

continued suspension of all participation in spring activities at all member schools until the current school closure declaration is lifted. The decision was made in alignment with Gov. Tim Walz's extension of school closures through May 4, meaning the ear-liest date for spring sports has been pushed back to May 5. Walz issued a "stay at home" order effective ULSO p.m. Friday. March at home" order effective 11:59 p.m. Friday, March

27, through 5 p.m. Fri-day, April 10, to slow the spread of the coronavirus in Minnesota. "Pending a reopening of schools by the Governor, return to participation

schools by the Governor, return to participation protocols will be deter-mined and communicat-ed by the MSHSL Staff," the MSHSL staff," the MSHSL staff," the MSHSL staff," the decisions regarding the cancellation of spring activities have been made at this time." Id, the barotate comp-ny announced Thursday, March 26. The 6-foot-5 Skunberg averaged 28.4 points, 11.1 rebounds and 2.8 assists in his final high school season with the Blue Jays. He's signed to play men's basketball at North Dakota State

ta State. Skunberg was recent-ly named a North Dakota Class A first-team, all-state selection. He was a unanimous choice. Skun-berg missed the Blue Jays final seven games of the season with a fractured

season with a fractured right pinky finger. Former Jamestown Blue Jays standout Mason Walters was named Gato-rade player of the year for North Dakota last season.

has since been dismissed by the team. If the league did find sufficient evidence to pun-ish the Red Sox, they could face similar sanctions to those levied against the Houston Astros in January for their own sign-steal-ing scheme.

MLB draft reportedly

moved back to July Major League Baseball plans to delay its annual draft at least one month

plans to delay its annual draft at least one month to July. ESPN reported the draft is likely to be shortened with bonuses deferred due to uncer-tainty surrounding the coronavirus. MLB and the Play-ers Association are engaged in talks that would reduce the draft to between five and 10 rounds, ESPN reported. Signing bonuses with a small upfront payment and larger amounts due deferral of bonuses. The No. 1 pick in the 2019 draft was Ore-gon State catcher Adley Rutchsman, who signed for \$8.1 million, a record baseball bonus. All 2020 undrafted
