## 4-H Dairy showing becomes family tradition for Katzungs

howing dairy cows has become a family tradition for the Katzung family of Owatonna. And Jace Katzung wasn't about to let the COVID-19 pandemic get in the way of him showing this year.

Jace will be showing two dairy steers in 4-H competition this week at the Steele County Fairgrounds. It won't be anything like the 16-yearold has grown accustomed to over the past few years, but he's just glad to have the opportunity to show.

"I'm really glad it wasn't a virtual show," Jace says. "I'm glad we can do it in person. Just to not have the chance to show one time would be disheartening."

For Jace and other 4-Hers, parading around the show ring will be a little different this year than any other. They will be required to wear masks and extra scrutiny will be placed on cleaning and sanitizing everything. Volunteers will also be at the show performing health screenings.

Jace has served on the county's Project Development Committee that formulated plans for continuing 4-H livestock shows this summer in Steele County. The committee has been meeting since May at the height of the coronavirus to work out details. Jace's family has been involved with the committee for eight years.

The dairy show will be different this year as there are not as many 4-H members competing as normal. In Jace's division, there will be only
