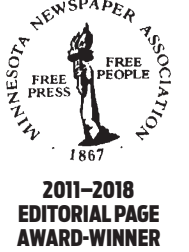

It allows the students who can effectively learn from home the opportunity to do that a bit.

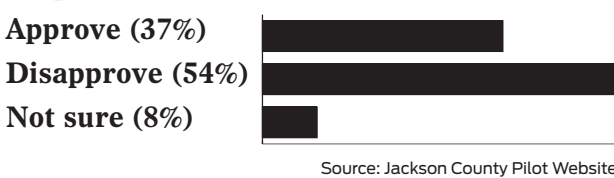
It reduces the likelihood of viral transmission among students, faculty and staff.

**KATHY KOLANDER** 100% Agree!!!!!!!



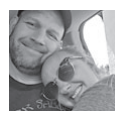
**DANIELLE ROSSOW** I agree 100%

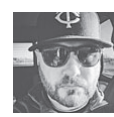

### Mask mandate may carry health risks and possible legal repercussions

**To the editor:**  
According to medical doctor Andrew Kaufman, "There has been no 'Koch's postulate' to prove that viruses cause diseases." As in the case of measles, for example, the courts agreed there was "no evidence" to substantiate the validity that a virus causes measles. A German virologist who explored the HIV virus conducted a study revealing a virus had a supportive function and did not harm cells. From 1918 to this day, virologists have been unable to prove influenza spreads through normal people. The U.S. Public Health Service once conducted three experiments with subjects who had the Spanish flu and 100 healthy subjects. None of the 100 healthy subjects got sick.

Cells talk to each other in a language that looks like viruses called exosomes. Some virologists believe the coronavirus is merely exosomes.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the National Immunization Conference and the World Health Organization have released flawed tests for the coronavirus. Some people showed symptoms, while others showed no symptoms but tested positive. Pharmaceutical companies Lilly and Pfizer are paying the highest fines for false claims and health care fraud.

With evidence to support the fact viruses do not cause diseases, it is important to note a mask mandate may have legal repercussions. After three minutes, wearing masks may drop oxygen levels significantly, causing hypoxemia, which can adversely affect the brain and other organs. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration standard is 19.5 parts per million of oxygen and requires businesses that mandate masks to have a licensed medical examiner on site. Only then can a mask be worn for 10 minutes after every hour.

I urge all to do their own research and discern for themselves the validity of virus causing diseases, the health risks of wearing a mask and the legal repercussions that may follow by demanding mandatory masks.

**CHARITY BREINER** How so? How is a mask effective during surgery, but ineffective when not doing surgery? Please explain the science, I'm very curious. Face shields and "goggles" are used to protect the doctor and others in surgery from fluids. A mask is not waterproof, and would not help with that. Masks help stop droplets from coming out of the mouth at high speed. They are protecting the patient in surgery, not the doctor. The surgical field is meant to be sterile, however if the doctor were not wearing a mask and coughed, the surgical field would no longer be sterile. Therefore a doctor would not need to wear a mask outside of surgery when seeing patients, unless he was the one that was sick. And doctors have enough sense not to work with patients when they're sick, therefore we shouldn't be seeing them wearing masks for that reason. However, With an illness that can present asymptotically, during this time we may be more likely to see practitioners wearing masks when they aren't exhibiting symptoms.

**JIM KERSTING** it's not just death that's a concern. Parshley rounds up the most notable potential long-term health effects that doctors are observing in Covid-19 patients.

Blood clotting, stroke, and embolisms: Physicians report that patients hospitalized for Covid-19 are experiencing high rates of blood clots that can cause strokes, heart attacks, lung blockages, and other complications, Parshley reports. For instance, physicians are seeing an uptick in strokes among young patients with Covid-19. The blood clots also can travel to other organs, leading to ongoing health problems. For instance, pulmonary embolisms, which occur when the clots block circulation to the lungs, can cause ongoing "functional limitations," like fatigue, shortness of breath, heart palpitations, and discomfort when performing physical activity, Parshley reports. Similarly, blood clots in the kidneys can cause renal failure, which can cause life-long complications.

Heart damage: Physicians have also reported an increase in inflammation of and damage to the heart muscle in Covid-19 patients. One study published in March found that out of 416 hospitalized Covid-19 patients, 19% showed signs of heart damage.

**LAWRENCE FISCHER** Crystal Dehn you know the survival rate of covid is like 95% or higher

**LYNDA ANDERSON HOLMES** Lawrence Fischer do you want to be one of the 5%??

**CRYSTAL DEHN** Myself and two of my sons have respiratory diagnoses and it would be just my luck to have one of us badly affected by this or further damage our lungs etc.

**TIFFANIE YOUNGWIRTH WALDEE** You know what else has less than a 1% child hood cancer. An i can guarantee that you probably know at least 5 children in the community whom have either survived ,are still seeking treatment or whom have passed. Did you know that only about 100 people die a year from chickenpox... yet before children can attend schools or daycares. There required to have the varicella vaccine. Even though there is a high survival rate. With a long term lurking illness that comes about later in life . You know the one your probably old enough to experience; Shingles about 96 people die a year ,mostly elderly from shingles. But there is a vaccine for that... even though it seems to have a high survival rate.

Worldwide 140,000 people died from measles in 2018. Yet before any child can attend school there required to vaccinate against measles. Even though there is a high survival rate. Right now covid has surpassed both chicken pox, shingles and measles. Something we have vaccines for. What we don't have a vaccine for is covid. Which the number of deaths, ICU treatment still seem to go up in each state. Also condoms and birth control are also a 99.1% against pregnancy and STDs. Yet the US has an over population problem.

**NICHOLE NELSEN** Tiffanie Youngwirth Waldee and how many people are actually using condoms or birth control? Cant blame over population on something you do not know is even being used.... Every vaccine you listed you can sign a waiver and not receive and still attend school, so your point? They are all a choice.

**TIFFANIE YOUNGWIRTH WALDEE** The point is a condom is 99.1 % effective if used. What do you think the percentage of transmission of a virus would be if people wore a mask, to help eliminate the bodily fluids from being spread? Lack of use or use of properly and then there is the 1% of failure...

But hey in 2018 an estimated 2000 people died due to residential building fires; Yet even with that low number. People still have preventive measures in place; Smoke alarms. Fire extinguishers and fire depts. Even though 2000 people dying would be less then 1% .. of the population.

**NICHOLE NELSEN** 30,000 people die from domestic violence each year and we do nothing to prevent that... there are laws to prevent the abuser, but next to nothing for the victim. Abusers get a slap on the hand and are free to go abuse again... we can throw examples all day. Doesnt change that this specific virus is not as serious as the media makes it.
