### Fire kills 8 milk cows. destroys dairy barn

**◄ FIRE** from **A1** cows were trucked to a farm near Claremont.

"The worst part was the hay," said Naatz, adding that after a trackhoe picked off the dairy barn's tin roof, firefighters methodically removed the hay from the wooden structure and wet it down throughout the night.

Two cement silos filled with corn silage and haylage, located

adjacent to the barn, were not damaged, said Naatz. "We hit them with water to keep them cool."

The cause of the fire is unknown and remains under investigation by the State Fire Marshal, although Naatz said there was nothing suspicious about the blaze.

Seykora speculated that a wiring issue caused by a rodent may be responsible for igniting the fire.

ear Motor Medics, My 2004 Tahoe leaks enough oil on the ground that I could start my own refinery. I have had it into my local shop, and they tell me its leaking from the rear main seal and the front seal and timing cover and oil pan and valve covers too. I think that is almost every seal. It also leaks transmission fluid from the front seal and transmission pan. The Tahoe only has 110k miles on her and no rust and basically runs perfect but leaks. I am thinking of replacing the engine to stop the leaks even at 7k dollars its much cheaper than another used vehicle. What are your thoughts.

Joan in Cannon City Colorado We can't stand oil leaks on a good running vehicle but there is no need to jump at a new engine just yet. If it runs great give it a once over checking compression and leak down and if it passes you could pull it and the transmission and reseal everything much cheaper than replacing the engine. While resealing, we suggest a new timing chain, valve seals, and drives side valve cover as these are all high failure items. If you can get the oil leaks to all stop you can turn this back into a vehicle that could possibly give you many more years of life from it saving you a lot of money VS replacing the engine in a vehicle with fairly low mileage.

ear Motor Medics, I drive a 2013 Chevy Camaro Rear wheel drive. I wish they made it with AWD like the Dodge Challengers option. This is my only car and since I moved from Texas to Minneapolis two years ago I have been stuck, literally in the snow because its my only car many times. Sometimes I have not even been able to get out of my parking space at work and one time had to leave the car there and take an UBER to my home. I cannot afford to purchase another car at this time, so I need to do something to get better traction. I talked to one tire store who told me that I can by the wide snow tires for over \$200 each for the rear but they suggest all four and they say that they do not think it will do much good though. What can I do to help with the traction? Sharon in Minneapolis

Driving a Camaro or another performance vehicle like a Mustang or a Challenger without all-wheel drive can prove to be a tricky situation. We have a Camaro for our Under The Hood radio show as a show car. We have found that not just snow tires but also the narrowest wheels available for the car to match a narrow tire turned our car into a very capable snow machine. Talk with a tire store about both wheels

and tires for more traction. Take care, The Motor Medics
