### City hoping to finally wrap up sanitary sewer extension work

City officials are hoping a sewer line extension project five years in the making can finally be wrapped up this week.

Members of the Jackson City Council last week approved a \$75,000 project change order that teams a Watkins-based construction firm with project contractor Svoboda Excavating of Jackson to dig an extension line in across the Des Moines River. Crossing the river has proved to be the project's sticking point, as river levels the past three years have not allowed the crossing to be made.

Jackson City Administrator Matt Skaret said river levels are currently at a point that would allow a crossing to be made and recommended the council bring in the Watkins firm to assist Svoboda Excavating with the work "due to the complexity of the project and the small window of time to get it done." He said if the weather and river levels hold, the river crossing could be done this week, with the final leg of the project completed yet this year.

The project itself was designed to connect 28 properties in Jackson with noncompliant septic systems to the city's sanitary sewer system. The \$1.8 million project was approved in 2015, with work beginning in 2016.

More than 400 boxes of books are up for sale at the Friends of the Jackson County Library's 14th annual used book sale next week in Jackson.


choices out there," Kuipers said. The fairgrounds is a good space for the event,
