WPD asks public to view information video

WORTHINGTON — The Worthington Police Department released a video
Thursday about a Level 3 sex offender
who recently moved into the community, and the WPD is asking the public to
watch it in order to become informed.

A Level 3 sex offender is considered at high risk for re-offending. Because of this, state law requires law enforcement to notify the public when a Level 3 offender moves into the community, explained WPD Det. Sgt. Brandon Piel.

Typically, local law enforcement would hold an in-person public forum when this occurs. Due to COVID-19, however, the Minnesota Department of Corrections recommended a video instead.

In the video, Minnesota Corrections Agent Brad VanderVegt spends about 45 minutes explaining how the sex offender levels are assessed and what it means for a community member to be a Level 3 offender.

Of the nearly 19,000 predatory offenders in the state of Minnesota, only 446 are considered Level 3. Nobles, Murray and Cottonwood counties are home to one Level 3 offender each.

"Research and data ... supports that

a well-informed community is a safer community," VanderVegt said.

However, Piel emphasized, the goal is not to scare the public or create a sense of worry.

"The more information, the better," he said.

Information helps people make better decisions and form safety plans for themselves and their communities, VanderVegt added.

VanderVegt's video is available to watch on WPD's Facebook page.

While members of the public consider the information shared, VanderVegt recommends not dropping a bombshell on children by telling them all the details at once. Rather, he suggests having regular, age-appropriate conversations with kids about how to stay safe in their communities and where to go for help if they feel unsafe.

For any public safety concern, the WPD is the best local resource, VanderVegt said. Anyone who has been a victim of a predatory offense should reach out to the Southwest Crisis Center, VanderVegt emphasized.
