Bemidji State enters postseason with program-first in mind

The Bemidji State women's soccer program, which has raised the bar over and over in recent years, has another chance to do just that this week.

The Beavers enter the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference Tournament three wins away from their first-ever postseason championship.

"(It's) about the opportunity to do something that we've never done before," BSU head coach Jim Stone said. "That's the potential the postseason holds for us right now."

Bemidji State had checked off several notable boxes in recent years, including the program's first NCAA Tournament berth in 2017 and its first NSIC regular season championship and NCAA Tournament victory in 2018 — both years breaking the program record for wins in a season.

"Last year was a first, we won the conference (regular season title)," junior goalkeeper Emma Riedi said. "So our mindset right now is to be the first Bemidji team to win the NSIC Tournament."

Serratore earns 300th win, Beavers sail to sweep

BEMIDJI — For the second straight night, the Bemidji State men's hockey team held Lake Superior State to a single goal, winning 5-1 Saturday at the Sanford Center to clinch the Western Collegiate Hockey Association series sweep.

Entering the second period tied at 1-all, Alex Adams and Ethan Somoza scored 81 seconds apart moments into the frame as the Beavers (3-3-2, 3-1-0-0 WCHA) sailed to the win. Friday's game was also a one-sided affair, ending at 7-1, marking the most goals scored by the team since an 8-2 win over Niagara on

Dec. 4, 2009.

Head coach Tom Serratore reached a career milestone Saturday by picking up his 300th career victory.

"It's kind of odd. I never would know that unless somebody just told me," he said.

Now in his 19th season behind the bench, Serratore has compiled a record of 300-287-95, making him the second-winningest coach in program history behind Bob Peters, who finished his career with a 702-293-49 mark over 34 seasons from 1966-2001.

"It means I've been here a while, and I've got 400 and how many more to catch Bob Peters. So I'll

be 91 when that happens," Serratore joked.

The sweep was the team's first since Hockey Day weekend last January when the Beavers swept Michigan Tech. The last time they scored five or more goals in both games of a series sweep was Jan. 8-9, 2016, with wins of 6-3 and 5-1 at Alaska Anchorage.

Adam Brady ended the team's power-play drought when he scored his team-leading fifth goal of the season at 13:54 of the first period. The team had only managed one goal in 18 opportunities for the season entering the night. The power play finished 1-for-4 on the game.

Nick Wagner, Beavers surge in season opener

BEMIDJI — When the ball found Nick Wagner's hands in the closing seconds of the first half on Saturday, it didn't really matter that he was throwing up a contested, running, half-court buzzer-beater.

With the debut he was having, you just felt like it was going in.

"Every shot you shoot, you think you're going to make, especially when you're shooting well," Wagner said. "I got the ball and saw the clock, three seconds left, and I tried to get a shot up any way I could."

Much to the delight of the season-opening crowd at the BSU Gymnasium, Wagner swished the shot for three of his game-high 30 points during the Bemidji State men's basketball team's 117-60 win over Northland College.

Wagner, a junior transfer from Indian Hills Community College, introduced himself with 24 points in

the first half alone. He outscored the Lumberjacks (0-2) by one, as the Beavers (1-0) commanded a 54-23 lead at the break.

"You want your good players to be confident and have the passion for the game," BSU head coach Mike Boschec said. "He loves the game. He works hard at it ... It's no fluke that he comes out here and puts up his numbers."

And while Wagner spearheaded the offensive efforts, he had plenty of help alongside him. Bemidji State (1-0) torched the nets for its most points since 2012, also coming within nine points of the program record.

"This team's got a little more juice, a little more punch," Boschec said. "Last year, we were kind of one-dimensional in some ways, and this year, we've got the potential to be much more balanced inside and out ... We have more guys who can do more things, and that's nice to coach."

Beavers set PRs, finish 25th at NCAA regional

JOPLIN, Mo. — Six members of the Bemidji State women's cross country team set personal-record times Saturday at the 2019 NCAA Central Regional Championship in Joplin, Mo., where the Beavers placed 25th out of 32 teams.

Sophomore Ryne Prigge led the team in 47th place, posting a PR time in the 6,000-meter race with a mark of 22:48.81. She

became the first BSU runner to finish among the top 50 at the regional meet since at least 2002.

Along with Prigge, the team's top six runners set PR times. Following the sophomore were Kristen Petron (32nd, 24:27.11), McKenzie Evans (155th, 24:56.27), Lily Johnson (163rd, 25:05.65), Emma Realing (186th, 25:25.82),

Ashley Herdering (202nd, 25:56.73) and Carissa Decko (220th, 41:06.0).

Beaver runners finished with an average time of 24:33, the team's fastest in a 6K race this season and the fastest for BSU since the 2016 NSIC Championship.

The Beavers were swept by No. 16 Winona State (25-18, 25-21, 25-16) on Friday before another 3-0 loss against No. 22 Upper Iowa (25-22, 25-19, 25-16) on Saturday.

