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Boys soccer: Rangers grind past highly rated Hounds

Sometimes in a downpour, and always with slippery ground underfoot, the Forest Lake boys soccer team hosted Class AA No. 4 Duluth East in a much-anticipated clash of Section 7AA rivals Aug. 27. The Rangers sought revenge for a number of past playoff defeats, and though they had to grind all 80 minutes to get it, a second half goal by senior striker Jordan Oberholtzer held up for a 1-0 victory that will upset the general order in the section.

The Rangers and Greyhounds fought through intermittent rain, including one particular fierce, whipping shower near the halftime break, but neither side could break through for a goal before offside. the interval. The turning point came in the 51st minute, when Hound defender Cy Goerdt was shown his second yellow card of the game for a foul on a Ranger breakhalf hour.



Rangers run near top of giant fields

The Forest Lake boys and girls cross-country teams began their 2019 campaigns in the St. Olaf Showcase, a meet that eschews the usual division of fields into varsity, JV, middle school and other categories and just throws every single runner into one race, pitting girls against a field of 608 and boys against a field of 862. The Forest Lake girls placed third out of 34 complete teams with 157 points, while the boys were sixth in a 39-team field with 241. Finishing "in the points" for the girls were junior Natalie Runquist (11th place, 19:45.5 for 5,000 meters), freshman Ellie Hanowski (13th, 19:48.2), junior Amelea Hauer (34th, 20:30.1), freshman Jordan Parent (38th, 20:42.0) and sophomore Annabelle Stang (68th, 21:15.5). In the boys top five were senior Max Charlsen (13th, 16:44.3), senior Austin Sievers (18th, 16:53.1), sophomore Dan Vanacker (28th, 17:07.2), senior Jeremiah Vanacker (47th, 17:42.0) and junior Drew Sampson (139th, 18:47). A total of 33 Ranger girls and 28 Ranger boys competed across the two races. The Rangers return to action Friday at 4 p.m. in the Cambridge-Isanti Norm Ayen Invitational at Isanti Middle School.

Swimming and diving outlasts Bears

The Forest Lake swimming and diving team conquered White Bear Lake 104 to 76 in the first dual meet of the new Suburban East Conference season, held at the White Bear YMCA on Aug. 29. Ranger entries claimed the top spot in all 12 events, including three girls who won top honors twice. Senior Ellie Thiele won the 50- (26.53 seconds) and 100-yard freestyle (58.39) races. Senior Ella Anderson took the 500-yard freestyle (5:44.94) and 100-yard backstroke (1:13.34) while freshman Haley Bent won the 200-yard individual medley (2:29.66) and 100-yard butterfly (1:07.56). Other Rangers to win individually were junior Paige Anderson in the 200-yard freestyle (2:05.05), senior McKinley Leavitt in 1-meter diving (252.50 points) and junior Ashlyn Mackowick (1:07.56). The Rangers also claimed relay victories in the 200-yard medley (Mackowick, Ella Anderson, Bent, Thiele; 2:01.88), 200-yard freestyle (Paige Anderson, Mackowick, freshman Izzy Maloney and Thiele; 1:50.72) and 400-yard freestyle (senior Annie Larson, junior Jenna Stockinger, Paige and Ella Anderson; 4:06.26). The Rangers will host Stillwater Thursday at 6 p.m. before heading to the White Bear Invitational all day Saturday.
