Former BHS state champ places 11th at **D-I Nationals**

The Oregon Trail for Drake University sophomore Isaac Basten started in Des Moines and ended 12th to the

Friday, June 11 landed him

a spot as a Second Team

All-American. The top-16 runners from Friday's finals earned All-American status. The top-eight made first team, while spots 9-16 were second team. For Basten, an All-American finish follows up his 2019 Class AA state championship in the 3,200 meter run (9:09.96) during his senior year at Buffalo

High School. "State was a great accomplishment, but it really doesn't compare to nationals," Basten said. "In the moment, it probably feels just as good when you win, but at nationals, I'm competing against the best in the world."

Cole Hocker of Oregon won the 2021 national title in the 1,500 in a time of 3:35.35. Yared Nuguse of Notre Dame finished second (3:35.60).

Basten reached Friday's finals behind a gritty effort during the preliminary round on Wednesday, June 9. A sudden burst of speed in his final lap moved him from ninth place to fourth in the final prelim standings.

His time of 3:39.57 during prelims was a personal record in the 1,500 and second fastest in Drake school history. It just missed the men's standard of 3:37.50 for qualifying for the US Olympic Trials.

His strategy to conserve energy until the end goes back to his cross country and track days in high

"Most guys like to go out hard at the beginning of the race," Basten said. "I actually like to start out in the back and move my way up. Sometimes the top-end guys waste a lot of energy maneuvering within the pack. I like to stay back about two seconds or so and make my jump in the final lap."

Basten's long-term goal is to someday run professionally. He currently is ranked No. 15 in the nation. Still with four years of eligibility due to being a redshirt

If sophomore Arthur Ylitalo someday gets a golf offer from Notre Dame, he will look back to the 2021 Class AAA state tournament as to the reason why.

Grouped in the final pairings heading into the final round on Wednesday, June 16 at Bunker Hills in Coon Rapids, Ylitalo shot the round of his life.

His score of 67 was five-under par 72, which broke his own school record of 69 he set earlier this year for an 18-round score. His 67, combined with his 70 he shot the day before, put him at seven-under for the tournament at 137.

Unfortunately for Ylitalo, he wasn't the only golfer on Wednesday to have a career day. While his 137 was six strokes lower than the 143 posted by Stillwater's Brock Winter, who won the 2019 state title, Ylitalo found himself third overall in the final standings.

Northfield junior Nate Stevens broke the MSHSL state tournament record with a 10-under par score of 134. Stevens and Ylitalo were in the final pairing on Wednesday, along with Moorhead's Joe Kortan and Farmington's Kyler Schwamb.

According to Buffalo Head Coach Paul Olson, Ylitalo was not mentioned as a contender heading into the tournament, but he definitely turned more than a few heads with his perfor-

Among those in the crowd were plenty of local and mainstream media, along with Notre Dame Men's Golf Coach John Handrigan, who was there to follow Stevens, who is a Notre Dame commit.

was obvious from the first shot that Arthur was going to build on the energy in his group and use it for motivation," Olson said. "After he rolled in a birdie putt on the first hole, you knew it was going to be game on.'

Ylitalo had his own personal gallery following him at state. His parents and grandparents were in attendance for both days, as were six of his 10 siblings, and a few of his Bison teammates.

"It was fun to come up here and play well," said Ylitalo, who was sporting a grin afterwards from ear to ear. "I played great golf. To do it with the best guys in the state, and in front of my family was a great experience.

Buffalo sees two records fall at state

Feddema, Bluiett enjoy big day

In the biggest meet of the season, four members of the Buffalo girls' track and field squad produced big-time results in last Saturday's Class AA state tournament at St. Michael-Albertville High School. Juniors Lauren Feddema

and Bri Bluiett broke two team records that stood for over a decade.

Bluiett's time of 12.47 in the 100-meter dash broke the previous record of 12.51 set in 2009 by Olivia Haggerty. Bluiett's time was good for 14th place.

Feddema's time of 46.80 in the 300-meter hurdles was 13th best, but broke Carly Hanson's previous team record of 46.84 set in 2003. Feddema shaved nearly a

half a second off her section time of 47.28 she posted June 9 at Waconia

None of Bluiett or Feddema's placings were good enough to land a spot on the podium. The topnine in each event received medals. Despite no medal, both runners felt a sense of accomplishment afterwards.

"We knew we wouldn't necessarily be with the top finishers, so we came in with the mentality that we wanted to PR (personal record)," said Bluiett, who broke her own PR time of 12.90 set at sections. "We just wanted to try our best and see how good we could