Anna Averkamp led Bemidji

State (7-19, 4-14, Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference) on the weekend with 20 combined kills, including a .410 hitting percentage. Maddie Mackinac tallied 55 set assists, and Emma Hallmann posted 19 digs to lead the defensive efforts.

Bemidji State will wrap up its season this weekend on the road, facing Minnesota State at 6 p.m. Friday, Nov. 15, in Mankato and Concordia-St. Paul at 5 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 16, in St. Paul.

Alaska men's hockey programs safe for 2020-21

FAIRBANKS, Alaska — The men's hockey programs at Alaska Anchorage and Alaska Fairbanks won't be going anywhere for the 2020-21 season.

The University of Alaska Board of Regents met Friday and confirmed that no cuts would be made to the

schools' athletic programs next school year.

Along with Bemidji State, UAA and UAF are members of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association. BSU and six other WCHA schools announced in June that they would leave the league after the 2020-21 season to form a new conference. The Alaska schools and Ala-

bama Huntsville were not included in those plans.

"It was stated and affirmed that we would have athletics at UAA and UAF," UAF director of athletics Keith Champagne told the Anchorage Daily News on Friday.

"Same sports as this year, same everything."

"This is great news for the hockey programs at

both UAA and UAF and for the WCHA," WCHA President and Men's League Commissioner Bill Robertson said in a statement Saturday. "We are pleased that the Men's League of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association will remain at 10 teams in 2020-21."

Alaska Gov. Mike Dunleavy had vetoed \$130 mil-

lion in state funding for the university system earlier this year, but fortunately for the schools and their athletic programs the cuts have turned out to be much less. The system saw a \$25 million budget cut for this year and another \$25 million cut for next year.

The future for the athletic programs beyond

next year, however, remains uncertain.

Regents told the schools Friday to provide detailed financial statements for their athletic departments, along with projected revenue from sponsors and donors. A decision on the future of athletics beyond 2020-21 is expected in early 2020, the Daily News reported.

Gophers' new world includes chatter about playoffs, Rose Bowl, Heisman

MINNEAPOLIS — The Gophers' season took on a "is this real life?" dimension with a 31-26 upset of fourth-ranked Penn State on Saturday, and it's only going to get more dream-like this week.

Some of college football's Holy Grails can now be seen on the horizon for Minnesota, including a clearer path to the Big Ten Championship Game and being in the mix for a College Football Playoff spot.

A bizarre world, right?

Heading into next Saturday's 3 p.m. kickoff in Iowa City, the Hawkeyes have four straight wins over Minnesota since 2014, meaning no one with the Gophers has lifted the massive Floyd of Rosedale Trophy.

"It's a big game for this program," Gophers receiver Rashod Bateman said Saturday. "It's a big game for this state, and I just know we have a chance to go get it this year, so that's what we need to focus on now."

Gophers senior defensive end Carter Coughlin was "ecstatic" in reveling in the first field storming from fans at TCF Bank Stadium since beating Iowa in 2014. "But the second (Sunday) hits, that is over with," he declared. "We are going to be 100 percent focused on our next game."

Minnesota hasn't won at Kinnick Stadium since 1999 and are 4-14 in

the rivalry since 2001.

"There have been a lot of things we haven't done in a while, so we are going to keep that same mentality," Coughlin said. "Trust me when I tell you we are going to practice this week harder than we've ever practiced because we've got our eyes fixed on the goal, which is going 1-0 in the Iowa season, and we are going to take care of business."

Another element of this pinch-me type season is the rise of Tanner Morgan and whether he now deserves to be in the conversation for the Heisman Trophy.

The odd-on favorite has become Louisiana State quarterback Joe Burrow, who might not yet have a "Heisman moment" but had a Heisman-worthy game in the 46-41 win over Alabama on Saturday.

Burrow completed 31 of 39 passes for 393 yards, three touchdowns and no interceptions against Nick Saban's defense. A week before that performance, Burrow received an endorsement from last year's winner, former Oklahoma QB Kyler Murray.

The Heisman race has a lot of other QB candidates from Tua Tagovailoa, but he wasn't himself in returning from an ankle injury vs. LSU and no player has missed a game and won the Heisman since Florida State's Charlie Ward in 1993.

Ohio State defensive end Chase Young climbed into the Heisman conversation over the last couple of weeks, but that candidacy to be the first defender to win the award since Michigan defensive back Charles Woodson in 1997 took a big blow with him facing the potential of a few-game suspension for a loan he says he repaid to a family friend.

This award has become quarterback-centric and Morgan's numbers are in the ballpark of the best at the position. First and foremost,

he's 9-0 and this award often goes to the best players on one of the best teams.

His QP rating is 191.04, which is a few ticks below Oklahoma's Jalen Hurts, Tagovailoa, Burrow, but above other contenders in Ohio State's Justin Fields, Clemson's Trevor Lawrence and Oregon's Justin Herbert.

