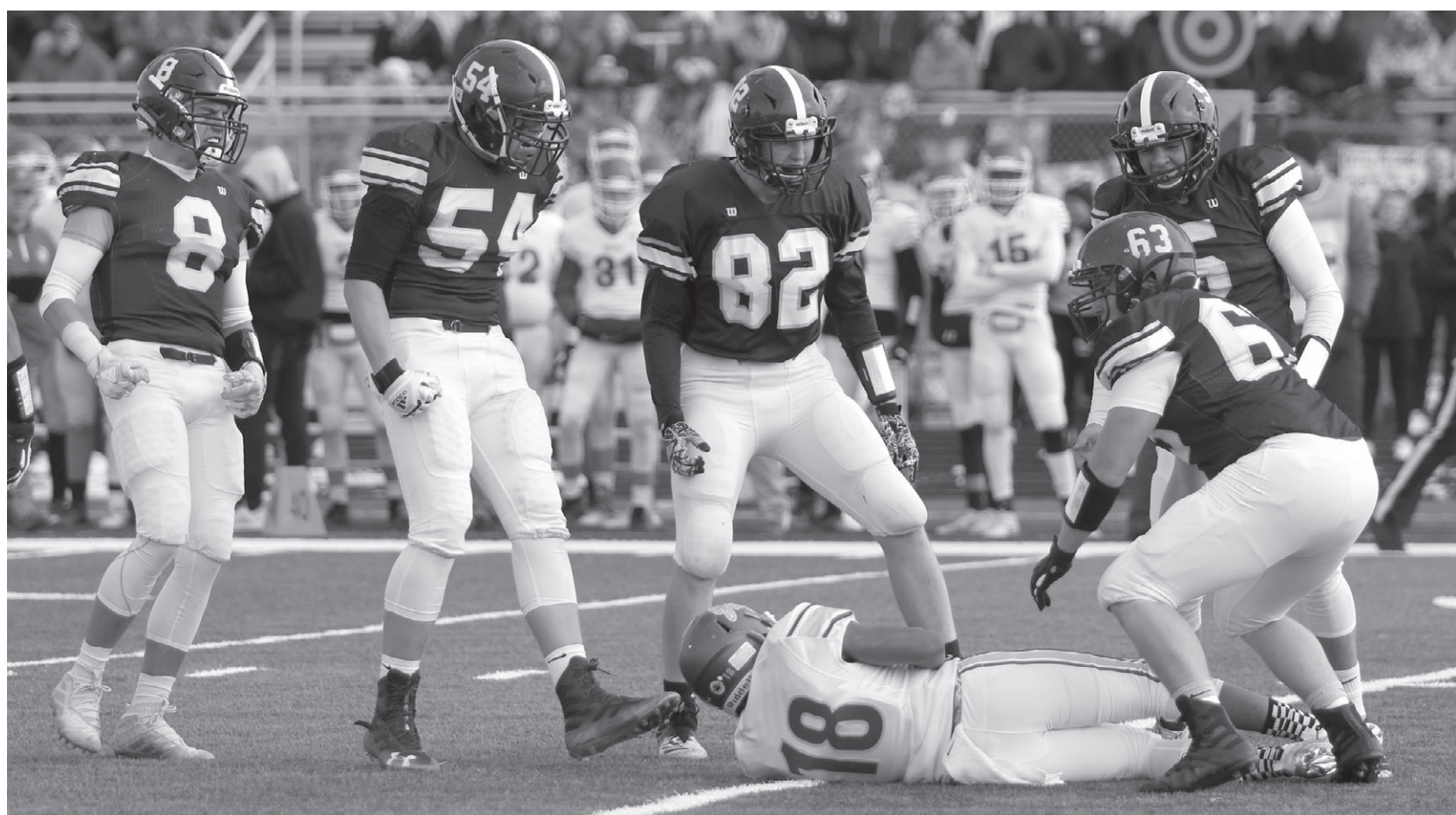
Schuller said he expected the high-scoring Bluejays to make some plays. He just didn't expect his team to be down by two scores so early.

"There were times in that game where we were in big trouble," he said. "We said there would be things that would go wrong. I didn't mean them to go wrong that big and that fast, but the kids dug down and we were able to lead at halftime, unbelievably."

Dunker said the team used its experience to bounce back from its early deficit.

"We reflected on the past two years against Fairmont," he said. "Early turnovers, early scores and we folded. This time we knew we were on a mission and we weren't going to let that stop us so we did what we had to do and we rallied."

"We always said, 'Stay positive; don't single anybody out. We're in this together. Let's keep going, let's keep driving. We got this,'" Bretzman said.

Storm's field goal provides cushion

The second half started much like the first, with JCC losing a fumble on its third snap.

This time, though, the defense stepped up and forced a turnover on downs. Cole Kapplinger made a tackle-for-loss on third down and Noah Carr stopped Waseca receiver Kyreese Willingham inches short of a first down on fourth-and-8.

The Huskies appeared to be back in the end zone when Matthew Stubbe caught a pass and shed off defenders for a 74-yard touchdown, but a penalty against Storm kept the Huskies out of the end zone.

Storm made up for it a few plays later when he kicked a 27-yard field goal for a 24-14 lead.

"That was huge," Schuller said. "He got called for a penalty, but that shows a lot of perseverance on his part to be able to weather

that and then hit that field goal."

The three points proved critical during the game's final seven minutes.

"The game was different," Schuller said. "If we're only up one score, they could be running the ball. We could sit there and lean on the pass, which is a different football game. The field goal, it was huge."

It proved even more important when the Bluejays scored in three plays to cut JCC's lead to 24-21 with just more than five minutes to play in the third quarter.

