the Section 8A championships in Grand
Rapids over the weekend.
"The Lakers were OUTSTANDING
at sections!" she relayed in a postmeet email. "We had some incredible
swimming and diving,"
Detroit Lakes will be represented
by seven swimmers and one diver
in ten events at the State Class A
meet later this week.

DL sends two individuals to state
holding three section titles: Jennifer
Tracy in the 200-individual medley and
the 100-breaststroke.

Tracy broke section and pool records
in her fly win. One of those marks is
something new.

Her butterfly record time was 58.49.
The former pool record of 59.20 was
held by Amanda Paulson of Monticello
and had stood since 2008. Paulson was a
state 50-free champion, member of the
Magic's state True Team winning team
and a four-year standout at lowa State
a four-year Most Valuable Swimmer for
the Cyclones and a holder of more than
100 career wins.

Tracy already owned the section record
having set it during her freshman season
in 2017 (58.82).
"Jen makes it look so easy that most
people don't realize what an incredible

swimmer she is," said Fischer.
Tracy and senior Lucy Steinke were voted swimmers of the Year in Section 8A by the 10 section coaches.
Steinke had her best meet ever.
"By earning a bronze in the 50-free and swimming out of her mind in the 100 backstroke - a new event for her this year - taking second place and punching a ticket to state," said Fischer.
Madi Gerdes took a powerful, yet ethereal route to her section championship, according to Fischer.
"Madi's swim was sublime in the 100 breaststroke," Fischer said. "She's fun to watch because she knows exactly when to turn up the pace to full-throttle and just burns it into the finish."
Gerdes wom in a time of 1:09,63, besting Grand Rapids' Hannah Rauzi (1:10.21), but more impressively beating three of her own teammates as the Lakers owned half of the finials field in the breaststroke.
Evan Westrum was 0.23 seconds off of sending two Lakers to state in the event placing third, followed by Lexi Gerdes in fourth place (1:10.96) and Ellie Staley in seventh (1:15.07).
Rauzi's finish was important to Grand Rapids in the team standings as her 17 points for second place had to fend off a

Richter, **Dragons** have 'total faith' in QB Sinani

Minnesota State Moorhead junior Jakup Sinani had missed the previous five games heading into last weekend's game at Minot State.

Sinani is set to make back-to-back starts for the first time since September. The Dragons (5-4) host rival Bemidji State at Scheels Field at Alex Nemzek Stadium this weekend. The teams are playing for the "Axe" traveling trophy and the Dragons have a chance to win three consecutive games for the first time this season.

The Dragons have two games remaining in the regular season, including the game against bemidji State.

"It's a program that's been traditionally strong," Dragons head coach Steve Laqua. "The last two games are huge. It will swing how you look at the final record. This is criti-

Sinani looked in postseason form last weekend, completing 40 of 51 passes for 513 yards against Minot State. The passing yards and completions were both single-game school records for Sinani, who hadn't played since Sept. 21, the third week of the season. He was named the NSIC offensive player of the week.

"Whenever anyone comes off an injury we are pretty pumped up," said Dragons wide receiver Jake Richter, who had 10 catches for 207 yards and a touchdown last Saturday, "Everyone was excited for him. I have total faith in him."

Richter missed the first four games this season after he suffered an Achilles injury last February. The 6-foot-4; 214-pound junior has tried to increase his workload the past five games in returning from the injury. Last Saturday, Richter played about 60 snaps, which is the most he's been able to play this season.

The Minot State game is the first game in which both Sinani and Richter played together this season.

"Having Sinani back was a big thing for me," said Richter, who is from Detroit

Lakes, Minn. "We have a little bit of that chemistry." Laqua added: "I think the two of them have a special connection." While Sinani was side-

While Sinami was sidependent of the headsets on the sideline during games and was able to listen to Laque call plays during games. Sinami said being plugged into the play calling helped him mentally prepare for his return to the field last Saturday.
"I got a feel how Laqua likes calling his plays," Sinami said.

Sinami helped mentor true freshmen quarterbacks Matthew Plasterer and Max Carter, who both saw playing time while Sinami was sidelined. Plasterer has completed 119 of 20 passes for 1,313 yards and seven touchdowns with seven interceptions this season.

The Lakers began the meet with a 200-med-ley win from Lucy Steinke, Madi Gerdes, Evan Westrum and Jennifer Tracy touching first in a time of 1:54,89.
