Watch your waste for the holidays; here is how to recycle over Christmas

Household waste rises Household waste rises by 25%, on average, across the nation from Thanksgiving to New Year's Day, according to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency. Much of that extra holiday waste comes in the form of boxes, food and wrapping paper. paper

"AS a community, we're recycling more than we ever have," said Steve Skoog, the Becker County Environmental Services Administrator.

In order to recycle as many products as possible, Skoog and Sandy Gunderson, the Regional Household Hazardous Waste Coordinator, Recycling Coordinator, Recycling Coordinator and Waste Educator, rely on the community to sort their products — and sort them correctly.

"At the holiday season, or anytime, there's always this temptation to keep all your waste together," Skoog said. "But, in reality, it's probably not supposed to be that way."

They and everyone else at the Becker County Transfer Station can't sort through every blue recycling bin and every

sort through every blue recycling bin and every garbage bag to make sure garbage bag to make sure something recyclable, or something hazardous, isn't in the wrong place. When something is misplaced, it can create a dangerous situation, such as a fire. "Lithium batteries have become a real problem," Gunderson said, adding that this includes all rechargeable batteries."

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"Those should come out if people are going to throw them away," Skoog said.

Over the holiday season, christmas lights are one common item at the Transfer Station. But they are recyclable and collected year-round. Gift-wrapping paper, on the other hand, is not recyclable and has a steep increase during the holiday season.

"The challenge with wrapping paper is a lot

lophane ingredient on it or glitter and that's a contaminant," Gunder-son explained.

Instead of buying the traditional wrapping paper, Skoog and Gunderson recommended derson recommended purchasing paper-bag wrapping paper. Options are available at Tar-get, Walmart, and many online stores like Ama-

zon.
"One of my favorite things is to go to the

newspaper office and get the end rolls," Gunderson said. End rolls are what's left of the white paper rolls that the Tribune's printing plant uses — the rolls vary in size. "Get the grandkids to decorate on it and that's all recyclable. Plus it's memorable." (Tribune) office and rolls." Gur

Other gift-wrapping products, like cardboard boxes, bags and tissue paper can all be kept and reused, lowering waste.

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Or, to lower the use of all wrapping products, give gifts that require little to no wrapping. Gifts of experience or gifts of time aren't thrown away time aren't thrown away or recycled, unlike other gifts tend to be. And, instead of throwing away gifts when they're no longer used, donate them if they are still usable.

"A lot of stuff can be reused," Skoog said.
"That's probably the best thing; if you can reuse it."

Along with wrapping products, residents can cut back on trash by composting their food waste. Compost bins take waste. Compost bins take food waste and turn it into a highly-nutritious soil additive. By com-posting and recycling the correct items, "there's not much left" for waste, Skoog said

not much left" for waste, Skoog said.

To make the sorting process easier, Skoog and Gunderson have multiple PDFs and brochures up on their website with the sorting information. They also have the prices listed for applicable items that they take, and locations in each town with recycling bins.

"We're trying to make it easy for people to do," Skoog said.