Morgan's passing yards (2,100) and touchdowns (21) are the lowest of any in that group, but is within a few hundred yards or a couple of scores from the bunch.

Morgan was near perfect against the Nittany Lions on Saturday. He completed 90 percent of his passes with nearly 19 yards per completion.

His two incompletions were a back-scholarship throw to Chris Autman-Bell, which could have been caught, and a slight overthrow of Tyler Johnson in the corner of the end zone.

Morgan stepped up after Gophers running back Shannon Brooks fumbled and a Penn State touchdown cut Minnesota's lead to 24-19 in the third quarter. He completed five of five passes for 82 yards, including one to Chris Autman-Bell when he was hit in the pocket and another when he looked off coverage and found Bateman for a 36-yard completion. Wildcat quarterback Seth Green then capped the drive with a 1-yard touchdown run and the margin Minnesota would need to win.

Now, Morgan will get his first taste of the rivalry with Iowa.

"I'm from Kentucky, and I'm very proud to be from Kentucky, but I love the state of Minnesota," he said Saturday. "I love it to death. I'm very happy to be in the state of Minnesota."

If he and the Gophers come back to Minneapolis with the nearly 100-pound bronze pig, their dream — and the spoils that come with it — will come closer to reality.

Former Lumberjacks members named to All-UMAC teams

ST. PAUL — Three former members of the Bemidji High School girls soccer team were named to the All-Upper Midwest Athletic Conference Teams on Tuesday.

Sophomore midfielder Annah Schussman of Wisconsin-Superior was named to the All-Conference First Team, junior midfielder Lydia Bitter of Martin Luther made the All-Conference Second Team, and freshman midfielder Harper Toward of Minnesota Morris earned an All-Conference Honorable Mention nod.

Schussman led the Yellowjackets in points (21) and goals (nine), and she shared the team lead in assists (three) and game-winning goals (two). Schussman's nine goals ranked fifth overall in the UMAC.

Bitter also had team leads among all Knights in points (14), goals (six) and game-winning goals (three), and she also tallied two assists.

Toward converted three shots on goal on the season into two goals, which tied for third on the team. Her three assists tied for second among the Cougars, and her seven points tied for third.

Gophers lineman Sam Schlueter gets do-over against Iowa. And he's ready

MINNEAPOLIS — "The Gophers" Sam Schlueter was yanked from his spot at right tackle at half-time of last season's 48-31 loss to Iowa. He had given up multiple sacks, and as he took a seat on the bench, his confidence was in tatters.

The next week, Minnesota coach P.J. Fleck insisted, "Schlueter is very important for our football team. He's going to be important for our football team now and important for our football team in the future."

Schlueter had doubts — in himself. "It was lacking it a little bit more then, for sure," he said

of his confidence.

Schlueter didn't start in the final eight games of 2018, but reemerged as an extra offensive lineman/massive tight end in Minnesota's "heavy" formations. He contributed to convincing wins over Wisconsin and Georgia Tech to end the season. "That helped build that confidence back up, and I went through spring ball and everything, and now I'm where I'm at," Schlueter said.

Schlueter reemerged as the Gophers' starting left tackle this season, often coming out of games as the highest-graded offensive lineman and the label of "Mr. Consistent" from Fleck.

Schlueter is expected to start against Iowa at 3 p.m. Saturday at Kinnick Stadium in Iowa City.

The Gophers' preseason competition at left tackle, with the departure of Donnell Greene, was perhaps the team's biggest preseason question mark, in part, because of Schlueter's struggles on the edge against the Hawkeyes.

Fleck stresses players he well rounded off the field with "socially" being one of the tenants, so if the football aspect isn't going well at that moment, they don't feel deflated.

"I think when football is just the main thing, at times, people will lose interest," Fleck said. "When good things happen, they

will be fine; when bad things happen, they will be sad. I think he had to be able to gain consistency in his whole life."

In the Big Ten opener this fall, the Gophers started mixing in John Michael Schmitz as some of the play on the primary five slipped in nonconference games. Now that the level of play has picked up, the Gophers have been rotating Schmitz with Schlueter, Daniel Faalele, Curtis Dunlap, Conner Olson and Blaise Andries.

Against Penn State, the Gophers used six offensive linemen in a "heavy" formation, paving the way for a run game that produced 121 yards against

a defense that entered the game allowing 68. The also allowed only one sack against dangerous pass rushers like NFL prospect Yetur Gross-Matos.

The versatility of playing six O-linemen helps when you put all on the field at once.

"It just gives us the ability to show different looks and do the same things," Fleck said. "Get more guys on the field, provide more gaps and make it a little more difficult for the defenses. Simple us, complex them."

The Gophers will face another tough defense Saturday. The Hawkeyes are ranked 20th in the nation in rushing defense, allowing 112.4 yards per game.




