Governor has gone too far

There are so many problems associated with Gov. Tim Walz's statewide facemask mandate, it's hard to know where to start.

The mandate is not only inconsistent and baseless, but also a gross abuse of the governor's power.

It's ironic the most vocal supporters of this facemask mandate — including the governor himself — are the most vocal supporters of legalized abortion. Wearing a facemask protects others, they say, adding the sacrifice is selfless, and legally mandating it the right thing to do. Yet these are the same people who are the first to defend the ability of those unwilling to sacrifice for the life of their unborn children to legally end the life of that human being. "My body, my choice," they chant in the streets, their selfishness a death sentence to the most innocent among us.

The governor and other facemask proponents tout the science behind the effectiveness of facemasks in preventing the spread of COVID-19, but neglect to mention results of other studies finding little to no effectiveness. So, let's bring to it down to its most elemental level: If facemasks work, prove it. Have the Legislature enact a law mandating their use. Then allow the state to open back up completely — schools, bars and restaurants, concert venues, sports stadiums. If facemasks work, we should be good to go. If they don't, admit it and give us back our freedom.

Walz issued his statewide facemask mandate last Wednesday, hours after the Minnesota Legislature adjourned a special session. Rather than make his case to state lawmakers on the veracity of a statewide facemask mandate, the governor chose to wait until they were out of town to issue his edict which violates existing state statute — and couch it in the four-monthold emergency declaration he seems to believe grants him dictator-like powers. The governor is responsible for implementing laws put in place by duly elected legislators, not creating new laws on a whim and cramming them down the throats of the people.

Inconsistent in nature, baseless in science and an egregious example of an abuse of power, Walz's statewide facemask mandate needs to go.

It's becoming increasingly apparent that so does he.

China, like the USSR, is an evil empire

For ethnic minorities and persecuted groups in China, free trade has become a sentence to forced labor camps and cultural genocide.

China, like the Soviet and Nazi regimes, uses forced labor, internal deportations and ethnic cleansing as a way to maintain control over its

In northwestern China, the Uighurs, an ethnic group with its own unique culture and history, are being surveilled constantly and interned in reeducation camps. They are facing genocide as we buy Chinese goods from factories run on their slave labor.

Like every genocidal regime, China targets the family first. Married couples are surveilled constantly and forcibly separated if they are

interned in camps. Women are being forcibly sterilized and some pregnant women are forced to have abortions.

If they're lucky enough to have their baby, the family's suffering only gets worse - the Communist Party dictates what names they can and cannot give to their babies. If they give their children a religioussounding name, the government will force them to change it.

After that, the family may be forbidden from transmitting their cultural and religious traditions to their children. Being predominantly Muslim, this means children are not allowed to go to mosque — China is officially an atheist state or a religious school.

The child may then be sent to a boarding school, unable to see his or her parents for months and perhaps years at a time. The child's parents may be sent to two separate

factories, thousands of miles apart. The family has been all but destroved.