The Huskies had to punt on their next drive, but, with Dufault on the sideline dealing with an injury, the Huskies forced a punt.

Bretzman steps up

Voss made plenty of highlight plays during a game filled with them, with one of his best coming early in the fourth quarter.

Facing third-and-15, Voss eluded several Bluejay defenders and scrambled backward about 20 yards before finding Buhl in the middle of the field.

Buhl pulled in his first catch of the season and drug a pair of defenders for a first down.

Voss was hurt on the play, though, and Bretzman took over behind center with the Huskies at the Waseca 18-yard line.

Schuller said he had full confidence in his backup quarterback.

"I felt good with him going in," Schuller said. "I told Wade (Wacker)

we were not going to put Rudy in if he couldn't throw. I had that kind of confidence in Bretzman. Bretzman would start on a lot of football teams."

Bretzman had confidence too, because of who was behind him.

"I'm walking up to the line and Brad goes, 'I'm right behind you; give me the ball,' and I go, 'That's what I'm going to do.'"

Bretzman handed the ball to Buhl and Meium-Bratrud the first three plays, then once more to Buhl for a 2-yard touchdown run — after calling an audible.

"He audibled on the touchdown there as a second-string quarterback," Schuller said. "That's more impressive than you know because he gets like no snaps in practice."

Offensive line dominates

The Bluejays were forced to punt on their next drive and the Huskies took over with a 10-point lead and just more than six minutes left on the clock.

Everyone knew who was getting the ball, but nobody could stop Buhl.

"We've got Brad Buhl and he is a man," Schuller said. "I said, 'Brad, you got 10 more,' and he said, 'I got a lot more than that in me.' He was impressive."

After Meium-Bratrud carried for 3 yards on the first play of the drive, Buhl carried the ball the next six plays before Voss converted on third-and-2 to seal the win.

"Brad was the best defense we had today," Schuller

ler said of the team's running attack keeping Waseca's offense off the field. "It was nice with them sitting over there while Brad was carrying the ball. He's a load."

Buhl said he was a bit surprised how well the Huskies were able to run the ball.

"We knew we'd have some success, but I don't think we planned on that much success," he said. "That was a surprise to me. I know the linemen are happy they got to kick their butt."

Schuller credited the big guys up front — Dunker, Andrew Hesebeck, Kobe Foster, Keldon Bennett, Trace Michelson and Lee Drahota — for another solid game.

"The offensive line did a great job," he said. "I can't say enough about those guys."

"We knew that was going to be a strong suit for us even though they're strong up front," Dunker said. "We knew us guys up front, we had to take control. Our team trusted us and we did what we had to do and it paid off."

Buhl and Voss each top 100 yards rushing

Buhl finished with 150 yards rushing and two touchdowns on 33 carries.

Voss ran for 122 yards and two scores on just nine carries and Meium-Bratrud rushed for 41 yards on eight carries.

JCC ran for 313 yards and Voss completed five passes for 84 yards to give the Huskies 397 yards of offense.

The JCC defense allowed just 136 yards to the Bluejays. Waseca ran for 66 yards and threw for 70.

Schuller said the Huskies were forced to put pressure on Dufault, and it worked.

"We were able to adjust," he said. "We blitzed because we had to — which I don't like doing, but we had to. He is short, so we thought if we could come off the edge, we could bother him. We were able to make enough plays to get it done."

Huskies need to be at 'absolute best' to beat Pioneers in state semifinals

The Jackson County Central football team got away with a few mistakes in a Class AAA state quarterfinal win over Waseca.

They won't be able to do so against Pierz in the

semifinals, head coach Tom Schuller said.

"You've got to be at your absolute best," he said. "I don't know if we'll be able to beat them if we don't take the ball away a couple times."

The Pioneers, ranked No. 1 in the polls all sea-

son long, feature senior speedster Matthias Algarin (No. 24), who is going to Nebraska next season to run track.

"He's as fast as anyone in the state of Minnesota," Schuller said. "He effects the entire football game. I'm not saying he's Randy Moss, but he effects the game in the same way Moss did. You have to account for him every play."

Algarin will line up in the backfield most of the time, but will also split out and create a mismatch if he's left in man coverage.

"This guy is a dangerous weapon," Schuller said. "If he gets the ball in the open field, it's about 50-50 whether he's going to score."

The Pioneers also have other talented backs and use them out of the wish-

bone.

"It starts with the wishbone," Schuller said. "If you can't stop that, you don't get to see anything else."

On defense, Pierz will play a 4-2 defense with a lot of man coverage. They'll also bring pressure regularly.

Schuller said the best way for his offense to combat that is to go right at the speed of the Pioneers.

"One of the best ways to neutralize that kind of speed is run it right at them," he said. "We also have to take some shots."

Schuller said it is important the Huskies sustain drives so the Pioneers' offense can stay off the field.

JCC leads Class AAA with 46.4 points per game, but Pierz is second with 45.9. The two are flip-

flopped on defense, with Pierz leading the class by allowing just 8.3 points per game and JCC second at 8.6.

The Huskies are excited to get the chance to play at U.S. Bank Stadium.

"It means the world," senior Alex Bretzman said. "I'm so excited to play there and so are the rest of the guys."

Bradley Buhl said he is looking forward to the game.

"I said last week, 'This means the world,'" he said. "This means the world, part two. We get to play in the Bank."

Schuller said playing at U.S. Bank Stadium is a thrill for the team, but he said they need to be focused on the Pioneers.

"I want them to enjoy it, but we're playing a football

game," he said. "It just happens to be at the Bank. I'm not sure we'll even notice where we're playing with a team like Pierz."
