

Three generations of Tschidas finish a race

Sam Tschida had an idea. He was on his daily walk this spring when an idea started forming in his mind to run a race with his son, Joel, and his grandson, Garrett.

Sam put it on his bucket list.

On June 19 he crossed it off the list as the three ran in the Avon Spunktacular 5K.

"Three generations in our family fin-ished the race," he said. Finished is the main word here.

"My goal was to cross the finish line and I did," said Sam who has lived in Avon with his wife, Carol, since 2008, moving there from St. Rosa.

Running the race was a mind and body thing for him. Last fall, during a medical checkup his doctor suggested he go on a medication or in 10 years he would be a candidate for a stroke if he kept up with his

current lifestyle.

"I asked what I had to do to prevent this, and she said, 'I'll give you six months,"" Sam said.

He made lifestyle changes and started walking.

"I made up my mind to lose weight and get in better shape last November, so I started walking every day after work," he said.

His doctor was happy with the results when he returned for a six-month checkup. So much so, that putting him on medication was off the table.

'So I just continued doing what I was doing," he said.

Knowing Joel ran in races before, including in 17 different states, Sam thought it would be nice to run the Spunktacular race with his "two boys," Joel and Garrett.




